Little Giants loaded in the middle

FREMONT — Middleweights will dominate the Ross lineup this winter.

Little Giants' coach Mike Mezinger — now in his 10th season — had 33 wrestlers out as of the second week of November and returns a slew of district qualifiers, including two state-qualifiers, from the 113-pound

to the 160-pound weight classes.

"According to our board in the wrestling room right now, we don't even have a 195- or 220-pound wrestler," Mezinger said. "But from 113 to 171, we should be fairly strong. Our board parts like the Red Sea right around 120 and 138 with kids trying to get themselves in those two weight classes and keep way from our 113, 126, 132, 145, 152 and 160 wrestlers."

The 145 spot is off limits. That one belongs to Trey Grine, who became Ross' first state-placer since 2005, taking fourth-place at 145 as a junior at the Division I state tournament. Grine (48-4) is coming off a year where he also earned the Three Rivers Athletic Conference's wrestler of the year honors, won the state championship in Greco

Outlook: The Little Giants defended their team title at the Oak

Harbor Invite in 2012 and had a second-place showing at the Worthington Kilbourne Wolfpack Classic. But Ross had a disappointing TRAC tournament, despite Trey Grine winning the league title at 145 pounds. Grine was 48-4 last year — 132-17 for his Ross career — and was the TRAC wrestler of the year. He became the first Little Giant to place at the state meet since 2005 when he earned a fourth-place honor at the Division I state meet. Geary qualified at 160, but didn't place. Ross had six wrestlers go to districts. This year, the Little Giants' goal is to be in the top three in the league. Clay and Toledo Central Catholic are the two league favorites.

Ross

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Roman wrestling in May at the USA Wrestling State Championships in Elyria, and earned MVP honors in the Community I division, going 11-0 for national runners-up Oregon Clay "A" at this past summer's prestigious Disney Duals tournament in Orlando, Fla. where he tallied three pinfalls, five technical falls and a major decision at 145 pounds.

Grine is 132-17 in three years wrestling for the Little Giants and should easily move ahead of Tyler Trautwein (150 wins) on the all-time wins list.

"He's really pushing himself to be that state champ," said Mezinger of Grine who is ranked second in his weight class in the preseason rankings. "That's his goal and he's more than capable of accomplishing it if he continues to work his tail off."

Grine's younger brother Tyler Grine will be a freshman at the 132

spot for the Little Giants.

Senior Peyton Geary, another state-qualifier at 152, is also back. Geary was 35-11 and has aspirations of placing at the state meet after losing on opening day.

"Peyton did a lot of summer wrestling also," Mezinger said. "He's going to go up to 160 this year. Last year, he had to watch his weight pretty good, so this year he should be able to handle the move really well."

District qualifiers back include Trayvion Scott at 113, Bailey Mezinger at 126, Sam Lewis at 138 and Jordan Weissinger at 152. Only Scott has kept the same weight

class, as Mezinger wrestled at 120 a year ago, while Lewis was at 126 and Weissinger wrestled at 138.

"I've got like six people at 138 right now," Mezinger said. "It's going to be a dogfight for that spot."

Senior Bobby Hrynciw will also compete with Lewis for the 138 spot, while senior Sergio Garcia is expected to hold down 120.

Junior Bryce Moreno is back in the program and expected to compete for the lineup spot at 182. His classmate, Stefan Johnson, will be at 171.

Freshman Logan Lauer could wrestle at

106. Austin Moyer is a freshman penciled in at the heavyweight spot.

"We haven't had 106-pounder in a couple years," coach Mezinger said "He needs to lose a few pounds, but he's a real hard worker."

Ross had four seniors try out that have never wrestled before. Last year, the Little Giants defended their team title at the Oak Harbor Invitational, their season opening tournament on Nov. 30.

This year's team goal: Finish in the top three in the league.

Zach Thurn, a former Clyde wrestler, is among a few new coaches on the Ross staff.

"These kids have set their goals high," coach Mezinger said. "We haven't competed well at the TRAC tournament the last two years for some reason. But if we go there with the mindset we need to have, there's no reason why we can't be right there with Clay or Central Catholic."

Four unbeaten as Oak Harbor second

Grine, Franks lead Fremont Ross to third place finish at Oak Harbor Invitational

Trey Grine of Fremont Ross was recognized outstanding wrestler for the lower weights Saturday while Oak Harbor heavyweight TJ Lawrence earned the honor for the upper weights at the Oak Harbor Invitational.

Grine (145 pounds) had four pins and won 3-2 in the dual for third.

"That was a really good match for him early in the sea-

son," Little Giants coach Mike Mezinger said.

Lawrence was 5-0.


"TJ was tested in his five matches and came up strong each match," Rockets coach George Bergman said. "We saw it in the Ohio State/Michigan game. It's not what you did yesterday, it's what you do that day. TJ passed each test. He's been working hard and it's good to see hard work pay off."

Ivan Franks (138) was the Little Giants' most valuable

wrestler Saturday, according to Mezinger. Franks had four pins.

"I don't think he was a letterman last year and he came out and won wrestle-offs for 138," Mezinger said. "He had a nice tournament. He wrestled hard all day. Going 5-0 was a pleasant surprise. They weren't easy matches. He came back in some of them."

Bailey Mezinger (126) earned three pins and two major decisions for Ross. Jordan Weissinger (152) was 5-0 with four pins while Peyton Geary (160) was 5-0 with four pins and

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one technical fall.

"The team wrestled well," Mezinger said. "Being the first weekend, we have things to work on. For the most part we were aggressive. I'm not happy with third place but we were 5-0. St. Edward had two more victories in our pool. We didn't get to wrestle St. Edward head to head.

"I was disappointed we had to go into the third-place match. It is what it is."

Trayvion Scott (113), and freshmen Logan Laurer (106) and Tyler Grine (132) were 4-1 for the Little Giants.

Oak Harbor's A team finished second as it fell to St. Ed-

ward's B team 43-27 in the finals after beating Van Wert, Alliance, Delphos Jefferson and Genoa. St. Edward had seven starters in its lineup and the match with the Rockets was tied at 27.


"It's always a good test to wrestle with them," Bergman said. "Our kids wrestled quite well throughout the day."

The Little Giants topped Alliance 36-33 to finish third. Ross beat Oak Harbor's B team, Galion, Lexington and Otsego in pool duals.

Bruce Hryniciw (106), Rhett Petersen (132) and Dylan Mansor (120) were also 5-0 for Oak Harbor. Lawrence pinned the Comets' Cody Buckner, who qualified to state last season.

Ross will have its only home match at 6 p.m. Wednesday against Findlay.

Ross downs arch rival Findlay


Early scoring sparks
Little Giants to victory

FREMONT — Ross and Findlay turned their bitter rivalry into a moonlight spectacle on Wednesday evening. Only the light of an overhead spotlight shown down on the wrestlers who treated fans to quite the show inside the Purple Pit.

The Little Giants used an early scoring run off pins from Trey Grine (145 pounds), Jordan Weissinger (152), Peyton Geary (160) and Stefan Johnson (170) to hold on for a 39-27 win in the Three Rivers Athletic Conference dual.

The Trojans made it interesting with Joey Staschiak getting a pin at 106 pounds in 3 minutes, 7 seconds on Ross' Logan Laurer after a forfeit win at 220 and Marcus Molina winning a 9-4 decision at 285 over Austin Moyer. But Findlay could only manage decision victories in sweeping the 126, 132


and 138 matches at the end.

"A win is a win, especially with Findlay," Ross coach Mike Mezinger said. "Our duals with Findlay are always tough. We'll pull out a couple victories that maybe we shouldn't have and they'll do the same.

"They're pretty much our rival now and it's always a good dual."

Grine opened the night's with a 1:53 pinfall of Findlay's Kalani. Weissinger followed up with a pin of Frank Russel in 45 seconds, before Geary pinned Derek Peters in 2:40 and Johnson took down Loren Charles in 43 seconds.

Grine entered Wednesday fresh off being recognized as the outstanding wrestler for the lower weights at last Saturday's Oak Harbor Invitational where he registered four pins and a 3-2 decision win. Geary and Weissinger were also 5-0.

"We were very aggressive again tonight, which is what we're teaching these guys," Mezinger said. "We want them to be aggressive, go out there and go for it. Some of our matches, we pushed through just because of our conditioning tonight."

Two of the better matches took place at 126 and 132.

In the 126 match, Ross' Bailey Mezinger was bested by Justin Joliff 2-0. Joliff scored a takedown in the opening period for the lone points.

At 132, the Little Giants' Tyler Grine seemed to have the early momentum before being

called for a slam in the opening period. His opponent, Christian Sanchez, then caught him on his back at the end.

"We knew Bailey's match was going to be a good one," coach Mezinger said. "They were 1-1 last year. We expect it to be like that all year in that match-up this year, too."

"Tyler had a close one, too. We had the momentum and he got called for the slam and it broke the momentum, then he got caught on his back. It's a couple things he'll have to learn from."

Trayvion Scott scored another Ross pin at 113, topping Ali Hernandez in 3:53. Sergio Garcia gave Ross a 39-18 lead with his pin in 3:53, too.

Ross' lone decision win came from Alonzo McGhee at 195.

The Little Giants will wrestle at Hopewell-Loudon's Holiday Invite on Saturday.

Ross takes 3rd at Reineke Classic

TIFFIN — Fremont Ross finished third at the Reineke Family Dealership Wrestling Classic after Saturday's finals. Otsego won the tournament with 146.5 points. Ross finished with 136.5.

The highlight match of the tournament involved Ross' Bailey Mezinger (126). He won in overtime over Otsego's Buddy Limes. In the one-min-

ute overtime period, both wrestlers had chances to score with the other countering and scrambling out without a score. Each rode the other out in the next two 30-second periods. The decision came down to the ultimate tie-breaker, a 30-second period, with Mezinger winning the toss and choosing top, which forced Limes to score. After a couple more scrambles Mezinger held Limes down to take the 1-0 win.

GRINE'S NEW MARK

Ross grappler's 152 career wins is a new school record

FREMONT — Ross' Trey Grine is shy, like most, when it comes to public speaking.

He'll be the first to admit he's deferred to other senior

teammates when it comes to being the vocal leader in his team's wrestling room.

Get Grine on a mat, though, and his opponents only wish he had a reserved demeanor.

The 145-pound Little Giant wrestler, known for his

aggressive attack style, became Ross' all-time wins leader this past Saturday with his 152nd career victory in the semifinals — overtaking Tylor Trautwein's mark of 151 wins set back in 2011 — at Clyde's Dale Carroll Invitational.

"I didn't know I was that close to it. I thought I was way behind it still," said Grine when asked what it felt like to

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become his school's winningest all-time grappler. "My goal is raise that mark higher and higher."

But Grine was not truly happy with the accomplishment. He wanted 153 instead.

His 5-1 finals loss to Clyde's Beau Minnick was his first after 20 wins to start the year.

Grine, 152-18 in his four-year high school career, is currently ranked first in the state in his weight class in Division I, according to InterMat Wrestle.com.

"I'm actually happy he beat me, looking back at it now," said Grine of Minnick, a fellow senior he's been friends with their Bidy days. "It's made me motivate myself even more than before and allowed me not to be all cautious about my record. Now, I can open myself up and just wrestle."

"Plus, I'd rather lose now than lose later when it really counts."

Others helped in the motivation, too. According to Grine, he received many phone calls and was stopped constantly in the hallways on Monday by fellow students. Everyone had the same question: what happened?

"Even the best wrestlers lose," Grine said. "I'm not Superman."

First came the anger, then came humility. The competitor inside Grine hated the loss and what it did to his win-loss column, yet at the same time, the student of the game inside of him was eating it up. Grine isn't one for scouting opponents, but he loves to scout himself.

"After I let him cool down and let him get the anger out of him, I told him, 'hey it happened. Now it's time to take the mistakes you made and learn from them, but let's get refocused and concentrate on our second part of the season,'" Ross coach Mike Mezinger said. "He was totally on board with that. Losing was probably the best thing that could have happened to him."

Instead of pouting about it for the rest of the weekend, Grine went back to Clyde on Sunday to try and settle the score with his long-time friend. If they were to wrestle 10 times, Grine might beat Minnick in nine of them.

Actually, he did.

"I've beaten him every time we've wrestled since we were little kids, so that was his first time beating me," Grine said. "But he's no slouch. He's a great wrestler, and he beat a state champion earlier this year, which proves that."

As for the Sunday rematch?

"I took it to him and beat him in practice after I finally opened on him," Grine said. "If I had just

done that Saturday it would have been a way better match. But that's wrestling."

"I guarantee I'm about to lose no more, though. I want to be at the top of that state podium."

Is that Grine being arrogant? No.

Confident? Yes.

Grine was 48-4 a year ago. His fourth-place effort at state, at 145 pounds, snapped an eight-year placement skid for the Little Giants' program. He was 41-7 as a freshman and 43-6 as a sophomore.

"He lost his go-to state match as a sophomore in overtime to a kid from Perrysburg, and that haunted him all summer long," Mezinger said. "So that summer he got into the Freestyle/Greco Roman wrestling, and he said, 'that will not happen again.' So he worked his butt off all off-season and it didn't happen again."

"When he wrestled the same kid last year for the go-to state match, he just dominated the kid. And again this year, he worked hard over the summer. Once he puts his mind to something, it's hard to get him off-course."

Grine was the Three Rivers Athletic Conference wrestler of the year as a junior, and over the summer, earned MVP honors at the prestigious Disney Duals in Orlando, Fla.

"He's probably got another 20 matches to go this year if he makes it

down to state again," Mezinger said. "Him breaking our career record this early is no surprise. It just says a lot about the type of wrestler he is. One good thing that has helped him is he's stayed healthy. He hasn't been hurt in his four years, and he's been so consistent in his performances."

The top 30 career victories list in Ohio starts at 180 wins.

Ross senior Peyton Geary, Grine's wrestling partner in the practice room, earned his 100th career earlier this season, while Bailey Mezinger reached 100 with his first-place finish at Clyde.

"Me and Peyton (a 160-pounder) still work with each other and keep pushing ourselves to be the best we can be," Grine said. "We both want to go back to state again. Hopefully we'll have a few more along for the ride this time."

Either way, coach Mezinger's program has come a long way in his 10-year stint.


"All these accomplishments just speak volumes for much this program has grown," he said. "Not only do we have a great high school program, but our middle school program has yet to lose a tournament they've entered."

"It's a great time to be a Ross wrestler."

Points go to OH, despite lack of wins


Forfeits help Rockets win dual over Ross

OAK HARBOR — Points weren't hard to come by for the Oak Harbor wrestling team on Thursday.

Wins were. With three of the Rockets' top grapplers — 106-pounder Bruce Hrynciw, 132-pounder Rhett Petersen and heavy-weight T.J. Lawrence — winning by forfeit, the 10 remaining matches — most in the middleweight classes — favored Ross' experienced lineup. And the Little Giants took advantage.

One match removed from this first defeat of the season, Ross' Trey Grine topped the up-and-coming Ben Petersen by a 15-3 count at 145 pounds, as his major decision victory was one of seven total wins for the Little Giants. However, the wins weren't enough to overcome four forfeits, two pins and a major decision win by Oak Harbor 120-pounder Jacob Huston as the Rockets bested Ross

40-28 in their annual non-league dual. "You can't always pick where the forfeits are going to lie, unfortunately," Rockets coach George Bergman said. "Fremont has a quality program. Last year's match came down to the final match and we were fortunate enough to win after we were losing. "I'll take an ugly win any day of the week, though."

Grine, currently the top-ranked Divi-

sion I wrestler at 145 according to Inter-MatWrestle.com, moved to the top spot on Ross' all-time wins list this past weekend earning his 152nd career victory in the semifinals of Clyde's Dale Carroll Invitational. He lost to the Flyers' Beau Minnick, 5-1, in the finals.

"Trey wasn't happy with his score tonight, neither was Bailey (Mezinger),"

Little Giants coach Mike Mezingler said. "But with a solid team like Oak Harbor, we had to go after them and open them up, go for the points and pick up the pace. Some of our kids didn't do that. A couple tried to get points and got sloppy and gave up points instead."

Bailey Mezingler won a 12-1 major decision over Oak Harbor's Jaret Parker at 126. Ross' Jordan Weissinger topped Stephen Simkus in a 15-0 technical fall at 152, while Peyton Geary (160) won 7-0 over Brody Hennig, Trayvion Scott beat Dylan Mansor 2-1 at 113 and Alonzo McGhee (195) won 7-1 over Payton Salyers.

Kieler Foster won by forfeit for the Little Giants at 182.

"We got the Maumee Bay Classic this weekend, and that'll be a tough one," coach Mezingler said. "Hopefully the seven guys we take there will get after it and we can come home with some good match experience."

After finishing as runner-up for Oak Harbor at the prestigious Perrysburg Invitational Tournament last weekend, Jeremy Balboa continued to wrestle solid at 138. He pinned

Ross' Ethan Hetrick.

"I thought Jeremy looked good," said Bergman of one of his junior district qualifiers from a year ago. "He's been working hard and it's always good to see good kids get rewarded for their efforts when they work like that."

The Rockets other pinfall came from freshman Kian Thompson at 160.

Petersen, another district qualifier a year ago as a sophomore, was also a runner-up for Oak Harbor at the PIT. He's set a goal of placing in the top three at state in March.

"If Ben wants to take the next step and go to state, he has to learn to compete with guys like (Grine)," Bergman said. "So tonight was a great opportunity for him. This upcoming weekend, again, he'll have great opportunities at the Clay tournament."

Clay's Maumee Bay Classic is taking the place of the Sandusky Bay Conference duals for the Rockets.

"We did away with the duals because Clyde, Perkins and us were wrestling each other at the duals, then at the SBC tournament, then the state duals, and then again at the sectional tournament," Bergman said.

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Wrestling: Maumee Bay-Michael Casey Memorial

OREGON—Five Ross wrestlers placed, including Trey Grine—the tournament champion at 145 pounds — as the Little Giants placed ninth as a group at the ultra-competitive Maumee Bay-Michael Casey Memorial hosted by Oregon Clay on Saturday.

Grine earned a 9-2 decision over Delta's Jesse Beverly in the championship match.

Ross' Jordan Weissinger placed fourth at 152, while Bailey Mezinger was fifth at 126, Peyton Geary sixth at 160 and Trayvion Scott was seventh at 113.

Oak Harbor's Dylan Mansor placed third at 113 as the Rockets finished 13th in the tournament won by Delta. Rhett (132) and Ben Petersen (145) were both seventh, while Kian Thompson (160) was eighth.
