No such miracle has happened, yet, however, and lots of work has to be done between now and the opening game with Genoa.

Little Giant Football Team Is Taking Shape

The 1936 edition of the Ross high school Little Giant football team was beginning to take shape Wednesday after a week of practice under Coach Bob Oldfather and his assistants, Fred McClintock and Eddie Gabel.

In a long afternoon session Tuesday, Coach Oldfather started work on plays and signal drills, in preparation for the opening game with Genoa on the night of September 19. The squad worked out until after dark at the practice gridiron at Harmon Field.

Plans for the free football clinic to be held under the lights at 8 p. m. Friday are also moving forward. Eddie Gabel and Fred McClintock will be in charge of the players on the field with Coach Oldfather at the "mike" for the amplifying system which will be used.

Display Plays

The squad will be introduced, then the entire squad will go through informal exercises and calisthenic drills. Tackling and blocking drills will then be displayed, and a demonstration of skills peculiar to linemen will then be shown.

Formations which are used in modern football in offensive play will be explained, and various defensive formations will also be shown and explained. Definition and explanation of the football rules will be given, and the clinic will be climaxed with a brief scrimmage session.

Starts at 8 p. m.

The clinic will start at 8 p. m.,

and Supt. H. H. Church will give the opening address. The crowd will be seated in the new concrete stadium which has been erected at Harmon Field.

And this, all you Fremonters, is the night football makes its official debut for 1936!

After watching close to 70 baseball games during the spring and summer months, the writer, for one, will be glad to change atmosphere and have a look at Bob Oldfather's Ross High Little Giants.

We've seen them going through their practice sessions for the past ten days, but it will be altogether different when we're in the new stadium Friday at 8 p. m.

For awhile it looked like it might rain and spoil the festivities (and it might yet, for all we know), but early in the day, the skies cleared and as this is being written it looks like ideal weather for the free football clinic.

You'll want to attend the clinic, too, because Coach Oldfather is going to introduce many new players to you. Last year's fine club is no more. A new one is in the making, and you'll want to know, in a week or two from now, who that player is making a fifteen or twenty yard gain through the line or around end.

Coach Oldfather says this year's clinic will be more interesting than the one last year, too. There will be new plays to explain, new types of offense and defense, and new rules to interpret.

You'll find the information you glean at the clinic Friday night will be invaluable to you as the season progresses.

Fast Backfield

From everything the writer has been able to hear and see, the Little Giants in 1936 may not be as potent as they were a year ago, but Coach Oldfather is going to have a backfield that will gain plenty of ground.

Young Mernie White is working at quarter these days, and isn't doing half bad. He's put on some weight over the summer vacation, and tips the scales at about 145 pounds now. He's fast and he's smart.

At halves, Pete Fox, a veteran from last year, and Spangler, a new comet, are carrying the burden. Spangler was one of the more promising of last year's reserve team, and should develop as the season progresses.

But it remains for this lad, Fox, to provide the sensation of the pre-season practice work. There is no candidate for the Ross team any more serious in his efforts than young Fox. He's working every minute he's on the field, and he's running with reckless abandon. You're going to like this chap, if he keeps up his present attitude.

Fred Rice has been doing heavy duty at fullback, and he can give as well as take. Rice will have the job of getting those yards when the going is tough, and unless we miss our guess, he'll develop into another Little.

Green Linemen

And now we come to the sad part of the story. We hardly know what to say about that green line! With Shanahan at guard, the Little Giants have one strong position, and young Charley Wolfe is going to prove a fine center—the same type as Clarence Klink and Ford Gomoll. Wolfe is heavier this year, and he has that fighting spirit which the key man on any football team must have.

But where do we go from there? Jerver Oxley should be plenty tough on the line, whether at guard or tackle. The rest of the positions in the forward wall are wide open. All Coach Oldfather needs is a pair of ends and two tackles. And where's he going to find them?

Right now, it looks like Oxley will play an offensive punter and a defensive tackle. That will help. Young Vaffis looks pretty good at line of the guards and will see plenty of action.

On the ends, so far, Balsizer and Woody Grubbs have been giving signs of development. But for every position on the team, replacements are badly needed.

And to make a long story short, success of this year's club depends on the ability of the line candidates to progress.

Lewis Reports

You'll be interested, too, in learning that Joe Lewis, the dusky flash, reported for the club at Thursday night's session. Joe has been working at the foundry and couldn't report with the rest of the squad.

The little negro half back took things easy his first night out, but from the looks of things, he's going to be better than ever. He has words of speed, and is even faster this year than last. Put two or three blockers in front of him, and Lewis will give you lots of thrills before the campaign's over.

Shanahan is going to be a good blocking guard, and Pete Fox and Fred Rice are coming fast as blocking backs, so if Lewis keeps up his part, you're going to find a very fast club when the season opens against Genoa a week from tonight.

Fox, Rice Bring Scores In Opening Grid Clash

Scoring touchdowns in the second and third quarters, a green and ragged Fremont Ross high school football team blasted the lid on its 1936 endeavor here Friday night by overpowering a veteran Genoa outfit, 12-0, before some 1,800 chilled fans under the lights at the new Harmon field stadium.

Excelling in defensive strength but sadly lacking in polish and offensive maneuvers, as typical of teams in mid-September, the Little Giants nevertheless held command of the situation throughout against the invaders.

Fremont's initial score of the season resulted near the finish of the first half when Joe Lewis, right halfback, tossed a short lateral to Pete Fox who rumped 35 yards and shook off tacklers to cross the payoff stripe.

The other touchdown came early in the third canto as a result of a break in the game when the Little Giants recovered the ball on the end Genoa five-yard stripe, Fred Rice, fullback, plunging right tackle for the score.

Both attempts to convert for the extra point failed, Rice's placekick being low in the second quarter, and his line plunge failing short after the second score.

Fremont Far Superior
Statistics of the game clearly reveal the superiority maintained by the Fremonters who marked up eight first downs to a pair for the invaders and gained 155 yards from scrimmage to 34. On passes, the boys of Coach Bob Olsfater accounted for 50 yards to five for their foes.

Until Fremont tallied its first counter, the teams had battled back and forth on fairly even terms with neither gaining much advantage as fumbles, penalties and other misplays killed off any goalward marches.

Fremont started its first touchdown drive from midfield after White returned a kickoff 16 yards. Then Lewis on a cutback play, circled right end for 14 yards, a lateral and touchdown run of Fox following.

Rice Gets Score
Fremont kicked off to Genoa starting the second half, but the veterans gridders were unable to make much headway against the stalwart local defense, a bad pass from center on the fourth down, giving Fremont possession of the pigskin on the Genoa five, from where Rice cracked the scoring zone.

Genoa gained its initial first down of the game after the next kickoff, Kolmopp picking up nine yards and Avant adding two more.

Bob Shanahan, acting captain for the Little Giants, and playing a whole of a game at right guard, stopped further depredation on the part of the Genoa gridders, throwing both Avant and Kolmopp for setbacks.

Kick Is Blocked
Hesslehart's kick was blocked by Shanahan and Fox, Fremont recovering on the Genoa 36 but failing to capitalize on the scoring opportunity.

Lewis went around right end for six, but Fremont was penalized five yards for offense and Nollie threw Lewis for a four-yard loss, Fox being forced to kick over the goal line.

More brilliant efforts on the forward wall by Shanahan, George Mead and Al Silverman thwarted the Genoa's, who punted to the Fremont 45.

Once again Fremont uncorked a goalward assault which went for naught, Fox starting the fireworks with a 20-yard plunge off right tackle. Rice accumulated four on a fake reverse and Lewis four more for a first down on the Genoa 24, at the third period ended.

Giant Offense Stopped
There the Fremont offense backfired. Two attempts, at the line lost a yard, while Fox was spilled for another loss of three yards after recovering his fumble.

After Fox kicked over the goal line, Genoa registered its second and final first down of the scuffle. Avery, the team's ace player, who figured on most ever play, hitting the center of Fremont's line for 14 yards.

Twice again in the latter stages of the fourth episode the Ross high offense bogged down within scoring territory.

Midway in the fourth, Fremont acquired the leather on the Genoa eight-yard marker after Rice recovered L. Abdo's fumble. Lewis ripped off five yards on a reverse, only to have a costly fumble by Rice seal a chance to score, Genoa retrieving the ball on its own one-yard line and kicking out to its 42.

Fox Runs 18 Yards
Lewis lost a yard, but Fox scampered for 18 yards around right end, putting the ball on the Genoa 25. Fox fumbled and recovered on the Genoa 30 and a pass from Fox to Norman Vogt was good for 10 yards.

A 15-yard penalty was levied against Fremont and Fox kicked out on the Genoa eight-yard line a minute before the conflict ended.

Merrile White, who was removed from the Fremont quarterback post in the second half with what appeared to be a serious leg injury, developed only a cramp in his leg, Coach Olsfater said today. White has been bothered by the ailing leg the past month, and damp, cold weather Friday night aggravated the condition.

RUMOR RICKEY TO BUY SHARE IN CINCY REDS

Rochester Prexy May Be Named to MacPhail's Job With Redlegs

The baseball spotlight was drilled Saturday on the Cardinals and Reds, and the possible changes in their organizations, to the virtual exclusion of the Cubs in second place in the National league, and Lou Gehrig's 1,500th consecutive game with the New York Yankees.

While the Giants maintained an almost unbeatable lead of five games in the hot National league race, and Gehrig put on his spikes and glove to add another milestone to the greatest of all iron-man records, the diamond public was asking these questions:

(1)—Will Branch Rickey, the man who played a major part in the successful run of the Cardinals during the last 10 years, buy a controlling interest in the Cincinnati Reds, along with Merrill Russell, a director of the Columbus Red Birds?

(2)—Will Warren Giles, president of the Carter International league farm at Rochester, N. Y., be named to succeed Larry MacPhail, resigned vice president and general manager of the Reds?

Jerry Rickey Report

The two questions—and their answers—appear interlocking. Denials were the only replies to the published report that Rickey and Russell would buy the Reds. One source emphasized that Powell Crosby, Jr., president of the club, is too rigid a foe to sell his interests.

However, it was pointed out in some quarters that the mention of Giles as successor to MacPhail, the man who introduced night baseball to the big leagues, may be in line with the report that Rickey is buying into the Reds.

MacPhail resigned Friday just about the time the Cubs, behind Lon Warneke's three-hit pitching, toppled the Cardinals 3-0 in the only National league game of the day, to take second place in the league away from the staggering Gas House Gang.

The victory, however, failed to disturb the five-game lead of the idle Giants, who are just about "in" for the pennant.

Tigers Blast Indians

The American league also put on a curtailed program, with the Tigers knocking off the Indians 6-3 in one game, and the Browns belting the White Sox 6-5 in the other.

Tommy Bridges stopped the Tribe with four hits in posting his 22nd win of the year, as Detroit's ex-world champions pinned back the ears of young Bob Feller with a game-clinching four-run rally in the sixth.

A five-run spree in the third featured the Browns' victory over the White Sox, but just to put the clincher on, "Sunny Jim" Bottomley belted a homer in the seventh for what turned out to be the winning run.

They'll present a scroll to Gehrig at Yankee stadium Saturday in recognition of his endurance record. His appearance in the battle with the Washington Senators will mark his 1,500th straight game since he took Wally Pipp's first basing job away way back in June 1925.

Rossmen in Second Win; Rice Gains Two Scores

Led by their fullback, Fred Rice, who accounted for two touchdowns, Fremont Ross high school's Little Giants marked up their second straight conquest of the grid chase Friday night by a 19-7 score over an aerial minded Tiffin Calvert eleven before 2300 fans at Harmon field.

Displaying a vastly improved brand of football over that of their inaugural bow with Genoa last week, the Little Giants pushed over a touchdown in each of the last three quarters for the victory.

Although guilty of fewer miscues than against Genoa, the Rossmen still have much to accomplish both offensively and defensively if they are to continue at an unbeaten pace.

Rice cracked the scoring ice after a scoreless first quarter when he broke through a gaping hole in the Calvert forward wall from the two yard marker, making the count 6-0 at halftime.

Fremont boosted its margin to 13-0 midway in the third period as Pete Fox faded back to his 15 yard line, and running with the ball, unloaded a heave to the waiting arms of Joe Lewis who stepped over the payoff stripe. A place kick by Rice was good for the additional point.

Calvert Gets Score
Calvert came right back with a steady drive down the field a few minutes later that netted its only touchdown. Marinis, ace passer of the team, flipping the ball 15 yards to Sertell across the goal line. Sertell also hit the line for the extra point.

A few minutes before the conflict ended the Fremonters tallied again after Mornie White intercepted a pass from Marinis on the Tiffin 25.

Line plunges carried the pigskin to the one yard stripe from where Rice went off tackle for the final touchdown, his attempt at a place kick failing.

First downs and yards gained from scrimmage show a huge superiority on the part of the boys of Conch Oldfather. Fremont chalked up 12 first downs to five and gained 179 yards from scrimmage to 20.

Calvert Pass Minded
Calvert's passing attack was as dead as predicted in advance with the Fremont team presenting little in the way of a defense for the aerial game. Calvert tried 13 passes and completed seven for a total of 71 yards as compared to seven Fremont attempted with two completed for 40 yards.

Had the Fremont offense been clicking with more regularity, the margin of victory would have been even greater, for numerous scoring opportunities were presented the locals.

Early in the game the Little Giants knocked at the touchdown gates when Fox kicked out on the Tiffin 11. Then Fox intercepted Sertell's pass on the invaders' 15 and the fans were all set for a score.

But Rice and Fox could account for only six yards in three tries and on the last down a pass from Fox to Balsizer was incomplete, ending the threat.

Fox, Lewis Lead Locals To Fifth Straight Win Before Crowd of 3,800

Running up their highest point total of the season by demonstrating a puissant and alert attack, the Little Giants of Fremont Ross high school added another chapter to their football history Friday night with a 26-0 dedication victory over Tiffin Columbian at Harmon field stadium.

With a near capacity crowd of 3,800 fans, including many old-timers, cheering them onward, the undefeated Ross pigskinners marauded consistently in Tiffin territory to record their fifth straight victory and their second in Buckeye league competition.

The victory also was the fourth in as many years for Fremont over Columbian and also the fourth straight year in which the Tiffinites have gone scoreless against the locals.

From all sides came panegyrics lauding the Little Giants for their best football of the season which was featured by spectacular end sweeps and vicious stabs through the line.

To single out any one player as the outstanding man of the game is extremely difficult, all the Little Giants rising to the occasion to make the dedication of their \$35,000 stadium a memorable and long remembered event.

Fox, Lewis Score
Scoring honors of the game, however, were shared by the nimble footed negro halfback, Joe Lewis, who registered two touchdowns, and Pete Fox, halfback, who accounted for the other pair.

Not to be overlooked though were Mernie White, quarterback, and Fred Rice, fullback. Rice played by far his best game of the season and accounted for both extra points of the Fremonters with a place kick and line plunge. White stood out with his leadership of the team and his clever return of punts.

The entire line performed in fine fashion with Charley Wolfe, center and acting captain, and Bob Shanahan, rugged guard, doing the bulk of the work.

Wolfe, especially, was a constant thorn in the path of the Columbian gridders, intercepting passes and throwing backs for sizeable losses.

The game was only four minutes old when Fremont drew first blood, a penalty against Tiffin for unnecessary roughness taking the ball to the one yard line where Lewis rammed left tackle for a touchdown and Rice placekicked for the conversion.

The Little Giants ran their total to 13-0 in the second quarter after a 46 yard march down the field was culminated with Fox sweeping wide around right end for a touchdown, only two minutes remaining before the intermission.

Two touchdowns in the third stanza finished the rout of the Tiffinites. Midway in the quarter White returned a punt 15 yards to the Tiffin 36, and Fox on the next play broke loose on a cutback off tackle for a touchdown on a perfectly executed play.

Vogt Intercepts Pass
A minute before the third episode ended Norman Vogt intercepted a pass on the Tiffin 45, paving the way for the final score.

On the following play Lewis reeled off the 45 yards for a touchdown, setting free around right end and scampering down the sidelines for the score.

Statistics of the game show a decided advantage for Coach Bob Olfather's boys who marked up 10 first downs to six and gained 113 yards from scrimmage to 44. Fremont intercepted five passes to one for Tiffin and completed four out of nine aerials to two out of 13 for the invaders.

Some well aimed punts off the bootery of Fox also played a major role in the local victory. Pete Invariety set the Tiffinites far back in their territory with boots that bounded out in the coffin corners.

Fox kicked out on the Tiffin one yard line in the opening session and twice in the second quarter he placed his boots out on the Tiffin six. In the third period one of his kicks bounded out on the 13.

Tiffin Threatens Little
Only once during the first half did Tiffin venture into Fremont territory and then not for long or far, two passes taking the ball to the Fremont 37 where another aerial was intercepted by Rice at the half thwarted the threat.

The closest Tiffin came to Fremont's goal line was near the start of the fourth when the ball was advanced to the 21, Wolfe intercepting a wayward flip to half the Tiffin team.

Fremont started its parade toward Tiffin's goal early in the game when Lewis rambled around left end for 18 yards and a first down on the Columbian 33. The Little Giants were forced to punt, but Harold Shiley, the receiver, fumbled and Mead recovered for Fremont on the Tiffin 24.

Injuries Hurt Rossmen For Future Tilts With Norwalk and Sandusky

Their hopes for an unbeaten season dashed by a rough and bruising hand of Red Raiders from Elyria here Saturday afternoon by a score of 13-6, the Little Giants of Fremont Ross, beset by injuries and misfortunes, set about Monday in preparation for their two remaining contests of the 1936 grid chase.

Next two games will find Fremont playing on alien soil, meeting Norwalk at the Maple City Saturday afternoon and closing the campaign on Thanksgiving day with the traditional battle at Sandusky.

Norwalk, with only a mediocre season, shouldn't prove any too tough for the Little Giants, but like Elyria, the underrated Norwalk eleven may rise to the occasion and bring further destruction to the Rossmen.

Fremont fans still were puzzling today over the complete collapse of the Little Giants against Elyria, for there is no denying that Fremont performed at its poorest of the season in what can easily be called a most desultory exhibition of football by both sides.

While Fremont looked exceedingly bad in defeat, the victorious Elyria combine was little better. Elyria displayed nothing about which to rave as the Red Raider backs were slow in hitting the line, their passes ineffective, their punting poor, and their aerial defense feeble.

Elyria Gets Breaks

But it must be admitted that the biggest share of the breaks went to Elyria, and proved a deciding factor in the result. Elyria capitalized on these breaks and by employing a rough, slugging brand of football gained the distinction of being the first to top the Fremonters.

Fremont was placed at a decided disadvantage at the start, presenting a crippled forward wall that weakened under continual pounding by the heavy Elyria backs. Besides that the backfielders lacked their zip and finesse which had been predominant in gaining six victories and a 7-7 tie with Toledo Scott.

The starting lineup found three shifts on the line. Bob Shanahan moved over from left guard to right end in place of Glenn Balster who is still out with an injury received at Bucyrus. Bob Ahner played at right tackle instead of Al Silberman who rode the bench with a chest injury, while Koebel played at Shanahan's guard.

Oxley Ejected

Then to make matters worse, Garver Oxley, Fremont's right guard, was ejected from the game in the second quarter when the officials claimed he slugged an Elyria passer. This left the entire right side of Fremont's line changed from previous games.

Elyria slipped over both of its touchdowns in the second quarter, the first coming after Elyria had been given the ball on the Fremont 30 when Oxley was ejected and a 30 yard penalty, half the distance to the goal, meted out to the Rossmen for unnecessary roughness.

On this play when the penalty resulted Mermie White intercepted a pass from Ben Pfaff on his 30 and returned to the Fremont 40, but officials did not allow the interception and Elyria marched in short order to a touchdown.

A pass from Pfaff to Hatt was good for a first down on the Fremont 18 and Pfaff hit the right side of Fremont's line for seven more yards in two tries.

Pfaff Gets Score

Then Pfaff dropped back as if to lose another pass, but finding no one in the clear, he changed his mind and ran around the weak side of Fremont's line down the sidelines and over the payoff stripe. His placekick for the added counter failed.

Three minutes remained in the first half when Elyria scored again. Pete Fox punted out on the Elyria 35 and on the next play Pfaff broke loose around the weak side of the Fremont line to gallop 44 yards before being nailed on the Ross 21. Bill Rucker hit the weak side for a first down on the Fremont nine and Chak in two plunges toted the ball one yard from the goal line. Chak punctured center for the score, Pfaff's placekick being good for the point.

Twenty-two games, eight in the Ohio conference, two in the Buckeye, one in the Big Ten, and 10 against out-of-state foes, make up the slate, which finds the leaders in the conferences pitted against each other.

Western Reserve, Ohio's lone unbeaten team, seeks its ninth win of the season, but faces stern opposition in West Virginia university.

Akron Meets B-W

The drama-packed Ohio league race has three classics on tap. In the headliner the Akron Zippers, out in front with five straight wins, meet Baldwin-Wallace, 1935 champion, which is unbeaten in two conference starts. Marietta, winner of three in a row, tackles the strong Muskingum team, which has won six out of seven to cling to the fourth spot, ready to step into the lead if the top-notchers falter. Wittenberg and Case, each beaten once, tangle at Springfield.

Thus, with six of the seven leaders opposing each other, the conference is due for plenty of changes next week-end. Mt. Union, the other team of the first seven, takes on Adrian, Mich.

Marshall Plays Miami

In the Buckeye loop more thrills are expected, as Marshall and Miami battle to see which drops out of the title fight. The two teams are tied with Ohio university in the upper berth. Ohio Wesleyan, already out of the scrap for the Crown, takes on the Bobcats from Athens.

Cincinnati takes a trip to Madison, Wis., to meet the Badgers, while Dayton, the other Buckeye club, entertains John Carroll, in non-loop contests.

The other Ohio conference affairs are Oberlin at Denison, Ohio Northern at Bowling Green, Toledo at Heidelberg, Otterbein at Capital, and Ashland at Kent State.

Bucks at Illinois

Ohio State, back in the victory column after beating Chicago Saturday, meets Bob Zippke's wily Illini at Champaign this week. Zippke and Coach Francis A. Schmidt have broken even in their two meetings, Illinois winning 14-13, two years ago, and Ohio taking a 6 to 0 verdict last season as Illinois' "Tippy" Dye raved a punt return back over the goal line.

Other Saturday games are: Rio started a 44 yard drive down the field.

Fox returned a punt to his 36 and line plays maneuvered the pigskin to the Fremont 44. Fox passed to White for a first down on the Elyria 47, and Lewis added another first down with a 14 yard romp around right end to the Elyria 33.

Unjust Criticism

It is high time that criticism of the Little Giants for their initial defeat of the season last Saturday is tossed into the ash heap and attention focused on rallying them for victories in the two remaining games with Norwalk Saturday and Sandusky on Thanksgiving day.

The same fan who never utters a word while a team is piling up victories, are always the first to howl after a defeat. Since the Saturday debacle we have heard some derogatory mutterings against the coaching ability of Bob Oldfather and various forms of criticism aimed at members of the team.

All this has a tendency to lower the morale of a team that already is troubled enough with injuries and misfortunes. What the Little Giants and Oldfather need more than anything else right now are words of encouragement to carry them unbeaten through the remainder of the 1936 schedule.

All hope is not lost despite the fact Al Silberman and Pete Fox will be out of the lineup Saturday. Against Norwalk the opportunity will be presented for the other regulars to play over their heads and for reserves to grab themselves a share of glory to atone for the setback by Elyria.

We have no patience whatsoever with fans who find fault with the coaching of Oldfather. When one considers the conditions under which Oldfather has labored this year with a paucity of lettermen and a youthful team whose average age was 16 we think the Ross high mentor has done remarkably well.

He only had five lettermen as a nucleus for the squad and when practice started in September season prospects were at a low ebb to say the least.

Then, too, Fremont with an eleven that averages about 150 pounds, has been outweighed in practically every contest.

But fans seldom take into consideration all these obstacles under which a coach operates. They don't stop to compare ages, weights, lettermen, experience and the like of the Rossmen with opponents. Instead when the Fremonters fail to perform up to standard, Oldfather is subjected to unjust criticism.

This year, more than ever, we believe Oldfather has proven his ability as a coach. Although 19 lettermen from the outstanding 1935 combine were lost by graduation, he has whipped together a scrappy outfit that has lost but one out of eight frays.

Oldfather's record in the eight years he has been at the helm here speaks for itself. His football teams have won 53 games, tied five and lost 16. In 1930 the Little Giants tied Sandusky for the Little Big Seven championship and this year they are undefeated in the Buckeye league, the game with Sandusky to decide the title.

ROSSMEN GUN FOR SEVENTH GRID VICTORY

Lewis, Spangler Punch Over Scores as Little Giants Annex Seventh

With their field general and ace ball carrier, Pete Fox, looking on from the sidelines, the Little Giants of Fremont high school chalked up their much sought seventh grid victory of the season Saturday afternoon by 13-0 over a weak Norwalk eleven at the Maple City.

The game marked the next to last of the season for the Little Giants who Monday start serious preparations for the titanic struggle on Thanksgiving day with Sandusky.

Without Fox and also minus Al Silberman on the line, the Fremont backfield failed to click with its usual effectiveness and it is safe to say that if Fox had been in the lineup the score might have been doubled.

As it was the Little Giants were within the Norwalk 20-yard line on six other occasions when scoring opportunities were presented, but each time something went haywire to prevent a touchdown.

Spangler Scores First

Jim Spangler, showing some shifty running in filling Fox's shoes, brought Fremont its initial tally near the windup of the first half.

Fremont started its scoring advance from the Norwalk 31 after recovering a free ball. Joe Lewis raced around left end for nine yards and Fred Rice made it first down on the Norwalk 15. Mernie White added one yard but Lewis lost one on the next play. A pass play from Rice to White to Spangler accounted for a first down on the Norwalk five.

Fremont was penalized five yards for offside. Spangler negotiated one through the line and Rice added three more. Spangler getting into the clear off right tackle for six yards and the score. Spangler's attempted pass for the extra point was incomplete.

Score in Fourth

It was not until the first two minutes of the fourth quarter that the Little Giants scored again.

Late in the third period Norwalk was backed up to its four-yard line and Amato's kick was returned 18 yards by White to the Norwalk 12.

Lewis lost one and then was pulled for a five-yard loss. Spangler drove to the 11-yard line, but a pass from Lewis to Spangler went wild over the goal. Norwalk taking the ball on downs on its 20. Norwalk then uncorked a peculiar aerial in which Norman Call passed to McKnight, who ran backwards and was downed on his two-yard marker. Amato was forced to punt from behind his goal to White who returned the leather to the Norwalk 25.

Lewis Runs 15 Yards

Lewis reeled off six yards around right end, but Spangler lost a yard. Lewis again was given the ball for an end sweep which brought the final touchdown on a run of 15 yards. Rice's place kick for the additional point was good.

Three times after that Fremont intercepted passes within scoring territory only to fall short on what might have been touchdowns.

Lewis intercepted one of Amato's heaves on his 45 and returned it 35 yards to the Norwalk 20. However, three line plunges failed and a pass from Rice to Vogt was incomplete. Norwalk regaining the pigskin on downs.

Wolfe Scores Pass

With four minutes to go, Charley Wolfe snaggled a wayward Norwalk aerial and carried it back to the Maple City 28. Spangler picked up four and Lewis 11, giving the Little Giants a first down on the Norwalk 11. Rice plowed to the six-yard line but instead of continuing to crack the line, Rice decided to pass and it was incomplete.

Then Spangler fumbled and Bernard recovered for Norwalk on its nine to end the scoring threat. A fumble again proved costly to Fremont when Rice after snaring a Norwalk aerial, fumbled 13 yards from the goal line.

Norwalk was pushed back to its goal line in the final minute on another freakish forward pass play from Amato to Call, which the latter teled in the wrong direction, being stopped one foot from the goal by Vogt.

Stop Scoring Threats

A 25-yard run by Lewis in the second quarter gave Fremont the first down on the Norwalk 20 only to no avail as the Maple City gridgers held for downs.

Still another chance to score came in the early part of the first quarter when Rice recovered a fumble on the Norwalk 23. The threat was short-lived as Lewis lost 10 yards and Call intercepted a pass from Lewis on the Norwalk 28.

In first downs Fremont had a 2-1 edge over Norwalk, getting six in the first half and four in the second while Norwalk collected five in the four quarters.

Norwalk presented little in the way of a running attack, but Amato's passes were a constant threat, and Thomas, fullback, broke through the Fremont line to spill backs for many a loss.

FOX MAY NOT START ANNUAL TURKEY CLASH

Streaks Seeking Fourth
Straight Title For
Buckeye Loop

There is no other way of looking at it than to give the highly touted Sandusky Blue Streaks the favored rating over Fremont's Little Giants for their annual Thanksgiving day imbroglio before a sellout crowd at Sandusky Thursday afternoon in Strobel field stadium.

Not since 1925 has a Fremont eleven been successful in conquering the neighboring Blue Streaks and hopes for accomplishing the trick are none too rosy this year as the time draws near for the titanic tussle.

A few weeks back when the Rossman were traveling at an undefeated pace, improving week by week, and Sandusky was none too impressive and torn by dissension, there was every reason to believe the Little Giants would subdue the Blue Streaks or at least hold their own.

But what a change several weeks have made. Fremont rose to its peak of the season in holding a powerful Toledo Scott combine to a 7-7 tie and since then has declined in power, losing to Elyria, 13-6, and beating a weak Norwalk team only 13-0.

Sandusky on the other hand has turned an about face and ran up its highest score of the season in routing Findlay, 46-6, in its last start, Fremont beating Findlay but 12-0.

Fox In Hospital

Biggest worry in the camp of the Little Giants is whether or not Pete Fox, field general and ace halfback, will be able to convalesce in time to lead Fremont against Sandusky.

Fox today appeared a doubtful starter for the Turkey day conflict, and even if he does recover, Pete will not be in the best of shape since spending so much time in a hospital bed.

Fox still was confined to Community hospital Monday under the care of his father essaying to shake off an attack of pleurisy which set in last Friday.

Provided Fox is unable to start against Sandusky, Coach Bob Oldfather will put either Leland Erchenbrecher or Jim Spangler at the halfback position. Remainder of the lineup will be the same as in other games of the Little Giants unless some unexpected injuries arise.

Oldfather is planning only light workouts in the three remaining days of practice before the biggest game of the year for the Little Giants.

Sandusky, beaten only by Toledo Waite, 14-7, will be going after its third undisputed Buckeye league football title in succession and the fourth conference championship out of as many years, the Blue Streaks copping the Little Big Seven league honors back in 1933.

In 1930 the first team coached by Bob Whittaker shared the pennant with Fremont and the next year was undisputed claimant. Sandusky was runnerup to Tiffin Columbian in 1932, the Burkett coached clan edging the Streaks, 7-6.

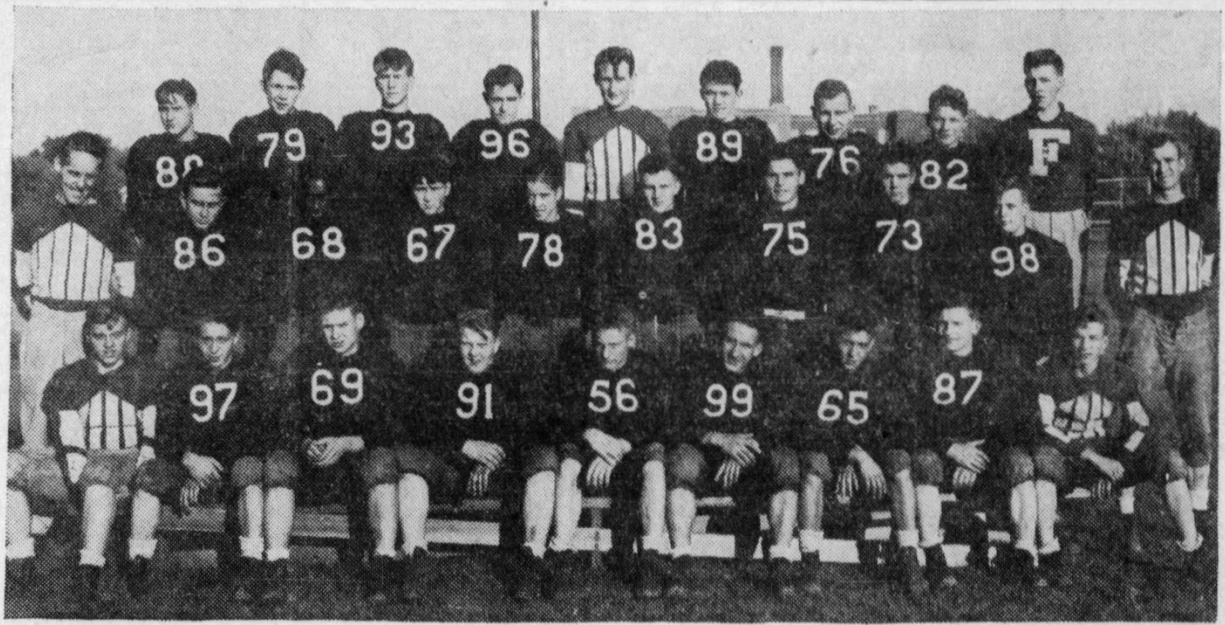
Three Vets for Streaks

Whittaker has fashioned his 1936 edition of the Blue Streaks around three veterans of the undefeated 1935 team. Whereas the 1935 footballers employed a lot of deception, the 1936 Sandusky outfit resorts more to a power attack and as a result its scoring total has been greatly reduced.

Three mainstays of last year's undefeated regiment are Oscar Lavine, end, who has been converted into quarterback; Charles Pressler, fullback; and Charles Maag, giant, 210 pound tackle and captain.

Other starters will be Roy Gant, brother of the famous London, at left end; Ed Bruckner, left guard; Red Heinz, center; Merlin Lamb, right guard; Howard May, right tackle; Wilbur Wesnitzer, right end; and Harold Krause and Albert Ohlmanacher, halfbacks. Of these all but Gant and Heinz will be lost by graduation.

When the Purple and White started cavorting in the daylight, disaster set in, the team losing its first November game to Elyria, 13-6, looking none too impressive the second Saturday afternoon in November in beating Norwalk, 13-0, and winding up with a 13-6 loss to Sandusky on Thanksgiving.

Oldfather admits Fremont was somewhat in error in not scheduling the Elyria conflict for night, but at the time it was booked, high school officials here feared unfavorable weather would set in by November and attendance would slump.

Next season the Little Giants will play all September and October games under lights and also the first November battle, leaving only the traditional Sandusky ruckus on Thanksgiving and a game the second week in November to be contested under the sun's rays.

Grid Statistics

Warren Weiler, agriculture teacher and chief statistician for the Little Giants, tells this department that the Purple and White used 56 different plays in 10 games the past season.

Weiler, who charted each game, says one play was used 74 times and averaged 3.4 yards each attempt. Another favorite play was tried 38 times with a net gain of 6.5 yards for each attempt.

The Little Giants fell short by 456 feet or totaling a mile in ground gained from scrimmage. Weiler's figures reveal the Ross-men outgained their foes 1,608 yards or 4,824 feet to 607 yards or 1,821 feet. In gaining this ground 492 plays were used, while opponents used 385 plays.

In kicking the Fremonters averaged a half yard better than their opponents with 29 yards to 28.5 yards. Total yardage on punts was 1,914 yards or 5,742 feet, which is 462 feet better than a mile. Yardage of opponents on kicks was 2,982.

Fremont was forced to punt 80 times while opposing teams kicked 97 times. Fremont's average per punt probably would have been much higher had it not been for the fact that numerous times the punts were aimed out of bounds near the goal line in enemy territory.

Penalties found 451 yards chalked up against the Ross-men to 209 yards in penalties for opponents.

Fremont led in first downs with 75 to 43 registered by the 10 teams it played.
