

Little Giants need to make a pitch

Fremont Ross coach Dan Fought wants to find out which of his eight pitchers wants the baseball — really wants it.

"I can throw eight guys, but I'm looking for four tough peanuts out there," Fought said Friday night after the Little Giants finished an intrasquad game. "If three of them come through out of those eight, I think

we're awful tough to beat."

The Little Giants compiled a 13-12 record last year, including 8-4 in the Great Lakes League, with a team full of juniors.

Although graduation losses included top hitter Ryan Wagner (.429), top pitcher Shane Moran (4-4, 1.53 ERA, 4 saves), top run-producer Kyle Kusmer (21 RBI)

and the guts of the defense — second baseman Gary Rakes and center fielder Brian Reinbolt, Fought said the Little Giants should be better.

"We're better defensively," he said. "We have better speed than last year; we have better offense from last year from the way I look at potential."

The biggest question: "Have we replaced the ace," Fought said. "Moran was a bulldog."

Left-hander Eric Brough won six of his eight decisions, including a no-hitter against Napoleon, and had a 1.97 ERA last year. Bryan Coonrod (2-2, 2.95) averaged more than a strikeout per inning.

Nick Jurski holds down the No. 3 spot, Matt Fox (0-3, 4.85) is battling Alex Pate and Eric Mullholand for the fourth spot.

"I think overall we're going to be a better club than last year if

the pitching is as good as what it should be," Fought said. "Brough had a good season last year; he should be better...should be.

"Jurski had a nice season at the JV level; he should be a lot better for us. Coonrod had an outstanding summer for the legion team and pitched 19 strong innings for us last spring; he should have a wonderful season."

Fought will build the lineup around catcher Bucky Byers (.286, 15 RBI). He's expecting more from third baseman Tim Rakes (.244) and Ryan Shively (.180).

"Tim Rakes and Ryan Shively have played since they were sophomores. Now it's there time to shine," Fought said. "Bucky Byers is ready to be primed. Those are three leaders I'm looking for with the stick right off the bat."

Rob Stotz can build on his .297 average as the regular second baseman.

Utility infielder Sam Root and right fielder Derek Thiessen both batted over .400 for the junior varsity a year ago, and shortstop Terry Cisco batted over .350 for the reserves.

"Those are three bats that I've got in the lineup this year, as far as expectations, that I didn't have last year," Fought said.

Cisco also helps stabilize the defense. He's a natural shortstop; Kusmer was converted there last year.

Graham Hogan (.207) is the left fielder, with Travis Johnson in center and Jeremy Haslinger as a backup in the outfield.

The 1996 edition of the Little Giants doesn't have as much depth as past Ross teams. With Thiessen and Jurski also able to pitch, however, the pitching staff is deep.

"Which is where I want to be deep anyway," Fought said.

Ross opens the season Monday at Tiffin Columbian.

Jeff Hall pitched a complete game, scattering nine hits with two strikeouts and two walks.

Hall, who had the Little Giants hitting off their front foot, had seven assists and a putout.

"He changes speeds very well," Coach Hall said. "He throws the curve, a changeup and the knuckleball."

Hall got all the runs he needed in the second. A two-run double by Scott Mullins capped the inning, but it was helped by Ross errors on three successive plays and two hit batters by starter

and loser Nick Jurski.

Jurski struck out five, walked two and hit four batters before Derek Thiessen took over with one out in the sixth.

"I hate throwing the ball away, and I hate when we're not smart on the hill," Fought said. "We're not a smart baseball team yet."

Or a patient one.

Ross took a 2-1 lead after one inning and scored three in the third to make a loser of Chris Crum.


Shane Ruthsatz had two of Margaretta's six hits.

Six-run second, seven-run fourth provide runs for Ross

The biggest concern for a coach after a team puts together a big inning early in a game is that the players become content.

"I worry about them relaxing," Fremont Ross coach Dan Fought said after the Little Giants added a seven-run fourth inning to a six-run second in a 13-2 non-league victory over Port Clinton Thursday at Alumni Field.

"The second thing is I worry about them staying focused. When you have a lead, that's the time to settle down and think more what you want to do with the baseball."

Ross (2-2) collected nine hits, including two by Bucky Byers and Ryan Shively, and was aided

by nine walks and five Port Clinton errors.

"Situational defense is our biggest problem," Port Clinton coach Dan Timmons said. "We have to keep practicing."

The Little Giants kept the pressure on, striking out just five times.

"A lot of our guys are picking up confidence at the plate," Fought said.

Ross also made just two errors — both in the fourth inning by Derek Thiessen, who was playing on a badly bruised toe.

"The infield is getting more settled," Fought said. "They know what they're doing and are attacking the ball."

Three Ross pitchers combined for the win. Alex Pate started and pitched four

innings for the victory. Matt Fox worked two innings in relief and Eric Mullholland finished.

"I was happy with the way Pate competed," Fought said. "Fox threw as hard as he has this spring, and the word I got from Port Clinton was that the curveball was hard to pick up. When things were decided, I wanted to get Mullholland some work."

Pate allowed three hits, including a double by Steve Laird, walked two and hit a batter with three strikeouts. Fox struck out the side in the

sixth, and Mullholland struck out the side in the seventh.

Port Clinton (1-3) got good relief work from Tony Greear, who slowed down Ross after taking over for starter Dave Reichman.

"I didn't expect to get much out of Tony, but we had to use him because of the people we were missing (because of senior trips)," Timmons said.

The Redskins scored single runs in the third and fourth to make it 6-2 before Ross broke it open by sending 13 men to the plate in the bottom of the fourth.

"We kept trying the stuff that we hope will work offensively," Timmons said. "I'm still trying to put pressure on them offensively."

So was Ross.

Ross batters take cue from weather for win

Oregon Clay found out it could not push Mother Nature around. When the Eagles tried, the ole girl teamed up with Fremont Ross and produced an 11-9 Great Lakes League baseball win for the Little Giants.

The win was the third straight for Ross, raising its record to 3-2 and 1-1 in the GLL race. Clay slipped to 6-2 and fell to 1-2 in league play.

"I think they tried to put the rush job on it to get the game in," Ross coach Dan Fought said. "All of a sudden they went away from the way they were playing to try to get the game in."

The game would have had to go at least five innings to be a complete game.

Clay coach Richard Kandik did

not blame Mother Nature for the change in his team.

"I think once we took that break," Kandik said, "I think we lost our concentration and Fremont came out hitting the ball. Plus our pitchers could not get the ball over the plate and that was the game."

Ross came up with three runs in its fifth after the break and ran off seven more in the sixth for an 11-5 lead. Clay pitchers issued six walks in the two innings.

The bottom of the batting order keyed the Ross resurgence.

Sixth-batter Travis Johnson tripled and doubled in the sixth as 11 Little Giants batted. Sev-

enth batter Terry Cisco singled in a sixth-inning run and Ryan Shively, batting eighth, singled in a run in the fifth and doubled in another in the sixth. Ninth hitter Graham Hogan walked in both innings with all three of the last three hitters in the Ross lineup scoring two runs apiece. Johnson drove in two runs.

Bucky Byers drove in three runs for the Little Giants.

Clay did not go easily, scoring four runs with two outs in the seventh, but the Eagles' early tussle with Mother Nature had taken its toll.

Root's infield hit in the first was the only other hit allowed by Speegle, who walked four and struck out three.

Whitmer, which committed three of its four errors in the second, collected 13 hits.

"We haven't been hitting as you would expect coming into the season," Rose said. "Until today, we've only had a few guys who have been consistent."

Little Giant seniors have differing styles

There's one player who's always chattering in the Fremont Ross dugout. There's another who doesn't say much at all.

The contrast is stark, but there's no mistaking that Bucky Byers and Tim Rakes serve the dual role of leader for the Little Giants.

Byers, the talkative one, and Rakes, the quiet one, have helped Ross rebound from an 0-2 start to win six of nine games entering this week.

With a lot on the minds of all 16-, 17- and 18-year-old boys during the spring, leadership is important for successful high school baseball.

"It's important for us because we're not a powerhouse team,"

said Byers, a senior catcher. "In order for us to win, we have to be real emotional for seven innings."

Byers says he talks to keep himself loose as much as he does to keep his teammates focused.

"(Leadership) has always been natural for me," he said. "The last two years I wasn't too vocal because it's always been a senior role."

Rakes, a senior third baseman, learned that way as well.

"Since I was a sophomore, I learned from the seniors," he said. "I don't say much, but I learned that they didn't quite get the job done."

Talk doesn't mean much if you don't produce on the field. Both Byers and Rakes are producing.

Entering this week, Byers was batting .406 (13-for-32) with a home run and four doubles. He's driven in 16 runs and scored 15. Rakes was hitting .353 (12-for-34) with three doubles. He's scored 14 times and has 14 RBIs.

"(Rakes) is my favorite type of player because I like a kid that hustles and shows enthusiasm on a daily basis," Ross coach Dan Fought said. "You don't have to push Tim Rakes. He's self-motivated."

"Bucky Byers is another kid that fits in that category."

Byers has eclipsed his 1995 RBI total by one already, and Rakes has one more hit than he had all of last season.

"Last year, we didn't have a

lot of guys who got on base a lot," Byers said. "This year, our first three guys are on constantly. When I get up, there's always somebody in scoring position."

Rakes follows Derek Thiessen and Sam Root in the batting order in front of Byers.

"I'm real comfortable with Derek and Sammy because they're both good

hitters," Rakes said. "There's no pressure on me whatsoever."

The steady play of Rakes at third base has helped solidify the Ross infield. Byers is in his third year behind the plate.

"Their leadership has been a big plus in turning things around from games one and two (losses to Sylvania Northview and Perrysburg)," Fought said. "They have totally taken charge of this ballclub."

Little Giants rarely threaten in loss to Northview

Hitting slumps are strange. Frustrations go up as batting averages go down.

The Fremont Ross Little Giants are at that point after Aaron Thrush and Sylvania Northview beat them 5-2 Tuesday at Alumni Field.
