## Second Stringers Finish Game After Carroll Paces Varsity To 39 To 16 Lead

Play Brilliantly In First District Tourney Game; Meet Norwalk, Winner Over Shelby, Saturday; Ashland Wins

Ross high's tournament hopes sky-rocketed Friday night, pushed upward by an unexpectedly easy victory over Port Clinton by the one-sided score of 51 to 21, in the opening round of the Class A play-off.

With a state tourney berth dangling as the lure, the Little Giants exploded all over the court with the opening whistle and, paced by Capt. Jack Carroll were so far out in front at the half that Coach Eddie Gabel sent in an entire second team shortly after the third stanza opened and they finished out the game.

It was one of the sweetest exhibitions the Little Giants have flashed in many a week and took the large following of Fremont fans back to the early days of the 1941 campaign when the Purple was riding high, wide and handsome over all opposition.

Although expected to win, the Gabel-men were also expected to meet more opposition from Coach Norm Sayen's charges and the ease with which they broke down the floor to score, as well as their tight zone defense, should have placed them on a par, in the advance picking, with Tiffin Columbian as the lower bracket favorite.

In the other opening round game, Ashland overwhelmed a surprisingly weak Junior Order five, 49 to 28, and Norwalk struggled through to a 42 to 35 decision over Shelby.

**Play Norwalk Next**  
As a result of the outcome of the game, Fremont will tangle with Norwalk at 8:30 p. m. Saturday, the winner to meet the victor of the Columbian-Manassett tilt in the semi-finals next week.

Coach Eddie Gabel's crew was away to a fast start and after Chuck Thompson had opened the scoring with a basket for Port Clinton, ran up 10 points before Thompson again came through with one of two charity tosses. Ross then scored five more points in a row before Thompson again led the foul line and dropped in two tosses and finished in front 15 to 5 at the quarter.

Capt. Jack Carroll was largely responsible for the initial burst of scoring, tallying nine points on four action heaves and a free throw, but his teammates played an excellent floor game to make his scoring opportunities possible.

The second period was a repetition of the first, and early in the game it was evident that the Little Giants were in unless the roof fell down. They added 17 points to their total in the second half, Carroll netting six, Bob Hall five, Snooka Jenkins four and Bob Rufford the other two. The best the Porters could do was eight points to trail 32 to 13 at the rest period.

**Uses Second Team**  
Coach Gabel had run in a sub or two during the second period and shortly after the third opened sent in an entire new team of Dave Brockesieker, Glenn Bingham, Dick Frantz, Ed Fox and Eddie Myliniski. The score was 39 to 16 when this combine took the floor and when the tilt was over, they had outscored their opponents, 12 to 5.

Aside from the blazing floor game and excellent shooting form the Little Giants displayed Friday night, their accuracy from the foul line was also something to mention.

The Fremonters had 21 charity tosses and cashed in on 15 of them, dropping eight in a row through the meshes before Jenkins missed out. Both Carroll and Dale Bowles had perfect marks of four and three, respectively.

Capt. Carroll paced the winners with 14 points on six action shots and a quartet of fouls, with Bob Hall in the runner-up spot with nine points. Of the 10 men who saw action, all but Ed Fox cracked the scoring column.

Fremont was favored to win but not by such a lop-sided margin and the thing that pleased their mentor was that he was able to rest his varsity and give them nothing more than a good workout. This should add immeasurably to their chances against Norwalk Saturday night, the same team that snapped their first winning streak by a 46-44 margin during the regular season.

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## NORWALK TOPS SHELBY BY 42-35

Tangle With Fremont In Quarter-Finals Of 'A' Tourney Tonight

If Fremont's Little Giants nurse any hopes of revenge for a 46 to 44 defeat suffered at the hands of Norwalk early in the past season, a defeat that marred an otherwise perfect record up to that time, they will have an opportunity to even scores when it hits the most, Saturday night.

The Maple Leafs got past their first round opponent, Shelby, in the district tournament Friday night and tangle with the Little Giants in the third game of the quarter-finals tonight. The score was 42 to 35, but most of the way the game wasn't that close.

Shelby had difficulty the entire first half and could not locate the basket and were down 10 to 6 at the quarter and 28 to 14 at the half. They managed to score on even terms with the Leafs in the third period and then closed with a rush that had Coach Cal Pfeiffer and his club plenty worried. After trailing by 12 points most of the way, they suddenly came to life and crept to within five points of the leaders at one time.

The quarter wasn't long enough, however, and although they outscored Norwalk, 12 to seven, their early deficit was too much to overcome. The Leafs loom as a plenty tough opponent, especially when Stevenson is in the lineup, and the Little Giants have their work cut out for them.

In the third first round game Ashland had an easy time with Junior Order, winning 49 to 29, leading by a wide margin all the way.

# Come From Behind With 14 Point Final Period Spurt; Mansfield Comes Next

Rossmen Are Seven Points Behind When Carroll, Jenkins And Hall Pop In Four Baskets To Erase Deficit; Former Now Has 31 Points In 2 Games

Uncorking a 14-point rally in the final period, Ross high's Little Giants nosed out Norwalk, 38 to 35, in the quarter-finals of the district Class A tournament in Sandusky Saturday night and will enter the semi-final round next Friday at least an even favorite with Mansfield, who will be the opponent.

As the field narrowed down, Willard, Ashland and Mansfield remained along with Fremont, to battle for the lone state tournament berth. Other games Saturday night saw Willard down Sandusky, 39 to 26; Ashland topple a favored Bellevue five, 23 to 20, and Mansfield win over an equally favored Tiffin Columbian crew, 32 to 29.

Aside from the Fremont-Mansfield game, Willard and Ashland will also tangle Friday to determine the upper bracket finalist.

The Saturday night victory not only advanced the Little Giants to within sight of the coveted district crown, but also gave them ample revenge for a 46 to 44 defeat handed them by the Maple Leafs during the regular season, being the first team to take the Purple.

## Come From Behind

It was a courageous last period fight, made doubly hard because the Little Giants had earlier dissipated a five-point lead, that enabled Coach Eddie Gabel's basket-keepers to take the game.

Trailing 28 to 24 going into the final canto, they saw the Maple Leafs further increase their advantage to seven points, 35 to 28, before they set out to really do or die for the old home town. They did!

There was but three minutes remaining to play when Ryerson pumped in the points that made the score 35 to 28 against the Fremonters, and then things started to happen. Jack Carroll, who had been held to two shots from the court in the first three periods started it off with another two-point and then Snooks Jenkins came through, Carroll again scored and before Norwalk had the chance to tighten, Bob Hall had scored his second basket of the period.

These four baskets with machine-gun-like rapidity gave Fremont a 36 to 35 advantage and the boys set out to hold that lead. For more than a minute they froze the ball until Carroll finally took it near the side and dribbled in to score his fifth basket of the game and ice the victory.

## Carroll Scores 15

The final period spurt climaxed a game that gave the spectators plenty of thrills from start to finish. Cashing in on free throws, the Little Giants took an 11 to 6 lead in the first quarter, only to see it wiped out and trail 18 to 16 at halftime when Stevenson, Martin and Weldemaler each garnered two buckets apiece.

Norwalk further widened the breach in the third period and were out in front, 24 to 16, before Jenkins finally broke the ice for the Purple. The two clubs took turns scoring until the count was 28 to 20, at which point Bob Hufford converted two free throws and Bob Hall avished in a two-pointer to make the scoreboard read 28 to 24. This set the stage for the great closing rally that brought victory with it.

Again it was Capt. Carroll who paced the team in scoring with 15 points, but he received plenty of help from Jenkins and Hall, who accounted for 10 and eight points respectively.

## Mansfield Is Next

If nothing else, the victory branded the Little Giants as a team that isn't defeated until the game is over and, in victory, they again gave evidence of having returned to the form which made them a scourge until the final weeks of the regular season.

How much farther they will go in the current play-offs depends not only on themselves but on Willard, Mansfield, which has played but one game, had a tough time with Columbian, as was to be expected, but flashed a smooth-working, deliberate game which makes them a club to be feared.

In the other semi-final game, it depends on how tough a battle Willard gives the favored Ashland crew. If the latter team can breeze to victory while its final round opponent must out up a mighty battle to top its foe, it will have a distinct advantage in the closing game.

## BELLEVUE OUT OF A TOURNEY

Ashland Dethrones District Champs; Columbian Also Falls

The going got a bit tough over in the class A tourney in Sandusky Saturday night as eight teams battled away to decide which four should continue into the finals and which four should pack away their shorts and shirts until next fall.

Of the four games played, three of them were decided by three-point margins and three of the winners were forced to come from behind in the final period.

Besides Fremont, which defeated Norwalk, 38 to 35, Ashland downed Bellevue, defending champion, 33 to 30, and Mansfield topped Tiffin Columbian 32 to 29. In the opening game Willard had a comparatively easy time defeating Sandusky, 39 to 26, and never trailed at any of the quarter posts.

## Bellevue Dethroned

The defeat must have been bitter to Bellevue as, benefitting from the draw and getting a first round bye, they were considered by all and sundry as virtually a certain semi-finalist if not a finalist. The Redmen started out strongly enough, taking a 9 to 7 lead at the quarter and were still ahead, 16 to 15, at the half. It was a close ball game and Ashland first showed its power in the third period by scoring 14 points to Bellevue's 10 to assume a 29 to 26 lead and then scored on even terms in the last stanza. Center Riser was the winner's big gun with 14 points while Heilman and Barr divided 15 points for the Redmen.

It was a big fourth quarter, in which they scored 12 points, that won for Mansfield over Columbian, which was being favored in the lower bracket and conceded the best chance of sticking around until the Saturday finale.

## Tiffin Eliminated

The Buckeye League champs, who dethroned Fremont, trailed 6 to 2 at the quarter but hit their stride in the second canto and avished in 15 points to finish the half in front, 17 to 14. They stayed there in the third period as well, but the final chapter saw Mansfield outscore their opponents 12 to 7 and there was the ball game.

Shiplet, Mansfield guard, branded himself as a man to watch by pacing both teams with 12 points, while the best that all-league Bob McClory could do was eight points.

The Willard-Sandusky game ran true to form with the Railroaders assuming a slight lead in the first period and adding to it as the game progressed. In every period except the third they outscored their period and after the first three minutes of the tilt there was little doubt of the outcome. Three Willard players, King, Denham and Hurst, accounted for 31 points, King getting 11 and each of the other two 10 apiece.

The defeat closed the most disastrous season in years for the Streaks as they won but three of 15 starts.

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# Hufford Scores Basket That Wins In "Sudden Death" Play; Ashland Is Final Round Foe

Jack Carroll Paces Little Giants To Another Great Victory As Team Comes From Behind In Final Period Once More

I saw Fremont's Little Giants twist the Mansfield Tigers tail over in Sandusky Friday night and take a 31 to 29 victory in the second overtime period. I wouldn't have missed it for a great deal, but I wish someone else had to write an account of the game to meet a Saturday deadline.

Perhaps a Paul Gallico or a Bill Corum could do it justice, but I have neither the words nor the space.

The victory took the Little Giants into the final round of the district Class A tournament where they play Ashland for the title tonight, but had it been nothing but just another game it would still have been one of the greatest battles ever put up by a Fremont court team.

## Fremont Off Form

Briefly, here is what happened. Fremont, trailing all the way, made another one of its great last-period stands, erased a nine point deficit, battled through a scoreless overtime period and then won out in the first 20 seconds of a "sudden death" session.

What happened in the first three periods is unimportant, except that the Little Giants were slightly disorganized, their passing was ragged and shots wouldn't click, and Mansfield's long game of shoot from near the center and then follow up, had them in front all the way.

But what happened in that hysterical last period, and from there until the story-book finish which left half the spectators stunned and the other half delirious with joy was, and is, important.

The score was 27 to 18 in favor of the Tigers, the Little Giants having gradually felt farther and farther behind, when Carl Hufford opened the period with his first basket of the game. But Bob Hall fouled Jack Shiplet and he made good on the throw to wipe out half the gain. The tilt was getting a bit rough, Bruce McGinty already having been harrassed on fouls, and after Dick Franz had bagged one from past the foul circle Dietzel was fouled and missed his shot and the usually reliable Smokey Jenkins missed both ends of a charity shot and things didn't look so good.

## Start To Click

Four minutes remained to play and this knowledge seemed to settle Coach Eddie Gabel's charges down a bit. They started playing more deliberately and making their passes good. Jenkins hoisted in a one-handed heave from some distance and that must have been a signal, for Bowch lifted one in from under the basket and the score was 28 to 26 with 3 1/2 minutes remaining.

Shiplet again committed an infraction, this time on Carroll, and Jack cut the Tigers' lead to one point and then dribbled in and sank the basket that put the Little Giants ahead for the first time in the contest. Several hundred Fremont fans were in the crowd and the gym resembled nothing so much as a mad house at this point—but it got worse.

Shiplet was caught fouling again, this time on Hall, and left the game on four personals. With 46 seconds remaining to play, the Roamers declined the penalty and took the ball out-of-bounds. Good strategy, but this time it didn't work and Mansfield intercepted a pass and started basketward. Jenkins fouled a Mansfield player under their basket and a dozen Tiger rosters swarmed on the floor and started to throw punches. When the young riot was quelled, without damage, the game resumed.

## Two Banned

But it was still rough and in another melee under the Mansfield backboard Dave Bowhus and Krupp, a sub, got into a mix-up and both were ejected from the game. Not more than 10 seconds remained to play and Coach Gabel sent Carl Hufford back in to shoot the free throw. He missed, but Coach Vern Huffman's choice, Joe Altomonte, didn't and the score was knotted at 29 to 29.

Then came the overtime period. Both clubs missed shots that came dangerously close to ending the game and both Dick Franz and Bob Hall shined free throw. It was still tied at 29 to 29 when the three minutes were over and the "sudden death" period started.

Mansfield got the tip from center but a second later lost the ball. A pass went to Carroll, he dribbled in, his shot dipped into the basket—and rolled out as the crowd groaned. But Hufford, who had been branded the goat when he missed the free throw in the regulation time, was on the job and, jumping into the air and timing himself perfectly, laid the ball through the hoop for the points that meant victory.

## Hufford Wins Game

As the ball dropped through the meshes, Hufford faintly had to be carried from the floor.

It was a great victory, made all the more dazzling by the way the Little Giants came back and refused to crack under pressure. Except for the first period, which ended 9 to 6 in Mansfield's favor and saw some great defensive play, the Fremonters were more than a bit off form.

They were still off in the second

and third stanzas, which ended 10 to 10 and 27 to 18 against them, but from there on they clicked. In the first half they recovered more than three or four rebounds off the backboard and their shots just wouldn't drop. How far they were off can easily be told by simply stating they made but five of 16 free throws.

What effect the grueling game will have on their chances Saturday night remains to be seen. Ashland breezed to an easy victory, using the second team part of the time, while the Little Giants were near collapse when they were finished. They may still be tired tonight or they might come back hot. Ashland may be at the top of its form or the easy win over Willard may leave them still cooling.

But regardless of that, the victory over the Tigers will long be remembered. It brought sweet revenge for a one-point defeat suffered at the hands of the same team in an overtime period in the tournament last year. It was a great game and a greater victory. You should have been there.

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# Gruelling Battle Against Mansfield Takes Its Toll In District Finals Saturday

Third Period Spurt Gives Ashland Title And Trip To Columbus; Jenkins Paces Tired Team That Held Own For Three Periods

Ross high's basketball warriors came to the end of their road in Sandusky Saturday night and a tired crew fell before a fresh Ashland quintet by a 40 to 25 score in the finals of the district Class A tournament.

It ended a long, 23-game grind for Coach Eddie Gabel's crew, a grind that started last December and saw six men carry the load the entire campaign. Including tournament play, the Little Giants took the nod in 18 of the tilts.

## Fremont Tired

It was a tired squad of players that took the Sandusky court for the final game before the state tournament, but even at that they were a match for the ultimate winners in three of the four periods. It was that other period, the third, that spelled their downfall, but although they were broken-hearted over the defeat, they have nothing for which to feel sorry or ashamed. They gave the best they had and had the odds been a bit more even or the luck a trifle better, they might have won.

Ashland breezed to an easy win over Willard the previous night while the Little Giants were battling, tooth and nail, to defeat Mansfield in two overtime periods. The championship game was decided in those Friday night games as much as in the Saturday meeting.

Once more the Little Giant luck was off and only at brief intervals did they click on their shooting. Time after time, throughout the game, Fremont shots dished into meshes and spun out or hit on the rim, balanced there for a split second and then tumbled off the wrong way.

## First Half Close

Ashland drew first blood, piling up five points before Bob Hall scored from the side of the court, and the score was 9 to 4 before foul shots by Jack Carroll and Snooks Jenkins paved it to 9 to 7 at the end of the quarter.

Fremont scored but one field in the first period, and the same thing happened in the second stanza. Jenkins' short shot in the early minutes being the only two-pointer bagged. Accuracy from the foul line kept the Little Giants in the game and the 10 of 13 tries they converted gave them a 14 to 11 edge midway the period.

This was the only time the Ross-men were ahead and the lead was short-lived. Baskets by Davis and Howell and a pair of free throws by Risser, made the count 18 to 14 at halftime after Dale Bowlius had missed two charity tosses.

## Ashland Spurts

Then the fatal third opened. Bob Howell scored twice, and Phil Stentz and Pete Risser each added a basket to shoot the count to 26 to 14, before Carroll shook himself free under the basket and hoisted in a shot. Again it was the only action shot made in the period by the Little Giants and after Hall missed a pair of free throws and Dick Frantz another, Howell made two gift shots and the score was 30 to 16.

Trailing by 14 points, the Little Giants tried another one of their famous rallies, but they just didn't have the moxie left. Jenkins opened the period by stealing the ball and dribbling in for a basket, but the spark was too feeble to fire the team. Ashland came back to score six points before Carroll scored from in close and made a free toss.
