ROSSMEN HAVE CHANCE IN BIG TRACK MEETING

Should Fight It Out With Sandusky for Top Hon- ors Saturday

Down Sandusky way they have fallen heir to the idea that the Ross high track and field array may give their Blue Streak cinder brigade quite a bit of trouble during the annual and, by the way, the final clash of the Little Big Seven at Oberlin Saturday afternoon. The facts of the matter are, they predict that the scrap for top honors will be between their team and Bill Ogden's fellows.

The famous Streaks consider themselves in the doings way up to their ears, but they also concede that Ross may step right up there and give them a blow for blow battle. In this conjecture they are about right. Fremont and Sandusky, on this season's form and performances, appear to be neck and neck and so far out in front of the other entries in the L. B. S. session that they have lost the others in a cloud of dust.

Fremont has a well balanced outfit and for the first time in several years, has obtained the valuable services of boys who can step in there and pick off firsts, seconds and thirds, all of which help nicely in the final summing up. The Ogden troop has been beating lots of the boys during the past several weeks, and it stands to reason when they divide the spoils next Saturday afternoon along about sunset, a heap of purple and white thin-clads will be in line to receive awards that may pave the way to the cinder championship of the little old athletic loop that is crooning its swan song.

Tiffin, Columbian, Oberlin, Willard, Bellevue and Norwalk will also start and, unless a dark horse is uncovered, will finish back of the one and two positions.

ROSSMEN OUT TO LAND HONORS AT OBERLIN MEET

Sandusky Looms as Greatest Rival in An- nual Cinderfest

This is one of those annual seven nation combats or, in other words, the Little Big Seven is featuring its yearly cinderfest and a goodly throng was there to lamp the proceedings.

By the way, it is also the final bow of the Little Big Seven, the major portion of the principal units, Fremont, Sandusky and Tiffin, unbuttoning from the coils of the old loop to affiliate themselves with the Buckeye League.

Fremont will compete with Sandusky, Oberlin, Bellevue, Tiffin Columbian, Willard and Norwalk and the doings should be quite interesting. According to past performances the battle for first place should rage between those two old, ancient and honorable rivals, Fremont and Sandusky. Willard looms up in there as a dark horse possibility to make a pretty good showing. Bellevue may also drag in for show as might Oberlin. Norwalk may also be able to give a good account of itself but the old dope pail places Tiffin Columbian down where Cincinnati and the Phillies always finish in the National League race.

Fremont, besides having some outstanding performers in Moore, Binkley, Karlovetz, Freeh, Ellison and Burkett, has plenty of boys who can step in there for the second and third points, all of which count mighty nice in that sum total business.

SANDUSKY WINS TRACK MEETING; LOCALS SECOND

Blue Streaks Put on Power in Final Session of
L. B. S.

It's the same old story over and over again. Sandusky's Blue Streaks spread-eagled the field and tucked away the honors of the annual and very last of the famous Little Big Seven track and field sessions held at Oberlin Saturday afternoon. Fremont finished second a few points ahead of Willard and Norwalk. Bellevue and Tiffin Columbian finished in the order named.

The Blue Streaks piled up 73 points to take the meeting. The Rossmen collected 43½ as their share. Willard helped itself to a piece of cake to the extent of 37½. Norwalk made 28½. Oberlin 22½, and Bellevue nosed in with an even 20. Oh, yes, Tiffin Columbian obtained one lowly point to escape the goose egg degree, happening rare in the annals of cinder affairs.

Records Broken

Three records went by the boards. Garrett of Sandusky, put new marks on the 100-yard and 440 dashes. Whittaker of Sandusky, soared to new heights in the pole vault.

Fremont's first place winners were: Binkley, 220 low hurdles; Moore, high jump and discus. Moore also placed second in the shot put. Kochy of Fremont, placed second in the 880 run, while Thraves tied for second in the pole vault. Schneider was third in the 440 dash. Black fifth in the high jump. Jimmy Short leaped into third place in the broad jump and Karlovetz finished fifth in the mile. Fremont's team was fourth in the half-mile relay, and finished in the same position in the mile relay.
