Eddie Brehm twirls well from the portside and Coach Weiler has hopes of picking up another right hander. It is said that J. W. Miller may be moved over from third base to the pitching hill to show the opposition some of his speed. He has it in copious quantities.

Fremont only nicked the Wiley one for three bingles and he sat nine of them down on strikeouts. Fremont went off into the lead, scoring a run in each of the first two rounds. After this threat, Wiley held the purple and whiteners in check. The visitors from Jules Bohn's new home town scored one in the third and put the game on ice in the fourth, making three runs. They hooked another in the fifth, were blanked in the sixth and shot four under the wire in the seventh, one of the runs being a home run sock by Wiley who drove one past Dave Holmes who was stationed in the heather patch in the outfield.

Johnny Shamp relieved Miller in the seventh, Jayson being rested up for the Defiance track meet today. All he had to do Friday was pitch six innings while his team played Kid Boots in a manner that would make Eddie Cantor seek the pumpkin-circuit. Today he is going to run 'steen miles, throw two ton of shot and jump with the best kangaroos in scholastic captivity in these parts.
