

WHITE TANKERS BEAT PURPLE IN SWIMMING

Annual Event at Ross Pool; Three Records Go Overboard

In an interesting session of expert water work given at the Ross high pool Thursday night under the direction of "Bim" Stults, swim instructor, the annual inter scholastic meeting was taken by the White from the Purple team by the tight count of 44 to 40. Three records went overboard during the evening and a fair-sized crowd got a thriller out of the procedure.

Oxley of the Purple, paddled to victory in the 200-yard relay with George Mathern, White, in second position. Booth of the Purple, crawled in to a win in the 100-yard back stroke and took down a new school record for the event, his time being 1:14. The winner was followed in order by Waggoner, Purple; Cal Kellogg, White, and A. Mathern, White.

In the 50-yard free style event, Fuchs of the White, nosed out Booth of the Purple, and A. Mathern of the White, and Tucker of the Purple, finished in order. Sherlow of the White, took the 100-yard breast stroke and caused a record to go overboard in his effort. He did it in 1:10, new school mark. Sherlow was chased into port by Cooper, Purple; Suttkins, White and Miller, Purple.

Carter carried the tidal wave of victory in the 100-yard free style. He represented the Purple. Dach, White; M. Suttkins, White, and Tucker, White, followed closely in the wake of the victor.

Brown of the White, established a new school record when he took the 220-yard free style feature in 2:47.6. He was chased by a coast guard composed of Oxley, Purple; Behnken, White, and Hughes, Purple.

Serwinsky plunged to victory in the diving contest, representing the White. Hasselbach, Purple entry, withdrew because of illness.

In the 150-yard medley relay, the White team, Kellogg, Sherlow and

ROSS TANKERS IN SANDUSKY MEET

Friday Coach (Bim) Stults and his merman from Ross high, will make their first start of the season along the lane of a hard schedule mapped out for their activities. ROSS TANK TEAM LOSES TO AKRON

Ross high swimmers, appearing against East high at Akron Saturday, were defeated 40 to 35 in a hotly contested match. Del Sherlow, of Ross, lowered the tank record by a full second when he won the 100 yard breast stroke event in 1:14. Bob Booth, of Ross, took the 100 yard back stroke race and the Ross medley team, Sherlow, Fox and Booth, won their event.

Other Ross point winners were Hasselbach and Serwensky, second and third, respectively, in diving; Garver Oxley, second in the 40 yard free style and Bob Brown, third in the 220 free style feature.

ROSS HIGH TANKERS TO TACKLE WAITE

Booth, star back stroker on the Ross high swimming team, will attempt to defeat Ed Moran, of Toledo Waite, the state champion, when the Ross and Waite swimming teams meet at Ross natatorium Thursday night.

Booth, according to Coach N. B. Stults, has come within three seconds of equalling Moran's record, and the competition against the star may see a record broken.

Mr. Stults announced the following team for the meet: 200-yard relay: Behnken, Tucker, Al Mathern and Carter; 100-yard back stroke, Booth and Kellogg; 50-yard free style, Fuchs and Oxley; 100-yard breast stroke, Sherlow and Cooper; 100-yard free style, Carter and Oxley; 220-yard free style, Brown and Merrifield; diving, Hasselbach and Serwinski; 150 yard medley relay, Booth, Sherlow and Fuchs.

LOCAL MERMEN DISPLAY CLASS IN NEAT WAY

Three Pool Records Tumble as Boys Churn Up Waters

Sherlow, Booth, Kellogg, Oxley, Hasselbach Are Ross Stars

Ross high 44, Waite high 51. Those mermen from Ross sailed out on home waters Thursday night and gave an invading fleet from Waite high, Toledo, a considerable splash in what was regarded a major victory.

A capacity crowd that stepped from the Siberian atmosphere without the surroundings that smacked of the balmy temperature of Florida or southern California or a base burner within, enjoyed the events, several of which were exciting.

The Ross flotilla had no easy time in out watering the big town-ers. They held the rear guard position for a couple of heats and they stepped out and made geyers out of the pool contents to forge ahead and hold the position.

Three pool records tumbled during the meeting. Ferdig of Waite, shoved the water for a mark of 28 seconds in the 50-yard free style.

Bill Sherlow, the capable Ross splasher, pared a full second off the 100-yard breast stroke feature, when he sailed the distance in 1:17. Armstrong of Waite, whirled a mean propeller in the 220-yard free style feature and did the distance in 2:40, another record for the school album of aquatics.

A Good Start

Waite opened the witness by taking the 200-yard relay in 1:53 but had quite a tug on the oars to distance the home crew. Behnken, Tucker, Mathern and Carter. This gave the Walters an 8 to 4 pull on the points. That was as far in advance as the visitors ever got. The home town craft found the channel and kicked about 200 parts of hardness out of the city product of filtered aqua and churned it to such a stage of softness that it wouldn't even ripple.

Bill Sherlow made Waite call for the coast guard when he took the 100-yard breast stroke. Some people are so dumb that they think this breast stroke is father cutting white meat from the gobbler. Dudley and Kettle of Waite, and Carter of Ross, finished in the wake left by Sherlow.

Real Excitement

One of the thrills of the night was occasioned when Booth and Cal Kellogg submerged to do their chores in the 100-yard back stroke feature. Booth dove into the lead at the crack of the gun and held his position by some master padding. Kellogg, however, had quite a duel with Ueberroth of Waite, but he proved his opponent at the finish line.

Ferdig of Waite, lowered the pool record in the 50-yard free style but he had to add sails to his side wheels to beat out Garver Oxley of Ross, who made the visitor do the distance in record time. Fuchs of Ross, was third.

Oxley stepped out and divided first honors with Ferdig of Waite, in the 100-yard free style, another exciting affair. Carter of Fremont, placed second. Armstrong of Waite, won the 220-yard free style and broke the record. Merrifield and JuloonBrown of Ross, finished second and third, respectively, and were the real causes of shoving the Toledoan off his anchor to a new harbor mark.

Slick Exhibition

Hasselbach of Ross, gave a great exhibition of high, wide and fancy diving, taking this pretty feature with Serwinski, another Ross product, finishing second. Tiernan of Waite, was placed third.

The Ross team of Booth, Sherlow and Fuchs took the 150-yard medley race in clever fashion and the result more than clinched the meeting.

The result shows that Coach "Bim" Stulte and his mermen are set to apply the water test to the big timers and they will take on another group of opposition in De Vilbiss high of Toledo, Friday night.

ROSS TANKERS EASILY DEFEAT BIG DEVILBISS

Sweep Seven Out of Eight
Events in Pool; One
Record Broken

Ross High 55, Devilbiss (Toledo) High 20.

After having taken the Waite high tankers along the waterlogged route of defeat Thursday night, those improving Ross high mermen stepped forth Friday night and splashed the Devilbiss wave busters by the one-sided count mentioned above. Two big foemen left in their foamy wake in two straight nights, is a pretty fair sports achievement and something to sit down and chat about.

Devilbiss, like Waite, a flotilla without a home harbor, does its practicing in the "Y" pool in Toledo. They had no chance after the first gun when they dropped the 220 yard relay to a crew of stokers, Behnken, Wagner, Mathern and Carter.

Coch "Bim" Stults of the Ross fleet, gave all his boys a chance last night and they succeeded in taking seven out of eight starts, the visitors escaping a shutout by winning the 150 medley race, the curtain piece of the show but only after a terrific struggle.

Coch Charles Buell, of Devilbiss brought down a great assembly of splashers. He had 'em big and tall, fat and semi-fat but they proved poor competition for the local wave splitters.

One Record Broken

The only record broken during the night's program was the 50 yard free style event that was taken by Carver Oxley in 28.2, new school record. Oxley was shoved for the mark by his teammate, Fuchs, another improved Rossman who is noticeable in the roar of the breakers by the green, rubber cap he wears when out pooling. Hansen, of Toledo, was third, close behind the Ross winners.

Sutkus, of Ross, took the 100 yard breast stroke with Dug Donovan, of Toledo in second and Bill Sherlow, of Ross in third berth. The 220 free style splash went to Bob Brown who sailed a great race for Ross. Cameron Merrifield, of Ross was third finisher and Captain Ralph Wickter, of Devilbiss, and the pride of the visiting navy, was second.

In the 100 yard back stroke maneuver, Bobby Booth, an auburn haired streak, followed up his sensational work in the Waite meeting by taking the event. He paddles like Fulton's old model of the Clermont but he sure pours through the old aqua. Cal Kellog was second, nailing out Gordon Southard, of Devilbiss by the width of a water bug's eyebrow. They did the turn in 1:15.2 which isn't at all bad. Leslie (Nick) Carter stepped out and took the bone in his teeth, as they say in yachting circles, and rounded the buoys ahead of the fast cruising Oxley who finished second. Jud Cannon, one of the big shots with Devilbiss, was thrown a tow line in third position.

The prettiest event of the night was the appearance of the divers. Orland Hasselbach, a miniature copy of Johnny Weismueller at his best, repeated his performance of the night previous when he outdove Waite with the able assistance of Bob Serwinaki, another Ross star. This pair of boys, both little fellows, was the hit of the show. In fact they stole the show, out pitching and gracefully trimming Capt. Wickter and his mate, Homer Bisch.

A fair sized crowd of fans, swimming is taking on at Ross, viewed the program and gave the purple and white waders a neat hand. They had it coming. Two victories in one week is something

any man's sports album.

REAL TANK STAR

An error cropped out in the summary report of the Ross high victory over the DeVilbiss swimmers of Toledo the other night. It was mentioned that Haven Suttikus, a coming star in the aqua, had won the 100 yard breast stroke event, taking among his victims the redoubtable Bill Sherlow, of Ross. This was not the case. It was Sherlow who won the event, it being his pet style of locomotion in the tank. Dug Donovan, of DeVilbiss was second and Suttikus finished third which is pretty good for fast company of the kind. A blanket could have covered the three swimmers at the finish.

Sherlow, a junior at Ross, is a powerful, big fellow and would make good football material but he says that football detracts from a fellow's swimming ability and he wants to be a real tank star. He sure is at this present writing and, with the guidance of Coach "Bim" Stults, will travel far before he completes his scholastic career.

ROSS HIGH TANKERS DEFEAT DE VILBISS

Ross high swimmers met the De-Vilbiss high team in the Y. M. C. A. pool in Toledo Friday night and won a hotly contested match, 37 to 34. It was the second victory of the season for Ross over the Toledo team.

Handicapped by the absence of their star performer, Bill Sherlow, who is ill at his home, and Cal Kellogg, Oxley and Carter, other capable point getters, recovering from illness but unable to do their best, the Ross team had a nip and tuck contest all the way. They won two of the eight events but cashed in on second and third points. Merrifield took the 200-yard free style feature but was disqualified. Hasselbach won the diving contest with Serwinski of Ross, second. Ross was awarded the 160-yard free style event when a Toledoan was disqualified for interference.

Among the Ross point winners were Hasselbach, Serwinski, Booth, Cooper, Oxley, Fox and Suttikus.

GREAT FINISH GAVE FREMONT FINE VICTORY

Medley Relay Caps Climax in Brilliant Tank Program

Two Records Fall Before Sway of Swimmers; Sandusky Next

Rosa St. Akron East 22.
In the hottest and closest naval engagement held in these parts since Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry gave the British a sinking spell at the battle of Lake Erie, the Rose High team, under the command of Admiral Bill Stults, swept the Akron East squadron, commanded by Admiral Larry Ricker, off the waters Friday night.

From the opening gun until the echoes of battle died away, the two outfits had it out with honors even. They grappled at close quarters, went over the side with cutlasses in hand and while the purple and white banner waved on high the defeated outfit went down with all hands on deck and the cook singing "We Shall Gather at the River."

Notable Achievements
In taking Akron East into the harbor on a tow line, the Rose men accomplished something that few teams have been able to do. The splashes from the home of the hippos and sippers are tuning up for the state championships and their submerging at the hands of the Rutland men was a bitter capsule to get down over the ridge of the tonnage.

The wave bending program was nip and tuck all the way and before the final event, the 100 yard medley relay, the score stood 34 to 32 in favor of Akron and Rose just had to take the event to cap the session. Here's what they were up against however: The Akron medley arrangement, regarded as one of the best in the state, won their start at the recent northwestern Ohio meeting at Cleveland. One of their starters was Ellsworth Woodling, holder of the state scholastic back stroke title and a few other honors. It was a dark outlook and wise money would have said that Rose, in the grand finish, would be left in the wake like a saw log racing the Yankee or a flat iron trying to catch Johnny Weismuller.

Some Astonishment
Bobby Booth, Rose's back stroke genius, gave Woodling a great run in the first heat and lost out by inches. Big Bill Sherlow ripped up a wave like a typhoon and got a fair lead on Woyar in the breast stroke event and then came Ted Fuchs, Rose's anchor man in the free style. Ted took on Stewart of Rose and, with the start given him by Sherlow not only held the lead but increased it several inches and won in one of the greatest finishes ever seen in any event in these parts. The crowd, and they were packed in capacity strength, went dizzy with glee and, in the excitement some Akron fellow said that Rose should have won because it was swimming in its own water and was more used to the track.

Records Tumble
During the water disturbance two pool records were broken and one tied. Woodling, state champion, was pushed to a great effort in the 100 yard back stroke by the red headed Bobby Booth and he swam the distance in 1:14 just six tenths of a second above the state record. Woodling swam so fast he didn't get his bathing suit wet. The old pool record, 1:14, was given one rude shattering in this classic.

Big Bill Sherlow tied the pool record of 1:17 when he took the 100 yard breast stroke. He was shoved to an exciting finish by Woyar, of Akron, another real knight of the bath.

More Excitement
One of the real aqua duels of the night was staged in the 50 yard free style, when Garver Osley, son of George (Wee) Osley, old time baseball and football star, put on his side wheels and propeller and roared home with a hose in his teeth to take one of the brilliant struggles of the night. Osley was tagged closely by Honeywell, of Akron, and Ted Fuchs, of Fremont, who puffed in a close third and buried Ward, of Akron, under a foamy wake. These, who figure speed swimming events aren't exciting should have seen this one as an appetizer for that, several producing medley relay fireworks that finished the meeting.

At the completion of Osley's victory the two teams were tied 35 to 35 and it was the biggest water row staged in Fremont since Col. Croghan and his team chased the Proctor-Tecumseh visitors down the river.

Akron Takes Opener
Akron's 200 yard relay team took the opener in warm-up fashion but the Rosemen sort of made them rough up the water a bit. The event was done in 1:55, quite a bit beyond the pool mark made by some pool shark from Sandusky so they say. Mathers, Cooper, Tucker and Sutkus did the padding for Rose.

Stewart, of Akron, beat Garver Osley by the width of a horse's eyebrow in the 100 free style, popular Scotch event, because it is tagged free. Hendricks, of Rose, dressed signals with torn rigging and sounding an S. O. S. like the Seth Parker or a home sick whale, finished third. This event was done in 1:34 a fraction over the pool record of 1:30.

Another Record
Another record dropped into the pool like a buckshot into a clatter, when Merfield, of Rose, chased a fellow with the name of Shiftbower, of Akron, in the 220 yard free style, longest cruise of the night. Brown, of Fremont, how into the

Langley, with all that, in a graceful performer but Hasselbach defeated him 62.30 to 62.35 after a pretty exhibition that brought out more aerial gyrations than Humphrey Dumpty or a king fisher ever dreamed of. Serwinsky, a coming star, was marked with 45.6 points and third position, all of which helped.

Two junior teams from the coming schools put on a 150 yard medley exhibition while the figure sharpers were summing up the standings in the dives.

Those astonishing swimmers who call Ross pool their home port and who have taken DeVilbiss, Walte and Akron East into low this season added another swell prize to the group of floaters they have at anchor in mooring grounds, when they added to one of the greatest nights in their school history by Coach Schell and his Blue Streak splashes a'long the submerged row Thursday night.

Sandusky has been winning with such great regularity that it sent its wave flattens up to Fremont to aid in the general massacre it had figured on with the S. H. S. voracity and reserve cagers doing their bits for the big harvest they expected to reap in an athletic way. What the Ross tankers did to the poolists from Erie was a caution. They did everything but chase them down the drain pipe.

No records were broken in this session but some mighty good time was negotiated. Ross took five firsts in eight events, winning after tough struggles in most of them. They lost the diving contest and the 200 yard relay race but had plenty of points to spare.

Lost First Number

Al Mathern, Waggoner, Ted Fuchs and Cooper lost the first event, the 200 yard relay to start the evening's program. This loss created no speculation as the same number had been lost in several other matches. The win gave the Streaks an 8 to 4 edge on points.

Bill Sherlow, however, who swims better than the whale that inhaled Jonah, livened things up when he took the 100 yard breast stroke event from Samko, the Sandusky ace, with Reiter, of the visitors, puffing in a close third to beat out H. Suttika, of Ross. This moved the count up to 12 to 9, still favoring the invading fleet.

Garver Oxley, the human porpoise, set the crowd, and there was some crowd in the close confines of the pool room, too, on its well known ears, when he hoisted a flying jib or a spinaker and nosed out Drouillard of Sandusky in an exciting 50 yard free style feature. Oxley appeared to be trimmed but he bawled for more sail and came into harbor to win by the thickness of the sunburn on his nose. Plenty of excitement among the fans when Oxley dragged himself out in front. This cut Sandusky's lead 16 to 14.

A Double Win

Cameron Merrifield and Bobby Brown, a sweet pair of water lilies, bloomed to the extent of making a grand slam in a hotly contested 220 yard free style event, longest cruise of the night. The Fremont pair were never headed and they had all hands hitting the deck with a horn pipe as they came home from the deep sea fishing grounds with a catch that put Ross into the lead 22 to 17.

Bobby Booth, the suburn haired back stroker from Ross, and his sparring partner Calvin Stewart Kellogg, staged another clean sweep in the 100 yard back stroke. Booth, one of the best back strokers and this doesn't mean petting the kitty either, has starred in his special feature all season and recently gave the state champion, Woodling, of Akron, water on the knee, kept in the lead all the way to score in number one berth.

Kellogg, racing his last number for old Alma Mammy and a senior in school, gave everything he had and it was ample to ride the tide into the docks leading Eakin, of Sandusky, by the width of a snail's shoulders. This brilliant win shoved Fremont into a 30 to 18 position.

Oxley Cops Another

Oxley, big point getter for Ross, again aroused the water birds to a mighty chorus of chirps, when he paddled from behind to take the 100 yard free style in one of his copyrighted finishes. Holzapfel finished second for Sandusky and Hendrix, of the same school, rolled and wallowed in third to beat Cooper of Fremont.

Reider, of Sandusky, a great diver, outpointed Halbeisen, of Ross, to take the spring board feature but he had to go some, winning by a count of 65.7 to 60.85. Holzapfel, of Sandusky, finished third. Bob Serwinaky, of Ross, was fourth placer.

Ross clinched the meeting when their medley team took the 150 yard relay in as neat an exhibition as a tank fan could dream of. Booth took care of the breast stroke. Sherlow swam his opponent under in the breast stroke heat while Ted Fuchs made his water

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mate sea sick by the speed he exhibited when doing the anchor man stunt in the free style feature.

The majority of the matches were exciting and when the Ross-men put the meeting inside the burlap and placed it with the mementoes of the Waite, DeVilbiss and Akron East meetings, the roar that went up bent the sides of the pool house.

Word that the Ross Reserves had trimmed the S. H. S. reserves had percolated into the session and this, coupled with the pool victory, sent the throng over to the varsity cage game in great humor but very few of them expected the surprising continuation of an evening full of joy that the final number on the feature sports carnival program brought forth.

By their victory over the powerful Streak tankers, Coach Bim Stults and his stars have displayed that they are ready to go to town with most any of them and they are looking forward to some of the plunder in the state meeting.
