## ROSS ONLY FREMONT TRACKER TO PLACE

Fremont High School had slender picking at the state track and field session at Columbus Saturday. Captain Bob Ross, pilot of the thin clads from the local seat of learning, lead but two of his cinder army to the Columbus front, Eggie Newton and Nelson Jones. The captain got Fremont's only bit a five way tie with the contenders in the class A pole vault for fifth position which gave him one fifth of a point. Newton failed to qualify in his 440 feature and also missed fire in the broad jump. Nelson Jones also failed to qualify in his one event, the half mile run.

Columbus Central won the meeting with 29 points; Lakewood of Cleveland, was second with 26 markers. Scott of Toledo, got 10½ points; for third position. Norwalk and Tiffin, of the Little Big Seven, got seven points each behind Salem and Canton McKinley. Sandusky, champions of the Little Big Seven, failed to function, and went way down in the dumps with but 6 points.

Eight state records fell during the session, four in class A and the same number in class B. Victor Blumm, of Tiffin, ran true to form and fractured his special effort, the discus toss, heaving the saucer 131 feet, 2½ inches breaking the old mark of 124 feet 2½ inches held by himself.

Ross, in getting his portion of a point in the pole vault, made the bar at 11 feet four inches. The winners, four tied for first, cleared the stick at 11 feet eight inches.
