'Hesitant' is Ross mat word

Al Voggenthaler, stopped, scratched his chin and thought before uttering a not too definite statement about the prospects of his Ross High School Little Giants wrestling team.

"I think I'm kind of hesitant to say," he tried to begin. "We have nine lettermen back but we will be weak in a couple of positions with the middleweights our toughest group."

Paced by Buckeye Conference champs Doug Smith and John Havener, Voggenthaler will put his 31-man squad on the mats for the public Tuesday night in the annual "Purple and White" intra-squad meet. It begins at 7:30 p.m. after a 6 p.m. potluck dinner and a 6:45 demonstration at Ross High School.

Why a potluck before a meet?

"I don't want them overeating," Voggenthaler chuckled sardonically. "Thanksgiving's coming up and they can overeat then . . . a little."

Smith is the 167-pound EC champ while Havener won the title at 98 and added the Class AAA sectional title later in the season. Smith, if it works out right, will be at the same weight but could take the mat at 175 on occasions. Smith is a senior.

Havener will be up a weight class — 105 — this season. A junior, Havener's 98-pound position will probably go to sophomore Dave Baun. At 112, letterman junior Corey Beard will be wrestling but he will be pushed by senior letterman Wayne Orndorff.

Junior Blaine Hines and sophomore Kevin Shaffer are in the running for the 119-pound position with junior letterman Tony Shiets at 126. Andy Esquivel, sophomore, and Shawn Barnett, a senior, are Voggenthaler's 132-pounders temporarily.

"Several wrestlers, once January rolls around," he pointed out, "could go down a weight class."

With Rick Heidelberg and Craig Trick, both sophomores, in the 138-pound picture, the dropping down a weight class is possible, especially for Heidelberg.

A pair of veterans are battling for the 145-pound starting slot with the loser of a wrestle-off moving up a weight position. Jim Lipstraw and Mark Walther, both two-year letter winners, are in the picture but whichever one moves up a class, the Ross coach feels that it will not hinder the wrestler.

"Lipstraw is pretty strong and Walther is tall enough and strong enough to handle it (the higher weight), so I don't think it will weaken us," Voggenthaler contended.

Another possible 155-pounder is a New Lexington move-in, Larry Brenot, a senior.

Smith is at 167 with Mike Wendt, when he recovers from an injury, at 175. As long as Wendt is out, Smith will probably take the higher weight class. Doug Bischoff, another 175-pounder, is currently nursing a badly sprained ankle. If Smith is at 175, sophomore Doug Zink will be at 167.

Two-year senior letterman Tom Smith will be at 185 while another letterman, junior Anthony Carter, is the heavyweight.

Ross will be hosting three varsity tournaments this season — The Mal Mackey, the Fremont Invitational and the Buckeye Conference. The Little Giants will also be taking part in the Toledo Rogers and Medina Tournaments.

The Mackey tourney will feature area teams like Huron, Bellevue, Vermilion, Toledo St. Francis and St. John's, Edison and Bowsheer. Mansfield Senior, Centerville, Troy, Mansfield Madison, Sylvania Northview and Sandusky are teams in the Fremont Invitational.

Summing up the team picture, Voggenthaler predicted that a strong point of his team will be the depth.

"We have some good sophomores who will help us quite a bit this year," he predicted.

His first real look into the crystal ball will be Tuesday with his team jumping into the fire of head-to-head competition Saturday the 29th in a 1 p.m. match at Port Clinton.

'Voggie' gets 100th win

PORT CLINTON — Ross got a boost from a rejected basketball player turned wrestler in rocking Port Clinton 41-20 in the initial meet of the season Saturday.

"He was a pleasant surprise," Ross Coach Al Voggenthaler smiled while saying a secret thank you to Ross basketball Coach Biz Paeth.

Mitch Curliss was the surprise. Cut from the basketball team a few weeks ago, Curliss stepped into a wrestling uniform and responded with a win in his first outing. The Little Giants 167-pounder racked up 12 points in the first two periods to defeat the Redskins' Keith Shook 12-6.

"The thing about it," Voggenthaler chuckled,

"Curliss was even wrestling up a weight class."

Continuing, the Ross coach added, "I think we did as expected. We ran into trouble in the 119-132 classes but Port Clinton has some good kids there and we do not feel that we are strong there anyhow."

Voggenthaler was savoring this win more than any other opening season triumph because it was the 100th win for him in his 18 years of coaching the mat sport. "Voggie" is 45-28-2 at Ross in nine years after coaching Sylvania (29-14) and Crestline (26-14) in his first nine years as a head coach.

"I didn't want to say anything about it," he said.

The secret was out, however, when Ross

wrestler Mark Walther remembered it. A loss and a tie in the final triangular meet of last season had kept Voggenthaler waiting a year for the century victory.

Once the Little Giants got past 132, sophomore Rick Heidelberg started a string of six wins and a draw for the Little Giants.

Heidelberg defeated Bruce Celek 5-2 at 138. Jim Lipstraw followed with a 14-1 drubbing of Jeff Drum at 145 and Mark Walther, 155, and Port Clinton Terry Dunn battled to a 4-4 draw.

Curliss' win came next with Doug Smith, up a weight class, pinning PC's Terry Conaway in 3:52. Tom Smith, 185, of Ross pinned Daryl Trent in 3:35 and Ross heavyweight Anthony Gardner topped off the Ross win with a fall in a minute against Mark Hermes.

Ross wrestlers at home Thursday

Ross will open the home wrestling slate Thursday by hosting Lorain Southview.

Southview will bring a dual match winning streak of 25 into Fremont. The Saints are led by Bobby Romero who was fourth in the AAA state meet at 98 pounds last year.

"I think that he will be bumped up to 105," Ross Coach Al Voggenthaler projected about Romero. "That will put him up to where Havener (John) will be wrestling."

Havener is the defending Buckeye Conference champ at 98 but will be at the higher weight this season for the Little Giants.

Southview has had one outing this season, finishing second to Vermilion in their own tournament last weekend.

"I know one thing for sure," the Ross coach said, "Southview's lineup is not set but they will be bringing their usual tough team in here."

The junior varsity and varsity matches begin at 7 p.m. in the Ross High School gym.

Saints roll past Ross wrestlers

Southview whipped Ross's youth brigade and didn't do too badly against the Little Giants' experience Thursday as the Saints won their 26th consecutive dual wrestling meet 42-21.

"It was just like that," Ross Coach Al Voggenthaler said. "They whipped our young kids and then it was a matter of which team's experience would do better."

Southview won six of the first seven matches to take a 27-3 lead. The only Ross points in that string was a decision by John Havener. The Ross junior pulled out the 8-6 verdict with a reversal against Pablo Marrero with less than 10 seconds remaining in the match.

Bobby Romero of Southview, fourth in the state at 98 last season, got Southview off to a rolling start with a 34 second pin on sophomore Dave Baum. Havener's win was

next but from 112 through 138, it was all Southview.

Eric Gonzalez pinned Ross junior Corey Beard at 119 and Dave Velez blanked sophomore Andy Esquivel of Ross 15-0 at 132 for the biggest wins.

Mark Walther ended Southview's string in the 145-pound match, pinning Rick Gonzalez in 5:40.

Southview took the next two matches before Doug Smith, 175, and Tom Smith, 185, produced falls for Ross. Doug Smith needed 3:19 to knock off Ed Farley and Tom Smith stopped George Vukelich in 1:32.

Ross's next match will be Dec. 13 at Sandusky in a triangular with the Blue Streaks and Worthington.

In the junior varsity meet, Southview used a pair of Ross forfeits at 175 and 185 for a 42-26 win.

The Ross wrestlers will travel to Sandusky for a 1 p.m. meet with the Blue Streaks Saturday.

The Little Giants are coming off of a loss to Lorain Southview and coach Al Voggenthaler sees another tough foe in Sandusky.

"It will be a tough meet because they (Sandusky) are strong where we are strong," the coach said. "It should be an interesting match."

The Jones boys are the top Sandusky wrestlers, Voggenthaler said. Charles Jones, at 138, is a second place finisher in the state meet last year and his brother Ricky wrestles at 119.

Another Jones, Theodus, will wrestle at 132 and another Jones boy recently quit the team.

Worthington, originally scheduled to compete in the meet, has dropped out. Both the JV and varsity meets will be run simultaneously.

Sandusky buries Little Giant matmen

SANDUSKY — Ross wrestling Coach Al Voggenthaler was so sick before his team's match against Sandusky, that he was forced to miss his first meet in 18 years of coaching.

The result of the match could not have made his condition any better. Sandusky won easily 47-12.

"I watched the video tapes today (Sunday)," Voggenthaler said, "and there were four or five matches that could have gone either way. We knew that could happen and unfortunately, they went the wrong way."

"Voggie" was forced to stay at home because of a badly infected throat. Assistant Coach Rick Boggs took Voggenthaler's seat aside the mats for the Saturday meet.

The only wins for the Little Giants were turned in by Corey Beard, 119, Doug Smith, 167, and Tom Smith, 185. Beard edged Neil McCarty 5-4 while Doug Smith pinned Roman Holiday in 1:12 and Tom Smith outpointed Scott Van Dooting 12-7.

One of the bigger wins for Sandusky came at 105. Ross's John Havener, the Buckeye Conference 98-pound champ last season, was pinned by Pete Prophet in four minutes and 30 seconds.

Two of Ross's key wrestlers, Mark Walther and Jim Lipstraw, wrestled up one weight class. Both lost . . . Walther 8-4 to Dave Pou at 145 and Lipstraw 10-5 to Deno Maschari at 155.

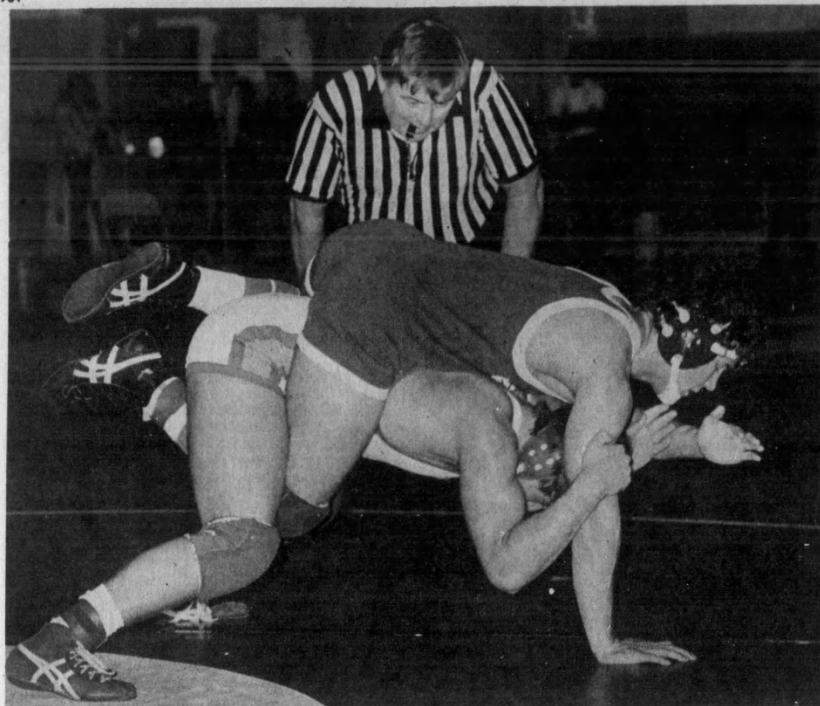

Edison 1st, Ross fifth

Tom Smith saved a "little face" for Ross and John Havener smoothed a little salve into the wound at the eighth Mal Mackey Memorial Invitational Wrestling Tournament at Ross High School Saturday.

Edison easily won the meet with 189½ points with Toledo St. John's second at 144½, Vermilion third with 121½ and Huron fourth with 101. Ross was fifth with St. Francis, Bowsher and Bellevue rounding out the field.

Ross Coach Al Voggenthaler was disappointed. "We knew Edison was really tough and they didn't disappoint us," the Ross coach began. "I was really disappointed (in our finish); I thought that we would finish in the top three."

"We just had letdowns in key weight classes," Voggenthaler continued, "but I was pleasantly surprised with our 'fill-ins.'"

Smith, who goes by the nickname of "Smutt-Dog," won the 187-pound title. He was one of two Ross grapplers in the championship finals. The Ross senior eased past Brian DeFelippi of Huron 2-0.

Smith was awarded a penalty point in the second period when DeFelippi threw an elbow into his head and got an escape in the final 10 seconds of the match.

Doug Smith was second at 169 for Ross. He lost to Joe Pastorek of St. John's 4-1 in the finals.

Havener, despite finishing third at 107, won the trophy for the "Most pins in the least amount of time," with three falls in seven minutes and nine seconds.

Mark Schmidt of Ross was fourth at 114.

Edison dominated the tournament easily. The "Orange Crush" had 10 of 13 wrestlers in either the championship or consolation finals. Seven won championships, five of them in the first six weight divisions.

"Our wrestlers were more aggressive in the finals than in the earlier rounds," Edison Coach Paul Haeuptle admitted. "We just wanted to walk out the front door with the championship trophy and not have to use the back door."

Ross was damaged before the tourney started. Jim Lipstrow, the Little Giants' 147-pounder, was ruled out with damaged ribs. In the second period of the 147-pound match, Mark Walther, who was moved up from 140, suffered a severe ankle injury and was out of the tourney.

"The loss of those two took away a lot of points," the Ross coach theorized. "I feel that in hindsight, I shouldn't have moved Walther up."

The benefactor of the Walther default was Kevin Lyddy of St. John's who went on to win the tourney's "Most valuable" award while capturing the title in that division.

"Hopefully," Voggenthaler concluded, "we will be more competitive in the next tournament in two weeks."

Ross will host the Fremont Invitational on the 24th at the high school.

Sloppy, but a St. Joe win

TIFFIN — It wasn't a very artistic game. It was filled with turnovers and fouls. It was ragged.

But, for St. Joe's coach Denny Faber, it was happiness. The important thing, he said, was that the Streaks won.

It capped a beautiful weekend.

"It was a good weekend for us," Faber said outside the visitor's locker room Saturday night in Tiffin. "I told the team this week that I was really concerned about these two games. I was pleased with the way they bounced back."

It was a crucial weekend for St. Joe who had lost two straight before Friday. If any hopes of a Sandusky Bay Conference title were to remain, it was almost imperative that the Streaks win both of their games to stay close to Port Clinton.

On Friday the Streaks dumped St. Mary's and Saturday night, they got win number two with a 63-54 triumph over SBC foe Calvert.

With the wins, St. Joe is now 8-2 overall, 4-2 in the SBC and still within range of league-leading Port

ning but still will need help from other teams to derail the rolling Redskins of Port Clinton.

Huron is in second place, a game behind Port Clinton and the two teams meet Friday. St. Mary's and St. Joe are tied at 4-2 while Calvert is next with a 3-3 SBC record.

In Saturday night's game with Calvert, over 50 turnovers were committed and over 40 fouls were whistled and the game seemed to drag on.

It was an indication of what was to come when both teams in their initial possessions threw the ball away.

St. Joe, however, despite the lackluster showing, was the sharper team. The Streaks trailed only once and maintained between a five and 10 point lead most of the contest.

"I've been in coaching long enough to know that that type of game, after an emotional win of Friday, you're not always your sharpest," Faber explained. "We certainly played hard. We made mistakes but we hustled. That shows a lot of heart."

The game was decided at the foul line.

The Streaks went to the

four for the game.

Even the Senecas spark plug, Chuck Ritzler, picked up two in the quarter, giving him three for the first half.

It didn't get much better in the second half as Tom Cawood fouled out with 3:45 to go in the third quarter and Heminger and Ritzler followed Cawood to the bench early in the fourth quarter.

Ken Swint and Jack Hoffman were the only St. Joe players in foul trouble. Both had four in the third period but neither fouled out.

St. Joe had a two-point lead after the first period but opened up a 10-point advantage by intermission thanks to 12 points at the foul line.

Calvert, behind Ritzler, got within two in the third period three times but could never get the lead.

In the fourth quarter, the closest Calvert got was four.

Mike Reardon, coming off a 33-point performance, paced St. Joe for the second straight night with 18. Three others were in double figures starting with Jeff Decker with 15, Brian Burns 12 and Dave

Foos with 10.

Ritzler had 28 for Calvert.

In the reserve game, the Streaks exploded for 28 fourth-quarter points to defeat Calvert 53-36.

Three St. Joe players hit double figures with Mark Gabel leading the way with 15. Greg Streaker had 13 and Norb House 12. The JV's are now 4-4.

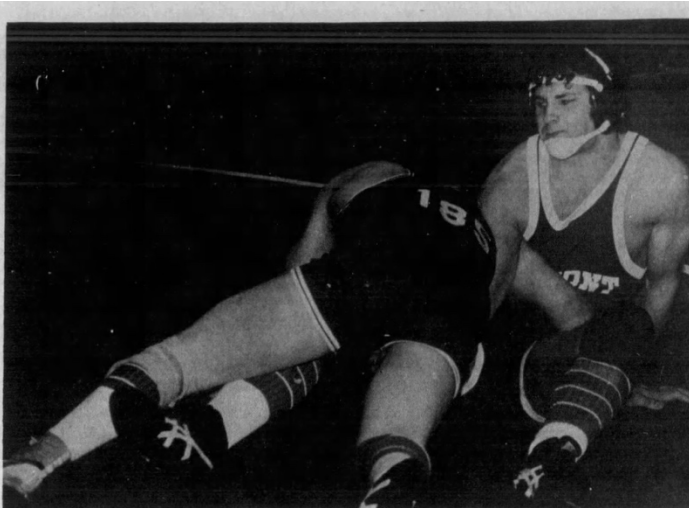

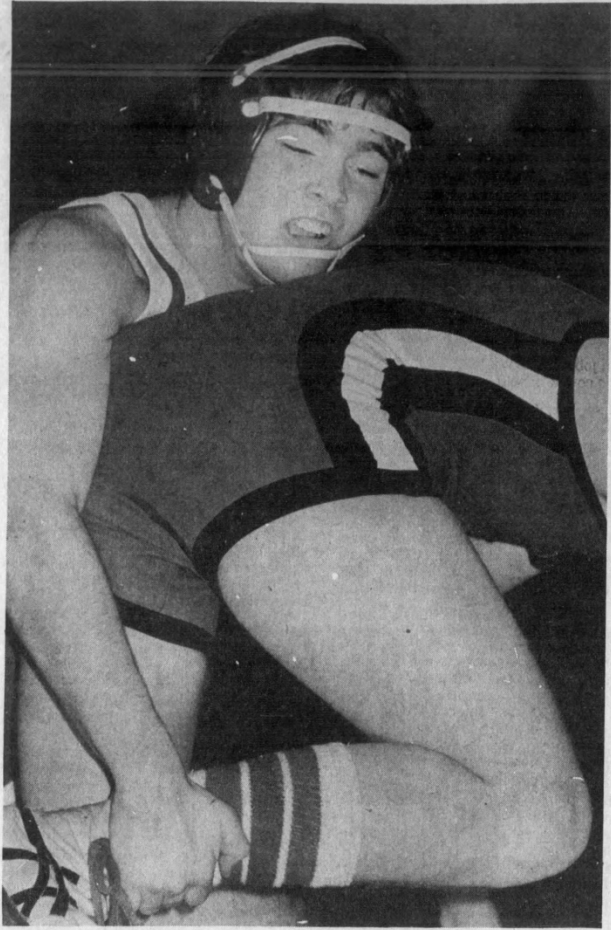

Elyria will be at Fremont again Feb. 7 when Ross hosts the Buckeye Conference Tournament.

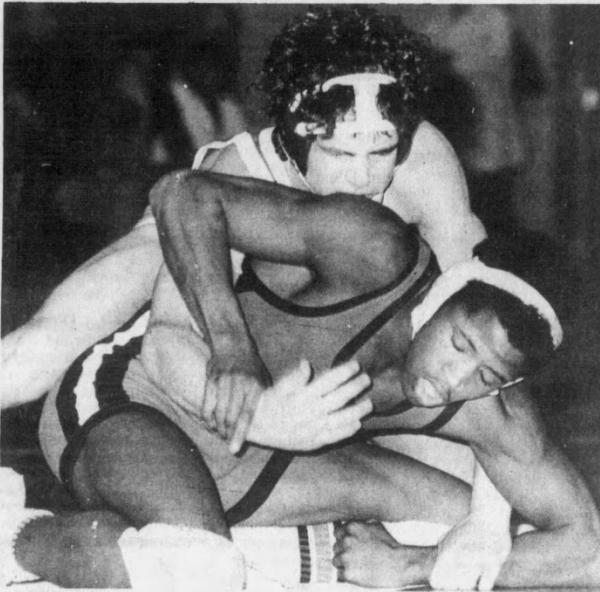

Weight: a wrestler's first and toughest opponent

They are probably the envy of every overweight American.

They shed pounds like bushy-haired cats lose fur. They guard their diets against Big Macs, Whoppers and double cheese pizzas.

Many wrestlers battle their bodies everyday. For five long months, the struggle to maintain their wrestling weight goes on. It's not an easy fight.

It takes hours of exercise and months of diet discipline.

Just ask Barney Cruz or Joe Gottron of St. Joe who both have lost almost 20 pounds since wrestling season began.

Cruz reported to St. Joe wrestling coach Gary Logsdon at a pudgy 136 in October. Now he is down to 119. Gottron was 152 but has peeled off 18 pounds.

"I cut down on food a lot while working out," Cruz said. "all the pop and your basic junk food and stick to meat and protein stuff. I had trouble at first. I cut down awfully quick and I felt weak."

Logsdon spotted the problems and had Cruz go back up to 126 for a few matches before slowly dropping back to 119.

"I cut out all grease," Cruz continued. "I eat a lot of broiled meat and poultry, salads with no dressing and cheese."

Gottron came off the football field bulked up at 152. He needed to drop at least 14 pounds. He wrestled at 138 for a while, compiling a 9-3-1 record but recently dropped down to 134 and is 9-1.

"During football, you could always grab a bottle of water after practice and put three pounds back into you," Gottron said. "Now I hardly drink water at all. I was always lifting and then I'd go home and pig out at the supper table."

"Then I'd sit down in front of the television and have a pop. Last night I went home and had one quarter-pound chop, beans, a glass of milk, jello and pineapple. Then I rode the exercise bike for 26 miles."

During the weight reduction process, Gottron suggested that the whole family be included.

"The way to stay away from eating ice cream and stuff like that is not to buy it. If you don't have it around the house your not going to eat it."

The only time either one gets to stuff themselves like normal teenagers is right after a meet. Pizzas, Big Macs and Whoppers are gobbled up.

They can come in five pounds overweight the next week and have no trouble working it off, Logsdon said.

"Losing three to five pounds an evening is not far-fetched," he said.

Logsdon added that both are better wrestlers at the lighter weights. They have better agility and have not lost any strength, he said.

"It's a touchy subject," the curly-haired coach said. "A lot of people have the notion that weight loss is bad, that we're tearing up a kid's body."

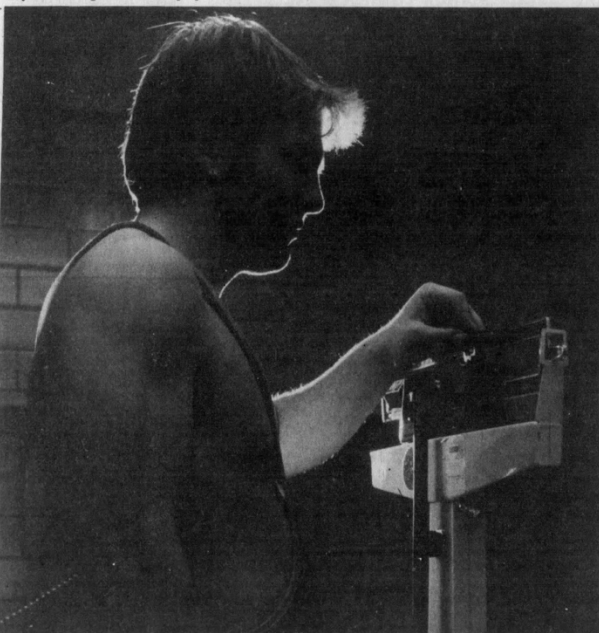
"Losing weight is good discipline for kids within reason."

The proper mix of exercise and diet is the secret, Logsdon said.

"Weight loss is getting rid of fat," he said. "The whole key is a good hard workout and proper eating. The big problem for a kid losing weight is hitting that weight class for the first time. Once he's there he can stay there through exercise and proper diet."

Cruz and Gottron followed Logsdon's formula and the pounds fell off.

Logsdon's general rule is that kids who have not worked out can lose 10 percent of their body weight. Upper weights can sometimes lose more, he said.

"It's relative to size," Logsdon said. "You have to lose within reason. Going to extremes is bad."

Unfortunately, severe weight reduction and wide variations in weight was the rule not too long ago. Kids were doing anything to knock off extra pounds.

"I've seen everything from Elix to unbearable saunas," Logsdon said, "and we're not excluded. I've seen kids from other schools look like skeletons. That's what you don't want."

Along with saunas, other means of quickly reducing weight included crash dieting, diet pills, rubber, vinyl or plastic sweat suits and many other artificial heat devices.

All have been outlawed by the Ohio High School Athletic Association and any wrestler caught disobeying the rules will be disqualified for the season.

"I'm glad the state has tightened up," Logsdon said.

"It is to the advantage of the kids."

Ross wrestling coach Al Voggenthaler had a personal experience of losing excessive amounts of weight during his wrestling days and that experience has helped form his policy.

He likes to have kids wrestle at their normal weight.

"I don't like to tell kids down. I will not force a kid under any circumstances to go down. I don't like that. I like to get the kid in the best physical shape and go from there."

"If they constantly keep missing their weight class I'll bump them up."

While the state has made rules about weight loss, both Logsdon and Voggenthaler say that some cheating goes on.

"Kids are still sneaking saunas, that's the most abused thing today," Logsdon said.

"It's still abused, I know for sure, I've seen it," Voggenthaler said. I refuse to make it an issue because then defeating your opponent becomes secondary. But I overheard one kid from another school which I won't identify bragging about how he lost 19 pounds in one week."

Earlier in the season at Ross, one team reported with a couple of wrestlers overweight by a couple of pounds. To make weight, the two stuck their hands down their throats and vomited.

"That's ridiculous," Voggenthaler said.
