MARTIN COPS ONLY FIRST IN INAUGURAL

Collegiate Distances Bother Rossmen In Season's First Start

A combination of collegiate swimmers and collegiate distances threw the Little Giant swimmers for a 58 to 16 loss Tuesday afternoon as they opened the new season with an exhibition meet with Bowling Green university in the latter's pool.

The Falcons have perhaps their best tank team in history, an outfit that had already blanked the Wooster college natators, and packed too much all-around power for the Purple forces under Coach John Titsworth.

The unfamiliar distances, several too long for scholastic stroke, also worked against the Fremonters and they copped but one first, two seconds and five thirds. No points were given for second place in the relay.

Jim Martin, state scholastic diving champion, flashed his old form to account for the only first place, easily besting a former teammate Phil Hodes. Martin scored 88.2 points with Hodes getting 56.9 and Del Rakes, diminutive Rossmen, finishing a close third with 54.8 points.

Free Stylers Weak

Coach Titsworth said after the meet that the team here was decidedly weak insofar as free stylers were concerned with only Jack Sheldon flashing real form. Entered in the 400-yard event, Sheldon did not win, but showed enough power and form to brand him as a distinct threat in the shorter 220-yard distance.

In the 300-yard medley relay, Bill Wise stroked a back-stroke lap in 1:11.2, his best time thus far, while Dick Pence turned in a creditable 1:11 in his breast stroke lap. Wise was also second in the 150-yard back stroke.

The Ross mentor said that he was satisfied with his team except where the free stylers were concerned, adding that they would have to improve plenty if the team was to retain its state championship.

The next meet will be the annual Purple and White affair, featuring all members of the squad, in the Ross pool on December 18.

ROSS MERMEN VIE SATURDAY IN HOME POOL

Western Reserve Academy To Show Classy Swimmers

Fremont Ross Little Giant swimmers will be seen Saturday at 2:30 p. m. in their first dual meet of the current season at the Ross high school pool, Western Reserve Academy, of Hudson, O., furnishing the opposition.

The Cleveland natators were the only aggregation last year to defeat the Little Giant mermen. Coach John Titsworth hopes to be able to even the count in the home pool inaugural for Ross swimmers.

Mainstays of the Ross team will be Dick Pence, 100-yard breast-stroke state champion, and Jim Martin, state high school diving champ, together with Bob Pence and Bill Wise, backstroke, and Dean Hess, freestyler, all seniors.

Two entrants in the 50-yard free-style event will be picked from Jack Courtney, Cal Bristley and Ralph Hipp. Dick Pence and Leo Lehman will compete in the breaststroke and Jim Martin and Del Rakes will be the diving entries.

Bill Wise and Bob Pence will get the call in the 100-yard backstroke event and two for the 200-yard freestyle race will be picked from Hess, Charles Fisher and Floyd Wagner, while two for the 100-yard freestyle will be named from Hipp, Bristley and Courtney.

The 150-yard medley relay team will be composed of Wise, Hess and Dick Pence. Four for the 200-yard freestyle relay team will be chosen from Bristley, Fisher, Courtney, Lehman, Hipp, Allen Fisher and Bill Wendler.

MEDLEY RELAY TEAM DECIDES CLOSE MEET

Rossmen Capture Five Events In First Start Under Coach Titsworth

Back in 1942, the Western Reserve Academy swimmers broke all the rules of hospitality and defeated the Ross high mermen, 34 to 32, snapping a winning streak that had reached 35 straight.

That was last year and when the prep school boys from Hudson visited Fremont Saturday afternoon the Little Giants didn't turn the other cheek. They just turned the tables on the visitors, annually one of the better tank outfits in the state, and sent them home on the short end of a 36 to 30 score. Continuing the parallel, it was the Academy's first setback in 29 starts.

The meet was the first real test of the Little Giants this year, their first season under Coach John Titsworth, and they came through with an admirable effort although the times chalked up didn't seriously threaten any pool or school records.

Medley Team Wins

Competition was close all the way and the meet wasn't definitely decided until the Fremont 150-yard medley relay team of Bill Wise, Dick Pence and Dean Hess copped that event, next to last on the program. That sewed up the meet.

The Hudson boys won three firsts, including the free style relay and its seven points, while the Little Giants copped five events. In two of them they finished one two and then added two thirds for good measure.

Perhaps the outstanding performance was that of Jim Martin, present state scholastic diving champion. Although it was virtually his first real competition since last year, Jim put on a nice show. There may be better school-boy divers than Martin, but no one in this section has ever seen them in action.

Weak In Free Style

Several of the races were close. Ralph Hipp lost the 100 yard free style to Hidey of the Academy on the last turn after holding a slim lead for three lengths of the pool. The medley relay team won its event by about 10 feet after a nice three-man duel.

Apparent in the results was the fact that if the defending state champs are weak in any department it is in the free style events with the possible exception of the 200 yard race. Sick Hess took this in good shape but the best Jack Courtney could do in the 50 was third while Hipp pulled up second in the 100.

Dick Pence, Bill Wise and Hess took the individual scoring honors each of them winning an individual race and swimming on the victorious medley team. Times marked up were anywhere from five to 15 seconds under the pool records here.

Announcement by Commissioner H. R. Townsend that the state schoolboy swimming meet would be held again this year is good news

for Coach John Titsworth's Little Giant natators who, thus far, have been champs without a challenger.

The state meet means that they will see keen competition at least once this school year and won't be doing all their practice just for the exercise. Scholastic sports may be chiefly to build the body beautiful, but what's the use of having a streamlined chassis if no one sees it. If you're in doubt about the answer, just ask any model.

So far this year the Little Giant mermen have been forced to be content to bask in the glory and shine of previous years' achievement. They have competed exactly four times—once in a varsity meet, once in the annual inter-squad affair and twice in exhibitions. And all Coach Titsworth is assured of for the future is a dual performance against Canton McKinley.

Better Competition

Just what in the way of competition the state meet will produce is conjectural. It has been said that not more than nine schools in the state are interested in the water sport this year and none of them have done enough—with one exception—to give any inkling of their power. That one is Lakewood, which has been cleaning up the Cleveland district.

But even though only a few schools are interested, the state meet should not want from lack of entries. Commissioner Townsend is urging that coaches send only their outstanding performers. That means that full teams will be entered from at least those nine schools previously mentioned as every mentor will think he has at least one outstanding boy in each event. And who is to say he's wrong until so proven in competition?

District qualifiers are out this year and it's just as well. Take this district for instance. Fremont is about the only school that even pretends to have a team. Elimination of this meet will shear the Little Giants of one of their titles, but will also give them a full team at Columbus. Speaking from a distance, this column feels that the championship affair will be closer contested as a result than ever before.

ROSS MERMEN FINISH IN TIE

Exhibition With Find- lay Y Ends 33 To 33; Results Are Withheld

The Ross high mermen and the Findlay Y. M. C. A. team finished in a 33 to 33 deadlock Thursday night in an exhibition match in the latter's pool.

CANTON TANK TEAM INVADES ON THURSDAY

Little Giants Get First Real Test As Old Rivals Swim Here

Ross high swimmers are preparing for their 'big' meet of the year, the annual clash with Canton McKinley and their first real test of the current campaign which is the slightest in the history of the sport here.

The Bulldogs will invade Fremont for a meet at 4 p. m. Thursday, a change in the date from Saturday having been necessary for several reasons.

Little is known of the Canton team this year, but it has been a power in schoolboy circles for the past decade. In fact, Fremont and Canton have been taking turns winning the state championship for the past eight years, with the Bulldogs finishing in the runner-up spot for the past two seasons.

Coach John Titsworth's team won't be at its full strength for the battle. Ralph Hipp, who swam the 100 free style and on the relay team, is now in training at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station while Leo Lehman, also a free stroker, will be ineligible to compete. On top of that, Jim Martin, the state diving champion, is attempting to enlist and has his mind on things other than swimming.

The Little Giant mermen are also a bit rusty from lack of competition as the Thursday meet will be but their second this year with the exception of several exhibitions.

CANTON MEET PREVIEW FOR STATE DUAL

Tank Battle Here Thursday Brings To- gether Old Rivals

What may well be a preview of a streamlined state meet will be staged in the Ross high natatorium Thursday, starting at 1 p. m., when the Little Giant mermen engage the Canton McKinley fish in a dual meet.

With district meets eliminated and coaches instructed to send only their outstanding performers to the Columbus fixture, the teams from Fremont and Canton are expected to again dominate the championship fight. ONLY 10 MERMEN TO GET LETTERS

Lack of competition for Ross high swimmers the past season was reflected today in the nominations for varsity letters made by John Titsworth, completing his first year at the helm.

Only 10 members of the state championship team will receive awards when, and if, the letters arrive. They are Dean Hess, Jim Martin, Bill Wise, Bob Pence and Lou Wernig, seniors; Dick Pence, Charles Fisher, Del Rakes, Cal Bristley and Leo Lehman, juniors. It is the first year that neither sophomore nor freshmen performers received letters.

Coach Titsworth also announced that the trophy won at the state meet had arrived and that a captain would be elected when the letters were presented at an assembly. The letters have not yet arrived.
