Ross opens today

Two veterans will lead Ross as the Little Giants open the 1985

high school baseball season today at Bellevue.

Chris Simmons and Mark Miesle, both two-year lettermen, are the veterans that first-year Coach Dan Fought will form his team around.

Simmons will open at first base while Miesle will be at

shortstop.

"We have a good attitude," Fought said about his first team, "but I would like to see more aggressivness. I think the kids are too laid back when thinking about baseball.

"I want them to be on the attack (mentally)," Fought

explained. "We have to go after people.

"I feel that we are inexperienced but I feel that we should

improve as we get into the season."

With Simmons and Miesle, both seniors, in the lineup, Fought will go with senior Jim Kline at catcher, Mike Shoemaker at third and Scott Weber at second, both are juniors.

In the outfield, Brett Logan will be in left and John White in right. Lee Sanchez will anchor the outfield in center. Sanchez is

a senior while the other two are juniors.

Kenny Henry, a senior, will open on the mound for the Little

Giants in the season opener.

A trio of juniors - Alan Humbarger, Logan and Bill Taylor

- are also in Fought's pitching plans.

Senior Tracy Turner is one of the infield utility men Fought will be using. He will play at any of the infield slots. The most versitle player, Fought says, is sophomore Mike Hrynciw.

"He will play in the outfield as well as the infield and he can catch," Fought said. "Plus he may be used as the designated

hitter."

Fought, a graduate of Findlay College just last spring, says he got the head coaching job quicker than he expected but he feels no pressure to work any miracles with the Ross program.

"The only pressure I will have will come from within

myself," he said.

A double play cut short a last-inning rally by Ross as Bellevue handed the Little Giants a 2-1 setback in the high school baseball opener for both schools Tuesday at the home of the Redmen.

The Little Giants stranded nine runners, including runners at second and third in the fifth and the bases loaded in the sixth, without scoring. In the last inning, Ross had runners at second and third with one out and clean-up hitter Chris Simmons at the

Simmons hit a popup to short centerfield which Bellevue shortstop Scott Collins caught while backpeddling. Collins recovered to fire a one-hop strike to the Bellevue catcher who tagged out Ross runner Brett Logan attempting to score from third. That play ended the game and ruined first-year Coach Dan Fought's debut as boss of the Little Giants.

In other games around the area, Old Fort defeated Calvert 11-10, Genoa routed Lakota 16-2 and Norwalk edged Port Clinton 8-7.

Ross had taken a 1-0 lead in the first. Logan drew a leadoff walk, stole second, moved up to third on Simmons' long fly to left and scored on a passed ball.

Bellevue tied the game in the third on a walk to Steve Falter, a sacrifice by Brian Schubert and Chris Missler's RBI single. In the fifth, the Redmen scored the winning run on a walk to Mike Strayer, Mark Hansard's single, a sacrifice by Randy Drennen and Falter's sacrifice fly. 
