Lakota, Ross 1-2 in quadrangular

Lakota won three decisions and Fremont Ross took a pair of victories in a quadrangular meet at Lakota to highlight the first day of area cross country action Tuesday.

The Raiders beat Northwood 15-50, and Gibsonburg, 16-45, as well as the Little Giants, 18-42, to start the season perfectly. Ross won its decisions from Gibsonburg, 27-28, and Northwood, 15-50. Gibsonburg made it a clean sweep of the Rangers, also winning 15-50.

Brian Smith won the meet as Lakota captured five of the top seven places overall. Smith clocked in at 16:59 while teammate Frank Contreras was second at 17:36.

Aaron Potter was third to top the Ross runners. Potter came in at 17:40.

Gibsonburg's top finisher was Steve Mitchell, who placed sixth overall with a time of 18:30.

area teams in boys cross country as well as Oak Harbor, Genoa, and Woodmore all came away unscathed.

Oak Harbor defeated Perrysburg 15-44 and Ottawa Hills 22-36 in a tri-meet; Genoa downed Suburban Lakes League foes Elmwood 18-41, and Eastwood 16-40 in another tri-meet, and Woodmore also won against an SLL opponent, topping Otsego 20-35 in a dual meet.

In girls cross country action, Lakota topped Ross 23-36 and beat Gibsonburg 15-50 and Ross also beat Gibsonburg 19-32. Woodmore edged Otsego 27-28 on the road.

Jim Reggiss took first place for Ottawa Hills at Oak Harbor, but the host Rockets grabbed the next three places to assure the double victory. Reggiss clocked in at 17:47.

Rob Friar was second for Oak Harbor at 18:10 followed by Troy Lochotzki and Randy Risch.

Genoa grabbed four of the first five spots and five of the top seven in downing Eastwood and Elmwood. The Comets were led by Ray Burrey, who came in with a time of 16:59 on his home course.

Doug Shuman was the top runner for the Wildcat boys, who won at Otsego. Shuman won the meet in a time of 18:44 and was followed by Matt Miesle and A.J. Poster who finished second and third.

The Lakota girls team also had five runners place in the top seven to defeat Ross and Gibsonburg. Jenny Scherger won the meet for the Raiders with a 20:42 effort.

Tami Stanley and Sam Augugliaro finished second and third to lead the Lady Giants. Stanley clocked in at 21:23 and Augugliaro had a time of 21:39.

Emily Kruse won for the Woodmore girls against the Knights, posting a time of 20:35.

Ross boys, girls runners win twice in quad test

Both the Fremont Ross boys and girls cross country teams came away with two victories in a quad meet with Port Clinton, Huron and Sandusky at East Side Park in Fremont Thursday.

Sandusky was 3-0 in the boys meet, while the Ross boys beat Port Clinton 16-39 and Huron 26-29 to raise their record to 5-2 for the season.

The Ross girls registered victories over Huron 19-36, and Sandusky 15-30 and are now 3-3 for the year.

Aaron Potter was the top runner for the Little Giants, placing third behind a pair of Sandusky runners in a time of 18:01 in the boys race.

Sandusky's Mike Millot won the meet in a time of 17:56. Chris Greunke was 14th to lead the Redskins, who dropped three decisions to fall to 0-4 on the year.

Three-time state qualifier Ann Gaydosh returned from a one-meet absence to lead the Port Clinton girls to three wins, beating Ross 26-29, Huron 19-36, and Sandusky 15-40 to raise its record to 4-0 for the season.

Gaydosh, who missed PC's first meet with an Achilles injury, covered the 3.1 mile course in a winning time of 21

minutes, 27 seconds.

The Ross girls were led by Tami Stanley, who finished second to Gaydosh with a 22:22 clocking. Samantha Augugliaro added a fourth-place showing.

In other boys cross country action Thursday, Genoa picked up four dual meet wins in Toledo

and Oak Harbor split with Fostoria and St. Wendelin in Fostoria.

Rob Friar finished third overall as Oak Harbor lost to Fostoria 25-30 but beat St. Wendelin 22-38. Friar clocked in at 17:58 for the Rockets, who are now 4-2 for the year.

St. Joe beat Ross 26-29 and also handled Oak Harbor 20-35 for a double victory Tuesday. Ross salvaged the meet by beating the Rockets 20-25.

The Ross girls were double winners in the girls race, topping the Streaks 22-33 and dumping Oak Harbor 16-41. The St. Joe girls were 1-1 with a 21-28 decision over Oak Harbor.

Ironically, the winning individual in each race represented the losing team.

Aaron Potter was the first runner across for the Ross boys, finishing in 17 minutes, 34 seconds, while Craig Nieset was second for St. Joe in 17:51. Jason Root was third for the Streaks.

Oak Harbor's Bob Friar was fourth in 18:55.
