Life Begins In Earnest For 70 Schoolboys Today

**Initial Football Practices Started With
40 Candidates Reporting At Ross High And
30 At St. Joe; Streaks Still Seek Mentor**

Life began in deadly earnest for some 70 schoolboys here Tuesday. Football drills got underway at both Ross and St. Joseph's high schools with a two-a-day schedule until classes start September 14, when the training grind will be pared to one session daily.

Some 40 candidates, including 10 lettermen, reported to Coach Legs Binkley at Harmon stadium while 29 boys received equipment from Rev. Albert Sprenger, taking over the St. Joe duties until a coach can be hired.

Except for some slight weeding out and a few casualties along the way, the training routine will continue for the next 11 weeks for these squads, both of which swing into competition the same week school opens.

Two Drills Daily

Mentors at both schools will hold drills at 9 a. m. and 6 p. m., both to get their charges in shape as rapidly as possible and to provide at least one practice a day for students who intend to remain on jobs until the last possible moment.

The Little Giants are drilling at Harmon stadium while the Streaks are holding their initial workouts back of Recreation hall preparatory to switching either to Lutz or Anderson fields.

Rev. Sprenger said efforts were still being made to hire a coach at St. Joseph's, but the school was encountering the same difficulties as other institutions which have found themselves without athletic tutors in this, a war, year. At present Dick Freeh is assisting Rev. Sprenger.

COACHES FIND DRILLS TOUGH

Mentors Paying Price As Grid Squads Start Blocking Drills Early

Les Binkley, Ross high mentor, and Rev. Albert Sprenger, acting coach at St. Joseph's high, are wasting no time in their football drills this year. Both mentors already have their charges doing a bit of blocking and thus far it is the tutors who are paying the price.

It was a toss-up Thursday morning as to which was the sorrest and stiffest—Coach Binkley or Coach Sprenger. Their boys didn't seem to mind it so much.

Coach Binkley stated that he has had his full squad of 41 candidates working out, a pleasurable surprise to the Little Giant boss who expected some laggards. With the exception of Jim (Whizzer) Wisbon, who is experiencing the horrors of hay fever, all are in good physical condition.

Plan Scrimmages

The Little Giants are doing a bit of blocking and may get their first taste of scrimmage the end of the week. Coach Binkley also revealed that he plans two scrimmages with outside teams before the opener with Bellevue on September 18, but kept the dates and the opponents a carefully guarded secret.

Rev. Sprenger hasn't been as fortunate as his contemporary insofar as attendance is concerned. His squads for morning drills have been small, but 32 of the expected 46 boys were out for the Wednesday evening session. The Streaks are also getting lessons in the rudiments of blocking and are in for several practice tilts as well.

Valuable assistance is being given the acting coach by Dick Freeh, former student manager and junior high cage coach who is home from Detroit while an injured hand heals.

Two-a-day practices will continue in both camps until schools open on September 14.

GRIDDERS HARD AT WORK FOR NEXT WEEKEND

Binkley Satisfied But Squad At St. Joe Is Still Small

Fremont's two schoolboy grid squads are slowly rounding into shape for season openers next weekend, the mentors at Ross and St. Joseph's highs reported Wednesday after Tuesday drills had been slightly curtailed by rain.

Coach Legs Binkley still has a squad of 40 working twice daily at Harmon field and his charges have already had a taste of scrimmage. They looked "as well as expected," the Ross mentor stated. He expects to put them through two practice games before the Bellevue game, here, on September 18, but isn't announcing when. He doesn't want spectators or possible scouting.

Squad Is Small

Jim Marinis, the new coach at St. Joe, is still commuting from Tiffin and his chief trouble is work. Not work connected with football, but work that is keeping his squad down to a skeleton crew.

Many of the Streak gridders are still holding down jobs and his morning drills have been drawing around 16 candidates and the night practices about 19. Nearly 40 boys reported last Sunday to greet the new mentor and he is hopeful of a greatly enlarged squad when classes start next Monday.

Permission has been obtained to practice in the outfield at Anderson field and the Streaks are expected to move out Napoleon street at once.

Rev. Albert Sprenger, school principal, also announced Wednesday that the Streaks' opener with Genoa has been set up a day and will be a night game at Harmon stadium on Saturday, September 19, starting at 8:15 p. m.

LITTLE GIANTS SCRIMMAGED TOLEDO WAITE

Coach Binkley Satisfied With Work Of Squad Wednesday

Coach Legs Binkley put his Little Giant football charges through their first practice game of the year Wednesday evening, a scrimmage against Jack Mollenkopf's Toledo Waite squad at Harmon field.

The Ross first team went through two 30-minute scrimmages against the Waite first squad, both teams scoring a pair of touchdowns, and the second teams engaged in two 20-minute sessions.

The Ross mentor said that he was "satisfied" with the showing made by his Purple squad, but added that plenty of work remains to be done before the opener with Bellevue next Friday night. The right side of the line was a bit weak on the offense, due chiefly to inexperienced material, and he indicated that the coming week would see some shifting of players.

Vets Work Well

Joe Biggs, Harold Fry and Lou Wernig showed up well on the line while Sophomore Jack Frantz gave promise of developing into a good tackle. Dave Brocksieker, calling signals from an end position, did a satisfactory job.

In the backfield Jim Wisbon ran well with the ball while Dick Myers, transposed from a wing berth to that of fullback, was fair on the offense but a bit weak backing up the line. Bob Demmel and Len Brudzinski held down the wingbacks and Pete Michaels and Warren Inks filled the blocking back posts in good shape.

On First Team

The entire team is expected to improve now that they are over the first game jitters. Although an effort was made to keep the game a secret, quite a large gathering of fans was on hand to see the scrimmage.

GRID BOSSES BUSY PUTTING IN LAST LICKS

Little Giants Hold Toledo Woodward; St. Joe Starts Scrimmage

One, and possibly two, more days of hard drills were in store for members of Fremont's two scholastic football camps before they trot onto the grid for their initial 1942 games.

Coach Legs Binkley, who sends his eleven against Bellevue at Harmon stadium Friday night, will halt intensive work after the Wednesday practice and the Little Giants will merely warm up Thursday afternoon.

Out at Anderson field, where Jim Marinis is tutoring his first St. Joseph's squad, intensive practice may be carried into Thursday as the Streaks play their lid-lifter Saturday night, also under the Harmon arcs, against Genoa.

Scrimmaged Toledo

The Little Giants scrimmaged Toledo Woodward Tuesday night in their third practice game and, for obvious reasons, Coach Binkley doesn't care to have a great deal said about their appearance. An effort was made to keep the scrimmage a "secret," but several hundred folks were in the stands anyway.

The Purple team, looking quite large in white sweat shirts, functioned well but had the rough spots usual to a squad that hasn't been subjected to game fire. They pushed over a touchdown on the visitors and that was the only score of the game.

It was apparent that the Ross mentor still has a bit of work to do and may be forced to shift a few players around before the season is too old. However, it appeared that he has the material with which to make the shifts. *

Ross-Bellevue Game Friday; St. Joe-Genoa Play Saturday

Both Scholastic Elevens Are Playing
Initial Games Under The Lights At Harmon
Stadium, And Are Favored To Win

The pigskin parade is rounding the block and Fremont fans will get their 1942 preview this weekend. The billing is Ross versus Bellevue Friday night and St. Joseph's versus Genoa, Saturday night. Both games are booked for Harmon stadium and it would be a good idea to get there well in advance of 8 p. m.

Both of the city's scholastic elevens are embarking on the usual schedules. The Little Giants will play nine games, five against Buckeye League schools and five will be home contests. The Crimson Streaks are playing one less and five are booked for the home town.

Purple Has Power

Anything said about the openers is just so many words. Football teams, being what they are, are far more unpredictable than the weather. The most authentic report is that both elevens look like the goods and should start their campaigns on the right foot.

Coach Les (Legs) Binkley has a crew of stalwarts working out for his second Purple varsity and it looks like one of the heaviest teams in years. Aside from weight and height, it appears that the Little Giant mentor has both speed and power. Whether he has a smart offense remains to be proved.

Less is known of the St. Joe club where Coach Jim Marinis is, apparently, working wonders. The new tutor impresses one as a fellow who knows his stuff and will put a well-conditioned team on the field, if nothing else.

Players Shifted

But the Streaks appear to have more this season. From all indications, the line will average 180 pounds and the backfield will weigh around 160. Which is a pretty fair-sized high school team.

Marinis has been handicapped by lack of time, but his team is shaping up. He will run his plays from both a single and a double wing-back from behind a balanced line.

He has made several changes, such as shifting Joe Kusma from a tackle to a back; Ed Colek from a tackle to an end and big Rip Mosser to a defensive tackle. Maybe meaning little on paper, but a lot otherwise. He has spotted weaknesses in past St. Joe teams and is out to plug the holes.

With the Little Giants opening Friday night, the chief interest today is in them. The probable starting lineup tomorrow night will average 165 pounds on the line and 150 pounds in the backfield. Sounds a trifle light and probably is, but that is what the figures say.

Redmen Use Air

It will be an all-veteran line, with Dave Brocksieker and Len Brudzinski at the ends; Joe Biggs and Bob Pence at tackles; Lou Wernig and Harold Fry at guards and Howard Tiefke at center.

In the backfield will be Pete Michaels, Jim Wisbon, Bob Demmel and Dick Myers, converted end, but don't be surprised if Willie Koebel sees plenty of service. Brocksieker will call the signals from a flank position.

Bellevue is expected to shoot plenty of passes at the Little Giants and, in practice skirmishes so far, this is one form of attack on which the Rossmen have appeared weak. The blocking hasn't been of the best, but there is little doubt but that it will improve.

The team packs plenty of punch with Wisbon and Demmel supplying the speed and Koebel, when he's in there, the punch. Michaels is a dependable blocker.

The opener Friday night should supply the answers to any questions Coach Binkley and the public may have.

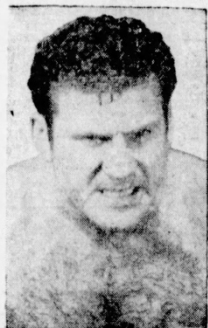

SHOW PLENTY OF POWER IN OPENING ROMP

Trio Of Sophomore Backs Promise To Push Veterans Hard

A Ross high football team that gave promise of developing into what is commonly referred to as a gridiron juggernaut, started rolling at Harmon stadium Friday night and crushed Bellevue, 43 to 0, in the football opener for both schools.

A crowd that was slightly smaller than was expected for the mid-fall, considering the balmy evening, but which was probably around the 2,000 mark, saw Coach Lee Hinkley's second Little Giant eleven in action and what they saw should have pleased them.

The Little Giants played well right perfect football, turning but once and recovering two of the opposition's fumbles. They rolled up the huge total of 340 yards from scrimmage, completed four of nine passes for 43 more yards and chalked up 13 first downs while scoring double touchdowns in the first, second and fourth periods.

Vets Must Hustle
(Using a little bit of everything, the Rossman were paced by a trio of sophomore backs in the curtain raiser—Willie Koebel, Bob Demmel and Walt Rohitaki—and it looked as though the hand-writing was on the wall for some of the veteran hold-overs.

These second year men, plus several linemen making their varsity bid, are very apt to supply a touch of competition that should make this year's club a hustling one.

With a line that played circles around the Redmen's forwards and two sets of hard-kicking, fleet-footed backs, the Little Giants had

things pretty much their own way from the start. They simply drove, drove up the field and they got the ball and were forced to punt but once all evening.

Waste Little Motion
The touchdown drives were of 42, 37, 31, 30, 34 and 62 yards, in that order, and on none of the times did it take many plays to cover the ground. Only one score came on a long play. That was the first one in the second stanza when Bob Demmel took the ball on a double reverse, scampering around his own left end and went 31 yards for a touchdown.

In the same period Warren Inks tossed a 27-yard aerial to Dave Brocklesier, who took it on the Bellevue 10 and stepped the rest of the way. The other scores came on hard, vicious thrusts of shorter length.

One game doesn't make a season, but four boys shared in the scoring of touchdowns and a fifth, Rohitaki, piled up plenty of yardage. Pete Michaels booted three perfect placekicks for the extra point, Demmel converted two and Rohitaki the other one.

Fumbles Costly
The game opened with Michaels kicking to Sanderson on the Bellevue 22 and the ball was downed on the 10. On the first play Redd fumbled, Harold Fry recovered, and the stage was set for the first score.

Jim Watson and Dick Myers led the drive for the first score which came after about three minutes of play when Myers took the ball on the seven and crashed through the center of the Bellevue line. Michaels converted. It took the team just nine plays to travel 42 yards.

A fumble that Brocklesier pounced upon on the Bellevue 37 started the Little Giants off again. A Watson to Brocklesier pass netted seven yards. Myers picked up 12 on two plays. Watson circled right and for nine and then Koebel swung into action. On three plays he went over the last line and this time Demmel converted.

Score Through Air
Bellevue was unable to gain and Sandew finally punted out-of-bounds on his own 35. Watson picked up four yards and then Demmel took the leather and went around left end for 31 yards and the score. Michaels booted the point this time.

After the kick-off Bellevue was again forced to punt, after Ed Solis had broken up a pass, and Rohitaki took the kick on his 20 and was up to the 31 before he was tackled. On two plays he made 11 yards and after Koebel had picked up 10 on a line play, Rohitaki made eight more and a first down as Warren Inks contributed a nice piece of blocking.

It was at this point that Inks sent his aerial to Brocklesier, who was clear, near the sidelines, and the latter scored without trouble. Rohitaki climaxed the drive that went 80 yards in six plays by place kicking the goal.

Sops Take Over
The Fremont attack bogged down in the third period although the Purple had possession of the ball most of the time. A fumble nipped one thrust on the Bellevue 28 and later Watson's one punt went out on the Bellevue 21. On the second play after the punt Redd fumbled and again Fry recovered, this time on the 34.

The Little Giants punched to the nine, with Koebel taking the ball on four of six plays, as the quarter ended. Koebel took up his work after the intermission and three

plays later was over again with Michaels converting.

The last scoring drive started on the Fremont 28 where Inks intercepted a Redd pass. Rohitaki and Koebel took turns lugging the ball with the latter going over from the five. Demmel made good his second try for point.

In the last two minutes of play Bellevue opened up with a passing attack that clicked three times to the Fremont 46, where the game ended.

The statistics best tell the one-sided story of the game, but what was heartening to Little Giant followers was the line play, the good early-season blocking and the sureness with which the players handled the ball. These things and the brilliance with which the crew of sophomores performed.

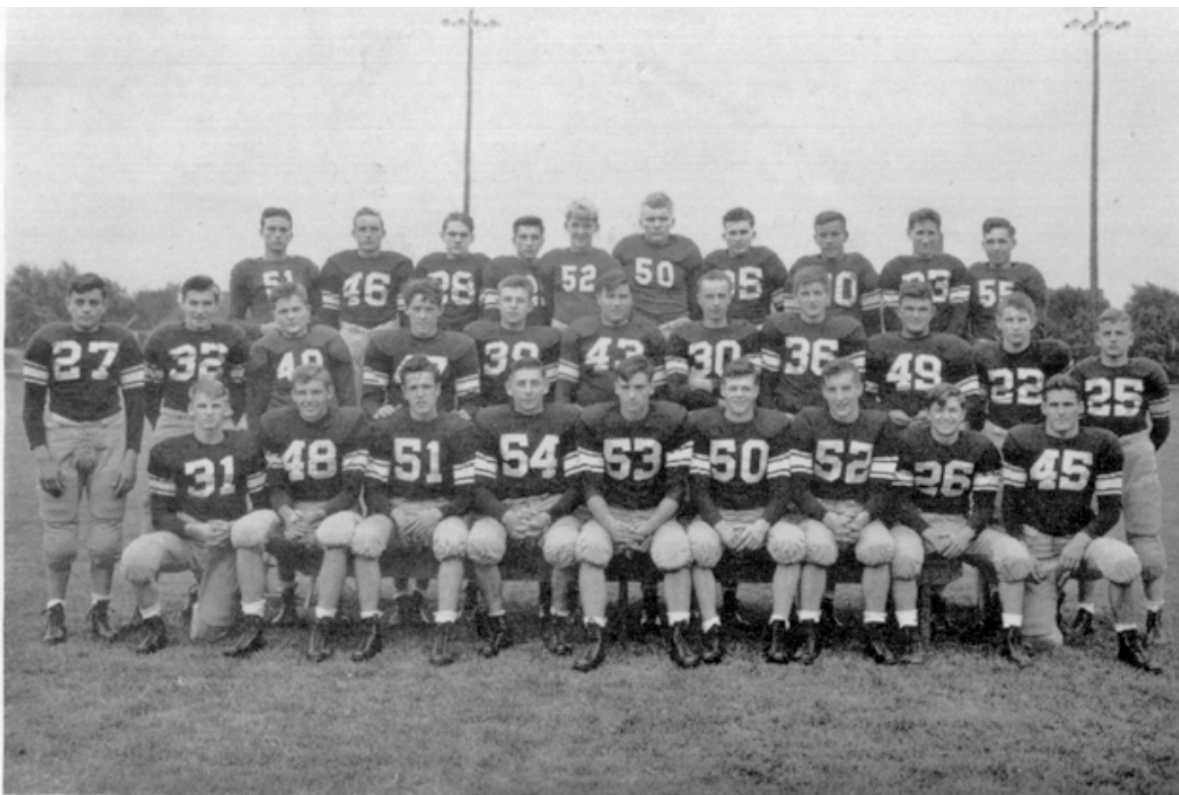
