Shaw-Paced Little Giants Favored To Cop Annual Vie

Strong Sprint Field Expected To Feature Carnival Between Fremont, Columbian, Junior Order, Findlay; Purple Seek First Title

Ross high's thin-clads hope to annex their first Buckeye league track title at Harmon field Saturday at 2 p. m., when they play host to the annual loop meet which will pit the Little Giants against four invading squads.

With four gracious "queens" reigning over the cinder-path rivalry, the track and field combine of Coach Harold (Whitey) Althoff is favored to snatch the crown left ownerless when Sandusky withdrew from the Buckeye last year.

Expected to send representatives to the Purple running grounds are Findlay, Columbian, Bowling Green and Junior Order. Fostoria, the sixth league member, is not competing in track this season.

Undeclared in dual competition, of having scored third in both the Mensfield Relays and the De Vries Night Relays, as well as fifth in the Sales Relays, the Purple team boasts by far the best record of any entry in the Buckeye affair.

Athletic Director Roy C. Ballenger has announced that gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded for the first three places in all events, with a handsome meet trophy going to the team champion and a large trophy to each winning relay team. Ribbons will be given for individual fourth places.

May Run Trials

If the field in the 100-yard dash is large enough, trial heats will be held, but otherwise there will be no preliminaries. Coach Althoff stated. Each school is entitled to two competitors in the individual events.

Competition in the sprints promises to be the feature of the meet. Although Clarence Chestnutwood of Ross is favored in the century, 220 and 440, he will be pressed by such speed merchants as Russ Wolfe of Findlay and Russ Owens

WARRIORS WIN COUNTY TITLE

Win Title Game, 11-5; Triple Play Turned In As Tourney Ends

The Warriors of Woodville high school grabbed another Sandusky county athletic crown Thursday as they defeated Green Springs, 11-5, in the championship game of the annual county league baseball tournament at Anderson field.

Coach Harry Craig's Woodville lads began their title-taking ways this year by winning the county cage crown, in both league and tournament play.

The championship game was a pitching duel between Alex Nedelco of Woodville, and Dagg of Green Springs, for the first three innings, with a triple play by Green Springs in the third, highlighting the defensive work.

Roof Falls Down

The three-way killing came with Spencer at bat, Wegman on first and Faust on second. The latter spanked a liner into Van Atta's mitts at third. He whipped the ball to Petticoat at second, doubling Faust, and Petticoat zipped the apple to Grote on first, to nip Wegman.

In the fourth frame, the roof fell down, with Woodville shoving six runs across and Green Springs five. Thereafter, the Warriors steadily pulled away, tallying one run in both the fifth and sixth and a trio of tallies in the final chapter of the seven-inning game.

Except for the fourth inning outbreak, Southpaw Nedelco kept Green Springs well in check, allowing only five hits and fanning 11. Harler Dagg only gave the Warriors eight safe blows, but eight miscues by his mates proved costly. Dagg whiffed seven. Howey Lang paced the victors with three hits.

It was the sixth straight triumph for the unbeaten Warriors, who eliminated Jackson-Burgoin in the opening round and then dropped Townsend. Green Springs whipped York in the first round.

To Make A BEAUTIFUL LAWN

First. Lime it. Most ground is sour. Agricultural lime will sweeten it. Put plenty on your flower beds and garden, too. Lime is not a fertilizer.

Second. Fertilize it. Use 2 lbs. per 100 sq. feet. Do not apply lime and fertilizer the same day. Use XXXX SoilBuilder or Sheep Manure.

Third. Rake it, sow lawn seed, and roll it. Do not sow seed the same day you fertilize. Use 1 lb. seed per 100 sq. feet of new lawn, less on established lawn. Plenty of lawn seed will crowd out the weeds.

In a recent dual between Findlay and Columbian, won by the former, 60-58, Wolfe was clocked in 10.6 over the 100-yard route and in 25.4 for the 220. Chestnutwood's time for the furlong has been considerably faster, but his best in the 100 also is 10.6.

Strong in Broad-Jump

Both Miller and Owens are exceptionally fleet in the two dashes while Owens is reported to be a strong quarter-mile as is Van Voorhis of Findlay, who was caught in 54.8 against Columbian. Other individual stars who will face the Little Giants are Dean Fogle of Bowling Green, who is expected to offer Bob Shaw of Ross his stiffest competition in the discus; Geller ofiffin in the mile and half-mile; Margaret of Columbian in the low hurdles; Howard of Findlay in the high hurdles; and Knick of Columbian in the high jump.

Besides being an outstanding sprint threat, Wolfe is a strong favorite in the broad jump, clearing 19 feet, 7 inches against Columbian last week. Carl Erchenbrecher of Ross has a best leap of 19 feet, 3 inches this season.

Oldfather Is Starter

If any record-breaking is done Saturday afternoon, it probably will be in the shot-put and discus events. Bob Shaw is favored to crack his own Buckeye marks of 49 feet, 8 inches and 120 feet, 11 inches respectively.

Shaw bested the state and Mansfield relay shot-put marks two weeks ago with a sensational toss of 54 feet, while he has whiffed the discus 134 feet, 5 inches already this season.

Elected as "Relay Queens" by Ross lettermen to represent the Little Giant school in the meet and present awards to winning athletes were June Malar, Helen Baughman, Louise Davis and Wilma White. Saturday evening, a Buckeye League Dance will be held at the Ross high girls' gym.

Meet officials include Robert Oldfather, former Ross coach and now principal at Napoleon high, starter and referee; George Grass, clerk of course; E. A. Gabel, head judge; E. A. Snyder, head timer; R. C. Ballenger, director; Sgt. U. E. Dier, honorary referee; and Don Hirschberger, announcer.
