# BASEBALL SEASON OPENED FRIDAY; HIGH BOYS WON

## Take 3 and 2 Game From York Township Team; Extra Inning Game

A regular Frank Merriwell finish featured the first game of the high school baseball schedule when the local team took a tight ten inning affair from the youngsters from York centralized school at Herbrand field Friday afternoon, 3 and 2. Cliff Pelton was the hero, a circuit smash in the last half of the tenth frame sewing the game up for the Purple and White.

The Game was a pitchers battle with Puggy Shreffler getting the verdict when Pelton, the first batter in the tenth drove the ball down the third base line and across Stone street where it was picked up by a York fielder Cliff rounded the third sack with the run which was to win the game. No effort was made to return the ball to the infield for it was too late when the fielder reached it.

Stout and Ross were the York battery and Sheffler and Wonderly handled the pitching and catching duties for the locals.

# JACKSON LOSES TO FREMONT, 8-6

Despite the cold weather, which prevented a display of anything like the form shown in the York game, Fremont high defeated Jackson centralized school Friday afternoon, 8 to 6, in a ragged game of baseball on the Jackson grounds. Home runs by Pelton and J. W. Miller were the chief contributing factors in placing the game on the credit side of the ledger, Pelton getting his with two men on the sacks waiting to score. Both came in the third inning when seven hits scored five runs for the winners. \*

Jackson started with a rush, counting three times in the first chapter on four hits and a couple of messy errors. Bowers did the box work for Fremont, and McDonald and Peters were the Jackson moundsmen. Wonderly and Mitchell were the catchers. The third inning drive sent McDonald to the showers and Peters, during the balance of the game, kept the locals well in check, but the damage had been done and his mates could not overcome the lead piled up in the third frame.

# SHREFFLER HERO OF SCHOOL GAME

## Fremont High Defeats Clyde in County School League

With the exception of the seventh inning, when he walked three men and hit three batters, "Puggy" Shreffler, Fremont high pitching ace, had the Clyde high squad eating out of his good right hand as he served up an assortment of benders that baffled the hitters of the Clyde team. In addition to performing in a stellar manner on the mound, Shreffler kept up the record of the team, of making at least one home run in each game played, when he socked the pellet for a four-base blow in the fourth, while Cliff Wonderly was resting on the sacks waiting for a drive that would send him the balance of the way around the circuit. The drive was one that was misjudged by the Clyde left fielder and bounded away to the far stretches of the field.

The first report of the game gave the score as 6 and 5, with Fremont on the long end, but a checkup of the scorebook shows that the locals scored seven runs. The error was due evidently to the failure of the scorer to remember that Wonderly was on the cushions when "Puggy" dropped his homer, the book showing that Wonderly was on the sacks, but he was not credited with the score.

The winning of the game keeps the slate of the locals clean for the period starting with the opening game of the 1926 season, to date, the team having won every contest in which it has taken part.
