WOODWARD IS INITIAL RIVAL FOR ROSSMEN

Crimson Streaks Go To Fostoria For First Game

Fremont's scholastic cagers go to work on a brand new season tonight. Local fans at home can get their first look at Coach Al Ziemke's Ross cagers who take on Toledo Woodward. The reserve game between Ross and Woodward starts at 7 which means the varsity boys get going about 8:15. The fans who don't mind traveling can catch the unveiling of Coach Bob Smith's St. Joe basketeers at Fostoria St. Wendelin's.

To a degree the two teams shape up to start this season in much the same manner as the football teams did last fall. Ross has little experience and hopes are not too bright for a winning season. St. Joe's has plenty of experience and fans are high on the team's chances.

Four Boys Set

The Little Giants take on Toledo Woodward, a team that knocked off Bryan high 42 to 30 last Tuesday in its initial contest. Four of the starters on the Ross squad look pretty set. They will be Bob Beck at guard and Bob Becker at center (the only two returning lettermen) and Dick Sherman and Charley Glover at the forwards. Either Jim Jones or Tom Lee shape up as the other guard.

Ed Nighswander and Bill Titsworth are the two other boys most likely to see a good bit of action. The club lacks height and a playmaker, but has pretty good speed and physically is a strong club. It appears as though it might be rough on defense off scrimmages to date.

Toledo Woodward brings a rough and tumble team to town that boasts of no really big man but that has three boys who are six feet or slightly better.

Coach Bob Smith at St. Joe's looks like he may be off on another running battle against physical mishaps to his boys. Potentially the Streaks are strong with three starters, Tom Yeager, Joe Young and Tom Ackerman, back from last year.

Yeager in scrimmages looks recovered from his leg injury suffered in football. He is the key man on the squad as the playmaker. Tom Ackerman, top scorer a year ago, is also somewhat of a question. Ack was out of school Wednesday with a touch of the flu and it is doubtful as to how strong he will be.

Joe Young is in fine shape and is set at a forward position. And he will be joined on the starting five tonight probably by his brother John Young. Big John can be a key man in determining just how great a season St. Joe can have this year.

The younger Young stands 6:4 and has looked very good in practice. Last year the team lacked height but if John Young gets determined there are going to be few boys who can top him under the boards.

The remaining starting post tonight probably will go to Jim Nothels. He is another boy who can really go when he hustles. Bud Gabel has looked a pretty sure thing for a starting berth but he also has a touch of the flu. Jim Grob and Don Wasserman are two other boys who will be apt to see a good bit of action. Grob is another big man and Wasserman is a good scrapper.

Fostoria St. Wendelin's presents a veteran team that lists three of its starters back and just two men gone off the entire squad. However the team had a difficult time in turning back Norwalk St. Paul 42 to 41 last week.

Little Giants Whipped By Toledo Woodward 44 To 35

Ross high's Little Giants went down to a 44 to 35 defeat at the hands of the Toledo Woodward basketball team at Ross high last night. It was simply a case of too little, too late for the Ross-men.

Woodward, which recorded its second victory of the season, having defeated Bryan earlier in the week, got off to a fast start against the Little Giants and was never headed. Woodward held a six to nothing advantage before Ross could score its first bucket and led 10 to 3 at the end of the first quarter.

The Ross cagers under Coach Al Ziemke held their own throughout the second quarter neither losing nor gaining ground and went off the floor trailing by a 17 to 10 margin at halftime.

It was in the third quarter that Woodward put on the heat to roll out in front of the Ross cagers. The Toledo school picked up 12 points and roared out into a 34 to 17 lead.

Ross Moves

Ross seemed to find itself in the fourth quarter and began to shoot a good bit more than it did in the early stages of the contest and the club crept up steadily to score 18 tallies in the final quarter as compared to 10 for the losers and finish out the game losing by a 44 to 35 margin. Ross's biggest trouble in the first quarter of the contest was that it could connect on only two out of nine foul shots.

Actually it was after the time when the only two lettermen on the Ross squad had fouled out that Ross began to move. For it was in the fourth and final quarter after Bob Beck and Bob Beeker had gone out of action on personals that the Ross squad began picking up.

Beeker and Dick Sherman, up

from last season's reserve team, shared the scoring honors. Sherman tallied four field goals and three fouls for 11 points while Beeker netted just two goals and seven fouls to also accumulate 11 points.

The Ross squad after only a few practices still wasn't ready to work together as a real team unit yet. It started to move in the final quarter but it was too late. Early in the game the team gave away countless points because of a lack of ability to get the ball into position.

Only six straight fouls converted by Center Bob Beeker in the third quarter prevented the game from being turned into a rout. Unfortunately it seemed that Beeker was the only near consistent foul shooter although he had his own troubles at the start.

Miller Fouls Out

Miller, a guard who fouled out early in the first Woodward game against Bryan, found the nets for 14 points to pace his club. Rokicki, a forward, also kicked in with 12 points on four field goals and two foul shots to take second scoring honors for Woodward.

Biggest disappointment for Ross was that Bob Beck who had scored heavily in the last part of the 1948 season couldn't get going last night and was held to six points.

Actually only five boys took part in the scoring for Ross. Beeker and Sherman tallied 11 points each while Jim Jones and Charley Glover one point.

The best promise for Ross fans was that the team did come along strong in the final quarter despite losing its only two lettermen on fouls.

Next week Ross is open with Toledo Scott slated to be the following opponent on December 14 at Scott. The Ross reserves also went down to a 38 to 15 defeat at the hands of the Woodward reserves last night.

STREAKS PLAY INITIAL GAME AT ROSS GYM

Little Giants To Seek First Cage Victory

Toledo schools provide the opening opposition of the week for the two local cage teams of St. Joe's and Ross high tonight.

The Crimson Streaks of St. Joe's will be playing their first home game of the season tonight hosting Toledo Whitmer at the Ross high gym. Reserve game starts at 7 p. m. To date the Streaks have played three games winning two and dropping one. Coach Bob Smith's crew toppled Fostoria St. Wendelin's 49 to 31 in the opener, then lost to Gibsonburg 39 to 30 last Tuesday, and came back Saturday night to take Green Springs into camp 49 to 36.

Whitmer has split even in its last two encounters. Friday night it trounced Perrysburg 52 to 29 after only leading by a 16 to 10 count at the end of the first half. Last Tuesday Whitmer bowed to Toledo DeVilbiss by a 34 to 28 score. Whitmer had held an 8 to 6 lead at the end of the first quarter but then fell behind during the second period and stayed to the rear the remainder of the way.

Tough Rival

It should be a tough game for the Streaks but if they play the way they did during the last quarter of the Green Springs game Saturday, the club should come out in good shape. In that period when it scored 18 points to the foe's four to come from behind and win going away, the team looked entirely different and much for the better than it had previously.

Coach Al Ziemke's crew tries its first of three obstacles up in Toledo tonight when it tackles Scott high. This should be a good place for the Rossmen to notch their initial win as the Scott five is not of world beating variety.

Both Ross and Scott have a common opponent in Toledo Woodward. Ross, in its only game thus far this season, dropped a 44 to 35 decision to the Woodward club.

Scott suffered a 37 to 25 beating at the hands of Woodward Friday night. Scott was described by persons seeing the game to have looked quite weak and if the Ross players show any form at all this should be where the Little Giants get on to the winning side of the ledger.

First of Three

The game tonight, incidentally, is the first of three this week for Ziemke's boys. They meet Fostoria in the opening Buckeye league encounter Friday night and Saturday journey over to Norwalk for a game.

The Ross lineup promises to be pretty much as in the opening game with Sherman and Glover at the forwards, Becker at center, and Beck and Jones at the guards. Jones had been the doubtful member of the starting cast for the initial game but he now appears to have the first string job all to himself at least for the present.

Beeker, Sherman Pace Little Giants To Overtime Conquest

Ross high wrote its first basketball victory of the season into the books last night recording an overtime 33 to 29 win over Toledo Scott high cagers at Scott

Two of the Little Giants just about took care of 90 per cent of the team's scoring total as Dick Sherman tallied 15 and Bob Beeker 12 points out of the 33 aggregate.

It was a case of doing it the hard way for the Little Giants. They started out taking a slight one-point lead at the end of the first quarter, 9 to 8, but fell behind to a 16 to 13 count at halftime. Both clubs were even during the third period with the score standing 23 to 20 at the turn into the final period. Scott was limited to just four points picked up on foul shots through the fourth period and the game wound up a 27 to 27 tie at the end of regulation time.

Then in the overtime Scott could score only on two foul shots while Ross dropped in three buckets to win 33 to 29.

Scott broke the scoring ice first in the game when Swiatek caged a goal. Bob Beeker was fouled twice in a row and connected on three of four charity throws to boost Ross into a 3 to 2 lead. Then Weyant flipped in a two-pointer for Scott but Sherman came back to make good on one of two foul shots to knot the score at 4 to 4.

First Goal

Sherman followed up with the first goal of the night by Ross but Weyant matched it for Scott. Sherman hit again for two points and Beeker plunked in a charity toss. Weyant hit once more for Scott as the first quarter ended with Ross leading 9 to 8.

Here the Ross shooters ran into some trouble as they could connect for only four points in the second quarter. First Swiatek of Scott tied the game up on a foul shot, and then Cohan put the team ahead on another foul shot. Smith dropped in two more points for Scott to boost it into a 12 to 9 lead. Charley Glover and Beeker each dropped in a foul to cut the gap to 12 to 11.

Swiatek of Scott threw in a foul but Sherman dumped in the only goal of the quarter for Ross to knot the game at 13 to 13. Smith and Berry, however, pushed Scott back out in front by a 16 to 13 lead as they dropped in a foul and a field goal, respectively, just as the half ended.

Beeker started Ross off on the right foot in the third quarter by dropping in a bucket, but Garn followed with one for Scott. Then Glover converted another free toss to make it 18 to 15 in favor of Scott.

Oberlin and Garn proceeded to dump in two-pointers for Scott and the host team pulled out in front 22 to 15. Beeker hit for two and added another point on a foul to make it 22 to 18. Berry notched a foul for Scott and Sherman hit for two more points for Ross and the score was 23 to 20 at the end of the third quarter.

Bill Tittsworth dropped in a field goal for Ross to start the final period and Beeker made good on a foul shot and suddenly the game was all knotted up 23 to 23.

Compton and Arbothnot each caged a foul for Scott to send the team back into a temporary lead but Beeker tied it up with a field goal. Sherman shoved Ross into a 27 to 25 lead with another field goal.

At this point Ross almost gave the game away on fouls. First a foul was called on Tittsworth but Weyant could sink only one of two shots given for Scott. Next a foul was called on Glover but Arnold missed the shot for Scott.

Next a foul was detected by Sherman and Weyant of Scott sunk one of the two shots given to knot the score at 27 to 27. Beck fouled just after that tying shot but Garn of Scott flubbed his shot and the chance for Scott to win in regulation time.

With the score 27 to 27, the

game went into overtime. First a foul was called on Jim Jones and Weyant sank one of two fouls to put Scott into a 28 to 27 lead. Then Sherman, Tittsworth and Sherman again hit for field goals to boost Ross into a 33 to 28 lead. Scott picked up one more point on a foul shot by Weyant but time ran out with Ross winning by a 33 to 29 score.

Team Plugs Hard

Ross had 57 shots from the floor but could make only 11 for a relatively poor 19 per cent. But despite any shortcomings in the accuracy department the team as a whole and Beeker and Sherman in particular kept plugging and that resulted in the victory.

Ross also won the reserve game, coming out on top by a 40 to 30 score over the Scott reserves.

Friday night Ross plays host to Postoria here in the opening Buckeye league game. Then Saturday the team travels to Norwalk. Last night's game was televised in Toledo.


CHRISLER SPEAKS

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LITTLE GIANTS TACKLE FIRST LEAGUE RIVAL

Crimson Streaks Out For Fourth Victory Of Year

Ross and St. Joe high basketball teams swing back into action tonight. Ross entertains Fostoria high here in the first Buckeye league contest of the season. St. Joe's goes on the road over to Carey.

Despite the fact that Fostoria has already dropped two games this season, the team still ranks as the toughest that Coach Al Ziemke's combine has had to face so far this year.

In four games to date, Fostoria has tripped up Sandusky and Toledo Macomber and been beaten by Shelby and Columbus West. Shelby turned the trick in the opening game for the Redmen by a 54 to 50 count. Last Friday Columbus West won by a 47-38 count over the Fostorians. In the other two games Fostoria dropped Sandusky 41 to 32 and Toledo Macomber 47 to 35.

Balanced Attack

Fostoria boasts of a balanced attack and speed. However, one of the top scorers for the Redmen, Ronnie Shumacher, should be missing from the game. He suffered an injury in the Sandusky game and hasn't played since.

This leaves two boys who have been consistently hitting in double figures in Jim Cotter and Ray Pastorius. These two were the ends on the Fostoria football team. Cotter is especially fast.

Another speed merchant to watch is Carlos Jackson, another member of the football team who should remember Ross as it has continually given him a hard time. Jackson is a boy capable of easily going into the double figures mark in scoring.

The game tonight in the first of two in two days for Al Ziemke's squad. The team travels to Norwalk Saturday night. Going into tonight's contest the team lists one loss and one win, both against Toledo opposition. Woodward downed the Little Giants 44 to 35 here in the opener and Tuesday Ross went up to take Scott 33 to 29 in an overtime battle.

Out For Revenge

While Ross is at home, the Crimson Streaks from St. Joe's seek a little revenge at the hands of Carey. A year ago it was the Carey team that really got hot (it hit on 50 per cent of its shots) to whip St. Joe's 63 to 51 in the Protest tournament here. In an earlier game during the regular season Coach Bob Smith's crew had won out by a narrow 54 to 52 margin.

The Streaks will be gunning for their third straight win and the fourth in five games. Only Gibsonburg has been able to defeat the team to date. Fostoria St. Wendelin's, Green Springs and Toledo Whitmer have all been beaten by the St. Joe squad.

The Streaks have been inconsistent so far this year looking like the proverbial world beater one minute and just the opposite the next. Carey is reported to have most of the boys back from last year's squad and the Streaks will need another good performance to come home with Victory No. 4.

Visitors Hand Little Giants 44 To 30 Loss In Loop Game

Ross high's basketball team went down to a 44 to 30 defeat last night here at the hands of Fostoria high in the first Buckeye league contest of the season.

For a little more than one quarter the Little Giants battled on almost even terms with the visiting Redmen. But the team could go only so far on fight and a few tactics remaining from the football season.

Fostoria had just too much height, speed, and better marksmen from long range. It was also an extremely rough contest that often times resembled a good old-fashioned wrestling match. Some 23 fouls were called against the Ross team and 12 against Fostoria.

What helped to keep Ross in the game was that the Redmen could convert only 12 of 31 free throws. Carlos Jackson was the chief offender in that department as he missed eight out of 12 attempts. But he was also high scorer in the contest with 14 points.

Bob Beeker and Dick Sherman paced the Ross contingent with 10 tallies apiece. Ray Pastorious caged nine points for the winners and along with Jackson controlled the backboard.

Fostoria started out fast in the contest, taking a 3 to 0 lead as Jackson converted a charity toss and Pastorious dumped in a bucket. Sherman put Ross into the contest with a bucket but Pastorious and Cook hit for a foul and bucket for Fostoria.

Beeker at this point caged two free throws but Pastorious hit for two more points for Fostoria. Beck caged his lone two points for the night at this point and then Beeker hit on another foul to knot the score at 8 all. Jackson tossed in a foul and Cotter hit in a field goal to make it 11 to 8 at the end of the first quarter.

Beeker Helps

At the turn into the second period Beeker pushed in a bucket to make it 11 to 10 Fostoria, but that was the closest the Rossmen came to being even for the rest of the night.

Rhude hit for a field goal and a four for Fostoria and then Jones tallied on a foul for Ross. At this point Fostoria was off and running and the Little Giants did not score for the remainder of the period.

Jackson was good for a bucket, followed by one by Cotter and then Jackson came back for another. Cotter tossed in a foul and Rhude hit for two to make it 23 to 11 at halftime.

Ross made a brief attempt to get back into the game in the third quarter. Beeker converted a foul for Ross and Cotter tapped in a goal for Fostoria. Then Sherman tossed in another foul and Beeker a goal for Ross.

Here Fostoria went off to the races again as Cotter, Rhude and Pastorious connected for field goals. Sherman tossed in a goal for Ross and Jackson hit on a foul. Beeker tossed in a foul but Cook topped it with two fouls for Fostoria to make the score 34 to 18 at the end of the third quarter.

Fast Start

Cook started Fostoria off fast in the fourth quarter with another

fielder, followed by a foul shot by Cotter. Bill Titsworth scored the first basket for Ross in the final period. Pastorious caged a bucket for Fostoria and then Jackson tossed in a foul to make it 40-20.

At this point Ross started to move. Sherman, John Allen, Sherman again and Charley Glover tossed in field goals in succession to make it 40 to 28. Titsworth followed with a foul for Ross and Cotter with a bucket for Fostoria. Sherman netted another foul for Ross and Cotter tossed in two free throws for Fostoria as the game ended 44 to 30.

Tonight Ross goes back into action again, this time taking on Norwalk high there. Next week the Little Giants play but one game and that on Wednesday against Tiffin Columbian there in a Buckeye league contest.

Ed Nighswander was the one casualty in last night's contest, suffering a sprained ankle. It was expected to keep him out of action tonight.

The Ross reserves also suffered a defeat last night, bowing 40 to 25 to the Fostoria reserves. Shafer was the high scorer for the locals with eight tallies.

Ross high's basketball team goes in quest of two items tonight, a victory over Tiffin Columbian there and a scoring punch.

And tonight is as good a night as any to find both. For Columbian has done nothing to frighten any foe in the way of winning games and it is also an extremely small squad.

To date Columbian has played four contests and won none. Bucyrus, Willard, Mansfield and Findlay have all whipped the Columbian five. In its last two outings tonight's foe has really been given the works. Mansfield administered a 61 to 35 beating and then Findlay topped that effort scoring a 79 to 23 victory.

Little Height

Columbian has only one boy, Burke Bero, who tops the six foot mark which means that Ross should more than hold its own under the backboards.

However, what Ross really needs is to find some method for scoring points. That has been the trouble with the team so far. Its defense is pretty good. But there just hasn't been an offense at all. And you still have to outscore the other guy to win games.

In the four contests to date Ross has tallied 126 points for a 31.5 average per game. In this day of fast break basketball, few teams are going to win many games in high school unless they can average over 40 points a game.

The opposition so far has totaled 161 points for a 40 point average per game. Oddly enough in three of the games played, the three losses to Woodward, Fostoria and Norwalk, the foe has run up the identical score of 44 tallies. The high mark for the Ross team so far has been 35 points in the Woodward battle.

Two Carry Load

As far as individual scoring goes Dick Sherman and Bob Beeker have been carrying whatever load there has been. Sherman has tallied 42 points in four games and Beeker 40 in four contests.

Bob Beck has tallied 19 points, Jim Jones and Bill Titsworth seven points each, Charley Glover five, John Allen four, and Tom Lee two.

Tonight Coach Al Ziemke may try a few changes in the lineup. Charley Glover may be shifted back to a guard post and John Allen, a sophomore, possibly will see more action than usual.

Sherman Sparks Offence With 13 Points For Little Giants

Sophomore John Allen had just two points listed after his name in the score book today. But that one goal was the most important he ever tallied and allowed Ross high's cagers to streak out a 30 to 39 victory last night over Tiffin Columbian there.

Sherman shoved through another goal for Ross and Schmidt a foul. Smith converted another charity toss for Tiffin but Beck matched it with a free throw for Ross to knot the score at 12 all. Turner popped in a two-pointer for Columbian. Beck followed with two points for Ross and Sherman came through again with another goal to give Ross a 16 to 14 lead at halftime.

Harger caged a foul for Tiffin to open the second half, but Jones and Sherman recorded foul shots for Ross. Harger hit on two fouls for Columbian and Becker did the same for Ross.

From the floor Ross had a very poor time of it, although one statistic did look good. Ross could hit on only nine out of 70 shots but still won the game with only a 12 per cent average.

Last Second Goal By Bob Beck Is Judged As Coming Too Late

The defeat was not just one of the ordinary one-point types. It was one where a goal was made by the losing five almost simultaneously with the buzzer sounding the end of the game. Bob Beck was the individual who threw in the goal in the dying seconds of the contest.

Whether the ball had left Beck's hands before that buzzer sounded was the question. The officials on the floor left the decision to the timekeeper. He said it had not left Beck's hands in time to count. It was a hard decision to make. But on any account it was a tough way to lose a game especially on the first day of the new year.

The game was part of the second round of the basketball carnival scheduled for Ashland that had to be postponed Thursday because of bad weather. Previously the coaches of the schools involved were to have met today to arrange a new date. However Ashland wished the game played while people were still at home on Christmas vacation. So the coaches got together Friday and scheduled the contests for Saturday at Ashland.

In the feature game following the Ross-Bellevue contest, Ashland edged out Norwalk 43 to 42 to win the carnival title.

Lead Most of Way

Coach Al Ziemke's crew led almost the entire distance in the game against the favored Bellevue squad. The Little Giants held a 10 to 9 lead at the end of the first quarter. The club walked off at halftime with a 17 to 15 lead and went into the fourth and final period holding a 24 to 22 margin.

John Allen, the husky sophomore, was high point man for Ross and also was the boy who kept Ross in the game through that final hectic period. Allen scored 13 points in all but eight of them came in the fourth session when he dumped in four field goals.

Bob Becker and Dick Sherman each tallied nine points to rank behind Allen. Becker carried the load throughout the first half as he scored seven points on two field goals and three free throws. However he fouled out in the final period and was good for only two points in the second half.

Sherman on the other hand could score only two points through the first half but took up where Becker left off through the second half tallying seven points on three goals and one foul.

Bob Beck tallied one goal in each of the first three periods. His attempt for the fourth in the fourth period was the disputed one that meant the difference between victory and defeat.

Two Face Winners

Pox and DeBlase led the Bellevue team each caging eight points while Adams popped in seven. Bellevue started off fast in the game racking up five points before Ross could hit the nets for the first time. Too Late

With time running out Bob Beck came running down the right side of the floor for Ross and chucked the ball into the air. The ball went through but the timekeeper said it was too late. So instead of recording victory No. 3, the team dropped No. 5.

In the second game Ashland won 43 to 42 with McKinley leading the losers with 20 points. Jones was high man for Ashland with 16 tallies.

That gave Ashland two wins, a 44 to 43 decision over Bellevue and the 43 to 42 win over Norwalk.

Norwalk whipped Ross in the opening round of play here 48 to 41. Next year the carnival will be held again with Bellevue and Norwalk being the host sites.
