Schahet Declines Track Position

Although Fremont board of education Thursday night approved appointment of Harold Schahet, present cross country coach at Ross high, to the post of head track coach, Schahet said this morning that he had not accepted the position and contacted Supt. A. E. Rupp relative to the appointment.

Following their conference, Rupp announced that Schahet said that press of other duties prevent him from accepting. The superintendent said that new action will be taken on the coaching place in a forthcoming board meeting.

In another board move, Gordon Hart has accepted a junior high school coaching spot, replacing Gene Smith, who was in the work last year. Hart receives a \$250 pay increment for the additional duties, and told The News-Messenger this morning that he has accepted the assignment. Smith remains on the high school faculty.

With the abandonment of high school spring football practice it was rumored that more emphasis would be placed on Ross track, building it to a major sport.

Head football Coach Mal Mackey had also held the track coach duties in the spring.
