

BEN HAYES SWIMS AGAINST SKINNER

Although pressed by Ben Hayes, Fremont Riss swimming ace, Jim Skinner, sensational University of Michigan freshman, failed to hang up a new mark in a special 100-meter breast stroke event at the Cleveland Athletic Club pool Saturday night.

Skinner, who holds the American outdoor 200-yard record, was clocked in 1:10. Hayes, setting a fast early pace, finished in 1:12.8, exceptional time for the Little Giant merman, who was trying the distance for the first time. The race was one of the events in an exhibition meet between a C. A. C. team and the University of Michigan.

LITTLE GIANT SWIMMERS IN 1939-40 DEBUT

Two Teams Selected For Annual Intra-Squad Feud At Pool Here

Although its 1939-40 aquatic card has yet to be announced, the Fremont Ross swimming team, last year's Ohio schoolboy co-titlist, will make its season debut at the school natatorium Thursday night in the annual Purple and White meet.

Co-captains appointed by Coach Bim Stults for the event, have chosen their own teams for the intra-squad tussle. Earl Christy and Ben Hayes lead the "Purple," while Jack Pavelle and Dick Spayd captain the "White."

The Little Giant mermen have been working out for some time and are expected to be conditioned enough to offer first class competition.

Back at Helm

Coach Stults has resumed the swimming helm this season after a year's leave of absence, during which time George Gruse was head mentor. Gruse this year is aiding Stults again.

Members of the "Purple" team include besides Christy, veteran diver, and Hayes, ace breast stroke swimmer, Bill Berrill, Bob Thomas, Norm Wehrmeister, Kent Rahm, Pierce Bahnsen, Paul Delp, Jack Boyer, Bob Walden, Stan Gilberg, Jim Simpson, Johnny Burkett, Jim Martin, Wilfred Lantz, James Swaisgood and Jim Nickloy.

Purple And White Swimming Rivalry At Ross Is Spirited

"Rubber" meet in the five-year-old Purple and White intra-squad Ross swimming rivalry will be staged in the high school natatorium Thursday at 7 p. m., when the entire Little Giant aquatic force participates in a regulation dual.

The first public appearance of the 1939-40 Ross mermen renews an intra-squad competition that dates back to 1934. In that year, the Purples, led by Capt. Milt Harshe, defeated Capt. Bob Brown's Whites, 78 to 47.

In 1935, the Whites, captained by Bill Sherlow, topped the Purples with Bob Booth as the leader by a 44 to 40 count. The following season, Cameron Merrifield's Whites downed Bill Sherlow's Purples, 41½ to 36½.

In a sparkling 1937 dual, Bob Waggoner's Purples nipped the Whites of Merlin Sittkus, 44 to 43. Last year, the Purple and White feud was not held.

Thursday evening's meet will find the Purples headed by Earl

Christy and Ben Hayes and the Whites led by Jack Pavelle and Dick Spayd. The pairs of co-captains were elected by their mates and in turn selected their respective teams.

Leaders of both teams declined to announce their lineups for the eight-event meet, including the 50-free style; 100-breast stroke; 220-free style; 100-back stroke; 100-free style; diving; 150-medley; and 200-free style relay.

RIVALRY KEEN AS SWIMMERS OPEN SEASON

Victors Take Four Firsts;
Schedule For 1939-40
Is Announced

Grabbing four firsts and a tie for another, the Whites splashed to a 42-38 victory over the Purples in an annual Ross intrasquad swimming meet at the high school natatorium Thursday night.

It was the first public appearance of the Little White men in the 1939-40 season and the times made in regulation meet were not disclosed, the charges of Coach Bim Stults indicated they were not sent to defend the state championship, which they share with Canton McKinley.

Competition was keen as the entire squad saw action and the outcome was not certain until the final event was staged. Jack Pavelle and Dick Spayd were co-captains of the Whites, while Ben Hayes and Earl Christy led the Purples. The leaders of both teams were in complete charge of the meet, sending their own entries for each event.

The 50-yard free style was a brisling duel between Pierce Bahnson of the Purple and Pavelle of the Whites, ending in a dead heat. Jim Nicklow of the Purples was third and Hess of the Whites fourth.

Hayes Sprints

Hayes, state breast-stroke champ, won as he pleased in the 100-yard breast stroke, just as Ed Mook of the Whites to keep even until the final lap when sprinted to finish going away. W. Wernig of the Whites was third, barely edging Jim Simpson of the Purples.

Dick Spayd of the Whites won by half a pool length over Bill Berrell of the Purples in the 200-yard free style, while Frank Franks of the Whites was third and Bob Thomas of the Purples fourth.

Ken Reed of the Whites copped the 100-yard back-stroke although he was present in the final lap by Jim Bantz of the Purples who was second. Bob Walden of the Purples was third and Clarence Kuntz of the Whites fourth.

George Held, a freshman swimming for the first time, took the 100-yard free style, followed closely by Norm Wehrmeister of the Purples and Bill Wise of the Whites who tied for second. Paul Delp of the Purples was fourth.

Diving Close

The diving contest was nip and tuck with Earl Christy of the Purples taking first by squeak over Greg Schultz of the Whites, who was second closely followed by Phil Hodes of the Whites. Jim Martin of the Purples was fourth.

The Purple won the 150-yard medley relay with Walden swimming back-stroke, Hayes breast-stroke and Berrell free style. The White team of Reed, Bantz and Franks was second. Reed built a slight lead over Walden, but Hayes outdistanced Wernig and Berrell held the margin over Franks. Gilberg, a new swimmer, gave the Purple a third in this event and the White team of Kuntz, Pence and Polter was fourth.

Spayd, Schultz, Pavelle and Nicklow teamed to give the Whites first in the 400-yard medley relay, with the quartet of Nicklow, Lantz, Boyer and Bahnsen finishing second for the Purple. Swanson, Rahm, Thomas and Wehrmeister of the Purples were third and Hess, Wise, Thomas and Held of the Whites were fourth.

Meanwhile, Coach Bim Stults announced a tentative Ross schedule of meets. Also listed are the Northern Ohio Intercollegiate Swimming Relays at Cleveland Heights, the district meet at a site yet to be determined and the state meet at Columbus.

LITTLE GIANT RESERVES COP EASY VICTORY

Swim Away With Seven Firsts; Varsity Faces Mansfield Next

Sweeping to seven firsts and hanging up one pool record, a Fremont Ross swimming team comprised mainly of reserves walked away with its opening dual of the season by a 49-16 score over Bellevue Central at the latter's natatorium Thursday.

Had not the Little Giant 160-yard free style relay team been disqualified in the final race, the mermen of Coach Bim Stults would have registered a clean sweep in all eight events.

The Ross medley relay team negotiated the 180-yard distance in 1:59.5 shattering the pool standard of 2:01.1, set up by Sandusky in 1939. Swimming the event for Fremont were Bob Walden, back-stroke; Lou Wernig, breast-stroke; and Bill Wise, free style.

Boys Swim

Making no attempt to swamp Sam Cooper's Bellevue mermen, the Little Giants had different performers in every event with no less than 18 boys seeing action.

Firsts were won by Wil Lantz in the 40 free style; Lou Wernig in the breast-stroke; Denver Franks in the 220-yard free style; Bill Thomas in the back-stroke; George Held in the 100-yard free style; Phil Hodes in the diving; and by Walden, Wernig and Wise in the medley relay.

The Fremont quartet of Dean Hess, Jim Swaisgood, Paul Delp and Messinger was disqualified in the 160-yard free style event, automatically giving the race to the Bellevue team of Klian, King, Santara and Mitchell.

The Little Giant varsity is slated to open its campaign at the Ross natatorium Saturday at 2:30 p. m., against Mansfield high, opening a tentative schedule of eight duals.

Missing from last year's team which tied for the state championship with Canton McKinley are Bob Mangas, Bob Huss, Jack Nickloy, Bob Tolhurst, Don Greetham, George Stokes, Harry Stickel and Al Tuckerman.

Junior High Meet

Holdovers include Bert Hayes, one of the nation's top schoolboy breast-stroke performers, Earl Christy, Pierce Bahnson, Bill Berrell, Jack Boyer, Dick Spayd, Russ Mook, Jack Pavelle, and Greg Schultz.

LITTLE GIANTS COP 6 EVENTS IN DUAL HERE

Coach Bim Stults Sends
Experimental Lineup
Against Tygers

With almost the entire squad seeing action, Fremont Ross high's swimming team surged to an 18-10 victory over the Mansfield normans at Rossatorium Saturday afternoon. It was the second straight dual triumph for the Purple Purples, who opened with a win over Bellevue earlier in the week.

The Rossmen, who this season are sharing the state title they share with Columbus McKinley, looked in tip-top shape in snatching all six firsts without any apparent effort.

Coach Bim Stults did not use his strongest possible lineup against the Tygers. Among the Purple who did not compete were: Jerry Ben Hayes, sensational breast stroke performer; Earl Christy and Greg Schulitz, veteran divers, and Bill Betz, Jack Bob, Dick Spayd and Russ Mook, all holdovers from last year's squad.

Frank Franks of Ross won the 100-meter race against time being clocked in 1:13, slightly more than four seconds slower than the world record of 1:09.2 set by the former University of Michigan star, in 1938. The performance automatically makes him a school pool record, since the Rossmen never before staged at the school.

Swim Two Teams

Mansfield took two firsts, in the 50-yard free style and in the 200-yard free style relay. Ross swam the 50s. In the latter event and the quarter which was not officially entered in the race, comprised of Dean Hess, Russ Mook, Jim Baumann and Bill Berrell, was the actual winner by a wide margin.

Steve Weller of Mansfield, won the 50-yard free style by a squeak over Dick Heflinger and Jack Peville of Ross, with the trio almost finding a dead heat.

Lou Wernig and Jim Simpson of Ross, staged a close fight in the 100-yard breast stroke, but Wernig won in a dead heat 53 yards to cop. Houlett of Mansfield was third behind Simpson.

Denver Franks of Ross, led all the way in the 100-yard free style by half the pool length over Gorman of Mansfield. Bob Thomas of Ross stuck close to Franks in second place until the final lap when both Mansfield entries beat him out.

Swim Three Teams

Clarence Kuntz of Ross, was in complete charge of the 100-yard backstroke throughout, winning by 29 feet. Bill Boyer of Mansfield, who was second, Willard of Mansfield, was third.

In the 100-yard free style, Ken Rahm, a freshman, splashed home a stroke ahead of George Weamer in the 100-yard free style. Wernig of Mansfield, who never figured in the race, was third.

Ross took first and second in the diving event, with Bill Hedges taking the spring board for 48.65 points, followed closely by Jim Martin with 45.9 points. Helliott of Mansfield, was third with 44.8 points.

The 150-yard medley relay went to the Ross trio of Bob Walden, backstroke; George Weamer, breast stroke, and Al Baumann, free style. Walden picked up a 10-foot lead in the opening leg. Wernig widened the gap to 20 feet. Baumann foamed home at least 40 feet in front of the Mansfield team.

As mentioned above, the Ross quartet of Hess, Mook, Spayd and Berrell actually won the 200-yard free style relay, but the officially entered Purple team of Bill Wise, Will Lantz, Jim Nickley and Paul DeJuliis, took half-pool length behind Mansfield's Cae, Betz, Gromon and Weamer.

Coach Stults also used an extra team in the 150-yard medley relay and Stan Gilber, Jim Simpson and Jim Svalsgood nearly beat the Mansfield entry.

A 100-yard back stroke race between Jack Boyer and Ken Reed, both of Ross, wound up in a dead heat. Earl Christy showed good form in a number of spring dives during the spring board event.

George Eagon, former Kenyon star, served as referee and starter, while Ellsworth Snyder was timer, and Johnny Ellsworth, Leo Binkley, Harry Allen and Carl A. Baumann and Bob Serwinski were judges. George Gruse, Ross junior high swimming mentor, was the amateur.

ROSS MERMEN FACE WOOSTER

**Little Giants Seek Third
Straight Dual Win At
Wooster Friday**

Fremont Ross high's state co-championship swimming team will seek its third straight dual victory of the season as it travels to Wooster Friday afternoon to face the Wooster high mer-men. The meet is set for 2:30.

Coach Bim Stults announced 18 entries for the dual including Ken Reed and Dick Heflinger, 50 free style; Bob Walden, Clarence Kuntz, Jr., and Bill Thomas, 100 back stroke; Bill Berrill, Dick Spayd and Kent Rahm, 100 free style.

Jack Pavelle and Lou Wernig, 75 individual medley; Jim Simpson and Lou Wernig, 100 breast stroke; Al Baumann and Dick Spayd, 220 free style; and George Held, Will Lantz, Denver Franks and Bob Thomas, free style relay.

Thus far, the Purple and White splashers have had little opposition, scoring easy victories over Bellevue and Mansfield. The next home meet is tentatively scheduled against Toledo Scott on January 6. It is expected, but not certain, that the Toledo schools will re-open after the first of the year.

Little Giants Swim To 39-27 Victory Over Wooster High

Third Straight Triumph For Defending State Co-Champions; Take Firsts In Five Events; Next Meet Will Be Against Scott Here January 6

For the third straight time this month Fremont Ross high's swimming team registered a dual meet victory without extending itself as the Purple and White mermen splashed to a 39-27 win over Wooster high at Wooster Friday afternoon.

The defending state co-champions copped five of the eight events as they finished their chores for 1939. Next meet for the Little Giants will be January 6 here against Toledo Scott, providing the Toledo school system re-opens as expected the first of the year.

Coach Bim Stults used 16 swimmers against the Generals, but again Benny Hayes, star breast-stroke performer, was held in abeyance. However, the state champion was not needed in his specialty as Lou Wernig gave Ross a first in the 100-yard breast stroke and Jim Simpson of Ross burned home second.

Diving Dropped

At the request of Wooster, the diving event was eliminated from the program, with a 75-yard individual medley relay replacing it. This event was won by Jack Pavelle, Purple veteran with Lou Wernig fourth.

Other first place victors for the Little Giants were Clarence Kuntz in the 100-yard back stroke; Dick Spayd in the 220-yard free style; and Clarence Kuntz, back stroke, Jim Simpson, breast stroke and Denver Franks, free style, in the 180-yard medley relay.

Jim Taylor of Wooster won the 40-yard free style sprint, barely edging Ken Reed and Dick Heflinger of Ross, who finished second and third respectively.

Cops Two

Taylor also surged home first in the 100-yard free style, with George Held of Ross second and McMichen of Wooster third. Wooster's third triumph was in the 160-yard free style relay in which the quartet of Miller, Porter, Jackson and Frick beat out Fremont's team of Bob Thomas, Will Lantz, Bill Wise, and Dean Hess.

Other point winners for the Rossmen were Al Baumann who was third in the 220, and Bob Walden second in the 100 back stroke. In an exhibition 160-yard free style relay, the Fremont combine of Swaisgood, Gilberg, Thomas and Delp defeated a Wooster team in 1:44. The summary:

Coach Bim Stults reports that his squad, idle since conquering Wooster December 22, has been weakened by loss of Benny Hayes state breast-stroke champ; Dick Spayd, veteran free styler; Phil Hodes, diver; and Russ Mook, breast-stroke comer, all plagued by colds.

The Purple mentor stated that "on paper" Scott looms as a threat to the Rossmen, who will have only five seasoned entries. However, reports from Toledo reveal that Johnny Boehm, star breast-stroker, is out with illness and the Bulldogs have had little training because of the school close-up from Thanksgiving until the first of the year.

Wenzlau Is Star

Chief threat of the Scotters will be Russ Wenzlau, who led the Bulldogs to a surprise victory over Ross on the grid last fall. Wenzlau is one of the leading free stylers in this part of the state, turning in a :57.3 century against the Little Giants last year.

Ben Hayes Sets New Record As Stultsmen Reveal Power

Coach Bill Stults Monday had a fairly definite idea of how good his new Ross swimming team really is, a peculiar fact for this late date, and nevertheless quite true.

Up until Saturday afternoon, the Little Giant mermen had won five straight meets, but it meant little or nothing as far as gauging the prospects of the Ross natators at Columbus in March when they defend the state championship they share with Canton McKinley.

Wernig Takes Second

Before discussing the six first place swimmers and their excellent showing, the Rossman's return of Ben Hayes to competitive swimming should be mentioned. Hayes, the first star of the season, Hayes celebrated the occasion by setting a new school and pool record in the 100-yard breast stroke.

He swam home fast in front of 1,100 spectators, using a tenth of a second from the former standard of 1:05.8 he set last season. Edged by Yard

McKinley's first breast stroke event in 1:37.5, breaking the old mark of 1:42 set by the Bulldogs in 1938 and clipped 5.3 seconds off the pool record of 1:43.6. Finishing second in the team was Jim Simpson, Jim Nickles, Jim Warden and Hayes was clocked in 1:38.1, being edged out of first by a scant yard.

Likewise, after McKinley had broken the meet record in 1:38.2 and the pool standard of 1:38.2 in coping the back stroke, the Ross combination of Bob Walden, Pavelle, Clarence Kuntz and Ken Reed, the second place, swam under the former marks. The Bulldogs were credited with a time of 1:31.4, while Fremont was clocked in 1:32.1.

Slash Off 7.2 Seconds

The Fremont quartet of Dick Spady, Denver Franks, Al Baumgard and Berrill finished fourth in the 160-yard free style relay by McKinley in 3:51.72 seconds lower than the meet mark of 3:58.2 set by the Canton school in 1935.

Cleveland Heights, anchored by Glenn Clark, also participated in the 100-yard free style this season, coping the 160-yard free style with a new meet and pool record of 1:18. The old meet mark was 1:19.6, set by Sandusky in 1938, while the pool record had been 1:18.2, made in 1934 by the same Heights team which won the national title. Sandusky finished second, McKinley third, and Shaw fourth.

Only pool record to survive was the 400-yard free style mark of 3:50.2 established by Cleveland Heights in 1934.

Real Test Coming

Taking part in the held Ross and Cleveland Heights in the team totals was Sandusky with 12. The Blue Streaks were followed by Shaw with 11, Lakewood with six and Fremont with two. Toledo DeVilbiss failed to place.

No better times for those events have been made in state school circles this season.

Reed Cuts 50

Reed gave the Purple first in the 50 free style in 27.6 seconds, touching ahead of Scott's Nick Sandoff and Bill Smith, who finished in third and fourth.

As Hayes easily outswam the field in the 100 breast stroke, hanging up the new pool mark of 1:04.6, he also swam down from his own state record of 1:05.2. Baum of Scott was second and Lue Wernig of Ross third.

Kuntz was clocked in 1:07.6 while winning the back stroke, for Ross Dodd of Scott was second followed by Bob Walden of Ross. Thrilling Race

While Hayes' breast stroke triumphed a moment's conclusion, Spayd scored a distinct victory in winning the long free style grind. He bested McKinley's distance star, Bill Smith, in a thrilling battle that saw the two swimmers back and forth until Spayd finally chopped in front to win by four feet.

As Hayes finished 10 feet ahead of Tom Olmstead of McKinley, he clipped 1.2 seconds from the 100-yard record of 1:07.5 he set as a freshman at McKinley in 1938. Lue Wernig of Ross was third behind Olmstead.

Spayd's 2:29.7 in the furlong chiseled 2.2 seconds from the old pool standard of 2:31.9 set by Falger of Cleveland in 1930. Keller, also of McKinley, finished third behind Smith in the 220.

Christy Wins

The two most important duals were achieved by Earl Christy, who won the diving with 78.43 points and by the Ross medley relay team of Clarence Kuntz, second stroke, Hayes, breast stroke, and Spayd, free style, which negotiated the 180-yard distance in 1:47.7. Kuntz lost a yard to Shirley of McKinley in the opening lap. Hayes had a half-stroke lead over Olmstead and then Spayd held off Keller to win by a yard.

Had Ross been able to cut into second place money with any success at all, the outcome might have been different. But the Purple failed to take a single point in the six individual events. Al Baumann was third in the 40 free style, won by Don Domer of McKinley in 20.8. Wernig was third in the breast stroke. Kuntz was third in the 100 back stroke, won by Harry Guist of McKinley in 1:05.3, with Shisbey, also of McKinley, second.

Schultz Third

Bill Berrill of Ross finished third in the 100 free style, won by Domer in 50.8, and second by a Bulldog teammate, Don Killian. Greg Schultz of Ross had to settle for third in the diving, as second behind Christy, was awarded to Winters of McKinley.

The Ross 160-yard free style relay team held a slight lead over McKinley until the final lap, when Smith of the Bulldogs moved ahead of Berrill to win by a yard. Christy, Ken Reed and Schultz swam ahead of Berrill in that order. The Canton quartet was comprised of Gaskins, Guist, Killian and Smith, being clocked in 1:28.8.

Ample Revenge

Purple swimmers who failed to finish with points were Reed in the 40 free style, Jack Pavelle in the 220 free style, Denver Franks in the 100 free style and Bob Walden in the 100 back stroke.

The dual victory gave McKinley ample revenge for the 34-32 defeat suffered by the Bulldogs at Fremont last season. The Purple also stamped the Canton splashes of Coach Ted Branning as favorites to gain complete hold of the state championship, as they had to share with Ross this year.

Higgins, Clark and Woodling were named on last year's all-American intercollegiate squad.


