# Level Sets Up Lone Fremont Score; Tiffinites Tough

Host Club Uses Long Pass, Run Of 30 Yards To Tie Game In Late Stages

Mal Mackey, Ross high's slimmed-down head mentor appeared before a couple of service groups in Fremont this week and mentioned a few key factors concerning the 1957 Little Giants football edition.

One thing he mentioned was that Ross high, with 20 straight victories and two undefeated, untied seasons, will be a prime target of every opponent on the gridiron this year.

He also pointed out that Ross, with no Jim Tiller on the roster, would depend considerably on the power running of 205-pound fullback John Level and the passing arm of quarterback Ron Shawl. There is no break-away discovery to replace Tiller as yet, Mackey opined.

And, the head coach disclosed at least two major weaknesses on the club which hadn't been corrected thus far. One was pass defense and the other lack of depth.

Fremont fans who walked away from Columbian Stadium in Tiffin Friday night, where Tiffin Columbian had just tied the Little Giants 7-7 in the first of three games on tap in the Tiffin Downtown Coaches' annually sponsored Preview, wondered just how strong Columbian is or if this is to be a "long" season for Fremont Ross.

The Tiffinites were no easy touch. The tie score is just about indicative of how close the two eight-minute halves contests was on the field.

Columbian closed the 1956 season with a resounding 45-6 verdict over Toledo Libbey and 17 letter winning boys off that squad were in the lineup last night. Ross had 11 lettermen back off the No. two ranked team in the state last year and most of them are being called on for two-way performances in 1957 — lack of depth a key point.

Level certainly showed that he will be one of the potent running backs in the Buckeye Conference during the fall campaign and, on one long jaunt, displayed some fancy and artful dodging despite his bulk.

It was Level who broke up a tight, defensive duel late in the second half when he exploded over right guard, and with teammates throwing blocks in front of him, raced 44 yards from the Ross 20 to Tiffin's 36-yard line. Jim Hailey and Level each clicked off three-yarders before Level again took off on a long romp, this time for 20 yards to the Tiffin 11-yard stripe. In two plays, Ross had its first touchdown of the advanced season.

Hailey moved off right guard

for eight yards to the three and substitute right halfback Bob Jahns found a hole for the remaining yardage and the six-pointer. Tom Woessner split the uprights with a point after touchdown kick and Ross led 7-0 with 2:30 left in the game.

Tiffin came right back to score at the 1:31 mark, the tally set up on a long 34-yard pass play.

Don Feasel, a shifty 165-pound halfback, ran Chuck Houdeschell's kickoff back 28 yards to the Columbian 34. After a short gainer through the line, quarterback Bill Stoner threw a long aerial to tall end Bill Stauffer on which he made a nifty catch, taking the ball away from defender "Skip" Baker and falling down on the Ross 30-yard line. On the next play, Feasel skirted right end, found daylight, avoided several would be Ross tacklers and crossed the double stripe. Stauffer's kick was good to tie the score at 7-all.

Ross tried one last desperate effort to grab victory. Shawl hit Hailey with a 10-yard pass which carried to the Columbian 45. On the next play, Shawl flipped back to Level who fired a long pass intended for Houdeschell on about the Tiffin 10-yard line but the pesky Feasel was there to intercept and snuff out Fremont's bid. Play ended shortly after on the Columbian 23, Tiffin in command of the pigskin.

Mackey kept his air weapon under wraps most of the game, using mainly quick openers with Hailey and Baker going inside and Level slashing off tackle. Shawl did throw twice, one connecting.

Tiffin quarterback Stoner was successful on two of three passes, the 34-yarder which set up the tying score and another for 13 yards.

First half was a seesaw affair, Ross being stalled on an opening drive after Baker almost broke away on a 13-yard romp to Columbian's 35. But a 15-yard holding penalty nullified that effort. Tiffin stormed back to reach the Ross 37 before time ran out in the first stanza.

Both lines appeared stingy in yielding yardage although Tiffin found the left side of the Giants' defense vulnerable on at least two occasions. Woessner, Larry Longanbach and Jack Parish stopped the hard running Tiffin backs several times and the right side of Fremont's line provided nice blocking on the "quickies."

## Ross Starters

Ross used a starting offensive corps of Houdeschell and Reuben Lozano, ends; Dick Swedersky and Parish, tackles; Jim Otermat and Woessner, guards; Dave Kohr, center; Shawl, quarterback; Hailey, left half; Baker, right half; and Level, fullback. On defense, Kohr, Lozano and Otermat departed, Longanbach, Terry Collins and Chris Young taking over.

The Little Giants open the 1957 regular season campaign at Harmon Field next Friday, little

## Massillon Turns To Electronics

MASSILLON, Ohio (AP)—The "electronic" Massillon Tigers are probably what they'll be called now.

The Massillon High School Tigers football team crushed Akron South Friday night, 33-0. But some of the credit for that win probably should go to an electronic device which the Tigers used for the first time.

The device, known as the telegraph, enables written messages and play diagrams to be transmitted from the press box to the bench. The press box transmitter has a metal wiring area with a metal stylus. As it is being used, the same message is written out by pen on the bench receiver.

The machine, made by Telegraph Corp. of Los Angeles, has been used by the Army football team since 1929. Other users include the Los Angeles Rams, Green Bay Packers, Pittsburgh Steelers and Chicago Bears.

Massillon Coach Lee Tressel said the device will supplement the booth-to-bench telephone rather than replace it.

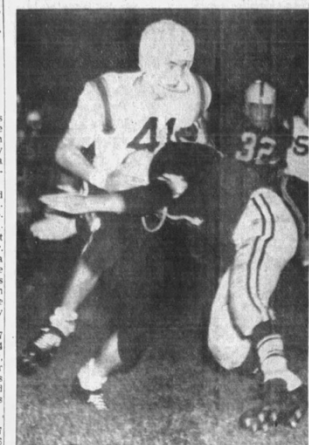

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## Win Streak Reaches 21

Heights Fumbles Aid  
Easy Opening Triumph

Victory number 21 in a row was chalked up Friday night by Fremont Ross in the Little Giants' 1957 opener at Harmon Field Stadium, probably the easiest in the string that began with the first game of the 1955 season.

Victim, by a 49-0 shutout, was inexperienced, fumbling Columbus Franklin Heights, school in its third year and in its second season of regular scheduling.

An opening night audience of 1,150 saw the heavily-favored Little Giants piddle away scoring opportunities in an hour first half exhibition but explode for four touchdowns in the third period and a pair in the final quarter.

The Giants led only 12-0 at halftime as four 15-yard penalties halted numerous drives. Richard (Skip) Baker crossed an enemy goal line for the first time this campaign on a six-yard end sweep with about five minutes gone in the opening stanza.

The touchdowns announcing cannon didn't roar again until midway in the second period when 205-pound fullback John Level crashed over from the one-yard line.

Ross looked its best in the opening minutes of the third quarter when, after Terry Collins recovered a Heights fumble of the second half kickoff on Columbus' 28-yard line, the Giants rolled to their third score in five plays. Ron Shaw swept right end for seven yards, Level rummaged for seven more and Baker, on a cutback gained seven. Shaw dug for two and Jim Halley went over right guard for the first five. Less than three minutes had elapsed in the second half.

Two more Heights fumbles and a poor punt led to three later third quarter Ross six-pointers. In all, Columbus fumbled six times and recovered only one and all five bobbles were converted into Fremont touchdowns. Fumbles were mainly the cause of poor ball handling by Heights' backfield, not the result of Ross mauling.

In the third quarter, Collins handled a Heights fumble on the 15, 19 and three plays later Level swept over from the four. Bob Johns recovered a fumble on Heights' 17 and, three plays later, Shaw fired an accurate aerial to end Chuck Housheer, who caught it on the 17 and ran unimpeded to paydirt. A 15-yard clipping, penalty moved Ross back to the Columbus 10 before the pass play clicked.

Heights' last punting game, the next series, Gene Gregory's long travel almost straight into to nearly 18 yards to the Columbus 43. Halley and Shaw carried to the Heights 28, Shaw lost two yards, muffed on pass to Johns but then rammed 30 yards down left end for the longest touchdown run of the evening.

Tom Woessner made the placement try for point after, only one he succeeded on in eight tries. Ross led 37-0 with 1:15 remaining in the third period and when quarterback Jack Lefel of Columbus fumbled a Larry O'Nieske shortly fell on the ball for Ross on Heights' 27. Shaw carried to the 22 as the third quarter ended.

With Collins at quarterback, Mark Walter and Lloyd Both at the halfback posts and Jim Streeter at fullback, to start the fourth period, Ross tallied another touchdown on a five-yard plunge by Streeter. The junior substitute for Level proved himself a capable, hard runner, gaining 24 yards in four attempts.

Third-quarter, after another Columbus fumble, recovery by Nitschke, came on a one-yard sneak by Collins.

Heights, laden with sophomores and juniors, just wasn't in the same class with Fremont. The eager sophomores, perhaps too eager, trailed Ross in first downs 22 to 8, were minus six in net yards rushing to plus 238 for the Little Giants and gained entry into Fremont territory only once—with but 36 seconds remaining in the game.

Third-quarter Steve Cecil fumbled a pass from center and guard Frank Harwich recovered for Heights on the Ross 27. But on the next play, Bob Baker's pass was intercepted by Shaw one yard deep in the end zone and returned to the Ross 15.

Shaw, also "swiped" another Heights aerial, played an alert offensive and defensive game, handled the club well from his signal-calling position, carried 19 times himself for 113 yards and displayed accuracy on pass situations.

Shaw, Collins on defense and the defensive line stood out in a somewhat unimpressive first showing of the Little Giants.

He did say the team looked better than it did against Tiffin Columbian in the Preview game, but added, "We still have lots of room for improvement." Mackey thought (Ron) Shaw was "very good" offensively and defensively and had praise for the defensive play of (Terry) Collins. . . "Skip" Baker, injured after catching a third period pass from Shaw, has a banged-up ankle, not too serious it is believed. . . Ross high band marched on the field for a pre-game number and also performed at halftime with a "Here Comes the Band" theme. . . musical instruments were featured. . . the kids from Columbus tried their best but are still about three years away from being a major contender. . . and Ross' mediocre showing might be attributed to lack of a really experienced, tough opponent. . . new Ross uniforms look classy. . . all members of the Little Giants Varsity got into the Friday contest.

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# Waite Tests Ross Win Streak; Elyria, Sandusky Clash Friday In Buckeye Conference Opener

Sandusky St. Mary, Oak Harbor Launch SBC Action Saturday; St. Joe At Lorain

Ross high's 21-game winning streak, extending through the 1955 and 1956 seasons and the first game of 1957, will be tested Friday night at Toledo when the Little Giants clash with 1956 Toledo city champion, Waite high school.

The Little Giants, winner of the Buckeye Conference the past two seasons, got off to a successful start last week, whipping inexperienced Columbus Franklin Heights 49-0.

Elmer Scallish, Waite high coach, told a Ross Booster Club crowd of about 150 Tuesday night in the Moose Temple ballroom that "Waite might have a few surprises in order for Fremont."

It should be an interesting game," he commented. "Naturally, we would like to be the team to halt Fremont's long winning streak."

Coach Mal Mackey of Ross high worked his first defensive unit against Waite plays the early part of the week and spent the remainder of pre-game drills in polishing his expected T-formation, formation and single wing offense.

The Little Giants are in good shape physically with only two major injuries. Linebacker Chris Young sustained a fractured right arm in the Monday practice session and will be out of action for several weeks. Right halfback Richard (Skip) Baker suffered an ankle injury in the Heights game but is expected to see some action Friday.

At least 3,000 Fremonters are expected to be in Waite Stadium Friday to back the Little Giants. Included will be the newly-formed Boosters-sponsored Adult Pep Band, organization that "pepped up" proceedings at the Booster rally Tuesday.

Ross has 11 letterman returnees, nine expected to start in the offensive lineup against Waite. Of the 11 offensive starters, six are seniors and five juniors.

The Giants have no break-away threat this year as they had the last several seasons in Jim Tiller, but have a power runner in 205-pound senior fullback John Level and a pass-run threat in senior quarterback Ron Shawl. Shawl handles quarterback duties from the T-formation and assumes the role of tailback in the lesser-employed single wing.

"Hard-nosed" Jim Halley, senior halfback and either Baker or Bob Jahns give the Giants a threat in quick openers and on wide sweeps.

Sands weighs 175. Bennett 170, halfback Hickle, 180-pound junior and Lucas, 150.

Defensively, Coach Schmidt usually calls on huge junior Gene Bird, 245 pounds, and sophomores Dave Bushong, 160 and Steve Kuhlman, 165.

Most of the offensive starters for Findlay are seniors.

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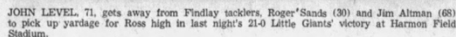

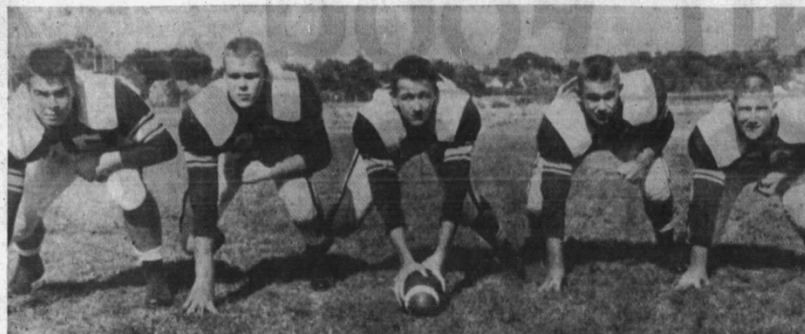

IOWA CITY, Iowa (U)—Iowa confronts Michigan again Saturday in the 19th renewal of the Hawkeyes' most frustrating football relationship.

The weird outcomes of some of the previous 18 meetings have gone far to popularize the belief Iowa is jinxed by the Wolverines.

And that one Iowa coach, who has wanted most to beat Michigan has had the most discouraging results. He is Forest Evashevski, who as a great Michigan quarterback in 1939 had an important part in administering one of the 15 Iowa defeats.

Evy's Iowa teams have lost the last four years to his alma mater by a total of 17 points. That figures to less than a touchdown a game.

On all but one of those occasions the Hawkeyes led by two touchdowns at halftime and in three instances they nursed a touchdown lead going into the final 15 minutes of play.

In 1953 and 1954—the first two seasons Evy's teams played Michigan—the Wolverines escaped with 14-13 victories. The next year it was 33-21 after Iowa carried a 21-13 lead into the final quarter.

Last fall only 66 seconds separated the Hawkeyes from their third triumph in the series. But again Michigan prevailed 17-14 after an 80-yard march which consumed most of the remaining 10 minutes of the game.

The Iowa-Michigan series was inaugurated Nov. 10, 1900 at Bennett Park in Detroit. Iowa, performing with "vim, dash, snap and precision," according to a periodical of that day, won 28-5. Michigan's revenge the next two years was devastating. On Thanksgiving Day in Chicago in 1901 it won 30-0, and the following season, when Fielding H. Yost fielded his first point-a-minute

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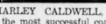

# Woodrow Wilson Could Be Tough, Ross Coaches Instruct Gridders

Coaching staff of Ross high school, conscious of a letdown after convincing Little Giants' victories over Elyria, Lorain and Marion Harding, had this reminder for team members this week:

Although Youngstown Woodrow Wilson has been able to win only once this season (18-0 over Youngstown East), the invaders lost two of their six reversals by

Longanbach was in the Toledo Waite and Marion's backfield all evening, has put the pressure on foes' passers and runners all season. His charges from middle guard have been outstanding. Swedersky played a bang-up game against Marion, Parish has been a consistent performer all year and Houdeshell and Lozano have improved considerably at end play.

An encouraging note for next season... Tom Woessner, Jim Oeternat, Dan Coleman and Terry Collins, doing fine jobs at inner linebacking spots, are all juniors.

Level and Hailey, at defensive halfbacks, are sure tacklers and hard hitters. Shawl at safety. Level and Hailey lately have been stopping enemy passing games with their interceptions.

Best defense against passing, as demonstrated especially and effectively by Longanbach, Swedersky and Parish is a rush on the passer. Opponents have thrown 70 times, completed only 17 for 210 yards. Ross has passed 53 times, completed 14 for 228 yards.

## French-Algerian Halimi Crowned Bantam Champ

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A rugged little French-Algerian named Alphonse Halimi Wednesday night outslugged and outboxed Raul Macias of Mexico for the undisputed world bantamweight championship.

A crowd of 20,000—at least 8,000 of them countrymen of the Mexican fighter—were on hand when the two little scrappers squared off under the dazzling ring candleabra at Wrigley Field.

The night was coolish, but the fighters set a torrid pace over the 15-round route which ended in a split decision.

As expected, Halimi, rock-hard onetime Algerian street fighter, tried to turn the nationally televised match into a slugfest.

Macias, renowned for his boxing deftness, played the Frenchman's game. In the early rounds, the little gamecocks battled head-to-head in bruising in-fighting. "Box him, box him," urged Macias' manager, Pancho Rosales. "I can't jab him," said Macias, bleeding from the nose. "He's on top of me. I can't keep him away."

Nevertheless, Macias fought Halimi on fairly even terms. Both landed some dandy hooks to the body and head. But neither was shaken badly.

"In the sixth I realized I couldn't knock him out, so I knew I'd have to box him," Halimi said later.

Halimi switched from in-fighting to long range jabbing about the 10th round, and proceeded to beat the Mexican at his own game. He held a reach advantage of almost two inches and made the most of it, pulling ahead on all score cards in the last five rounds.

The split decision was greeted with lusty boos by the Mexican's constituents.

Referee Mushy Callahan cast his vote for Macias, 144 to 141, under California's 10-point system.

Judges Frankie Van and Dynamite Jackson decided the bout. Van carded 148-141, and Jackson 147-147 both for Halimi, who had been recognized by the World Boxing Championship Committee and Boxing Union of Europe. The Associated Press scored it even, 146-146.

Then why don't the eggs hatch and the chicks grow up? Well, it seems that a hen pheasant is like a woman in Hong Kong, — or Brooklyn. When she is overcrowded, she finds it difficult to be a good mother. Eggs are laid, but abandoned.

But, enough of them make it so that all the available food and elbow room on Pelee Island are used every year. If the food supply is reduced, or bad storms occur at nesting time, the crop will be light that year. But, the hunting season of the previous year has nothing to do with that.

The Game Section of the Ohio Division of Wildlife is well aware of all this. That's why they are gradually lengthening seasons on certain species. Their job is to provide the maximum of recreation for the people without jeopardizing the wildlife resource.

## Level's 70-Yards In Air Aerial Sparks Little Giants To Fourth Quarter Comeback

A satellite was launched in Harmon Field Stadium Friday night which salvaged a bit of prestige for all-conquering Fremont Ross high school, still undefeated after 30 straight games but with a tie now marring the long victory string.

Underdog Toledo Scott, outplaying the Little Giants most of the game, struck for two touchdowns and an extra point in the third period, then held off a Level-bomb attack in the fourth quarter to deadlock Fremont 13 to 13. The made Ross high's record for 1957 read 9-0-1 and Scott's 4-3-3 (third tie this year for the Bulldogs).

There was little to shout about for the partisan throng of over 5,000 in the stadium as the Little Giants wasted two scoring opportunities in the first period and one in the second, endured a devastating Scott attack in the third quarter and finally came to life in the final 12 minutes.

It was an electrifying and unbelievable 70-yard pass thrown by All-Ohio point guard John Level, 200-pound senior fullback, playing his final game, that changed a lethargic Ross demonstration into a fighting, take charge troop.

At the 11:30 mark of the first half, Scott gained the upper hand in the third quarter with two quick touchdowns. The Bulldogs caught an early pass from Lewis, guard Dan, who passed for 7-22 to play the third stanza.

A level kick was returned to the Scott 41 from where coach horseback Stanley Cole, fleet fullback Eddie Scott and quarterback Frank Lewis added the Ross line to reach the Fremont 15. Lewis failed back, hit end Louie McNell with an aerial pass on the Ross 25 from where he ran in to break the stalemate. Frank Lewis added the extra point.

Following an exchange of punts Mark Walter fumbled down in Ross territory. Scott recovered on the Fremont 19. Ross tried to reach the 15 and Cole ran the rest of the way for another victory touchdown. Level broke through to block Scott's try for the extra point.

More Mackey comments: "Not winning but we're not ashamed... the boys really came back in that fourth period."

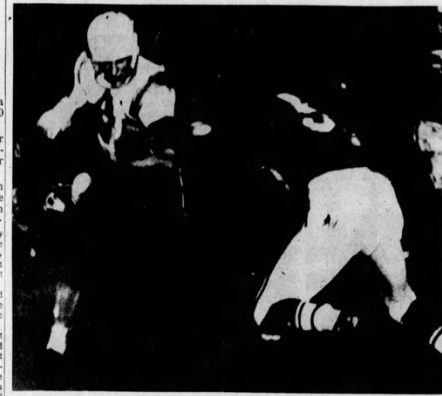

# Fremont Coach Edged In Poll's Closest Vote

Player From Dayton

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—In the closest finish in the history of The Associated Press poll, Gene Slaughter of Warren's Panthers today was named Ohio's high school coach of the year. He succeeds Wade Watts of Canton McKinley, winner the last two years.

Slaughter picked up the remnants of a team which had won five of 10 games a year ago and manufactured a powerhouse which grabbed nine of 10 contests in his first year at the Panther helm.

The lone loss was by six points to Massillon, in which the Tigers scored the winning points in the last four seconds of an extra fourth-period minute allowed by a defective clock.

The new head man of the scholastic coaching fraternity is a graduate of Capital University in Columbus. He's 31 years old, and prepped for the big job at Warren by coaching two years at South Point and five at Jackson, at both of which he had outstanding success.

With several hundred coaches, sports writers, sportscasters and officials voting, Slaughter nosed out Fremont Ross' Mal Mackey by only two ballots. Mackey, who suffered a heart attack last year and turned the Little Giants over to his assistants, came back this season to post his third straight unbeaten campaign.

Augie Bossu of Cleveland Benedictine's unbeaten Bengals was third, and Lou Juillerat of Troy, who has a 27-game winning streak in the works, was fourth.

Others high on the list included Hilton Murphy of unbeaten Toledo Devilbiss, Ben Wilson of undefeated Mt. Vernon, Lou Florio of Hamilton, Lee Tressel of Massillon, Tom Ballaban of Cincinnati St. Xavier, Larry Peterson of Lancaster, and Gil Smith, whose Van Wert Cougars haven't lost a game since 1954.

In a "sentiment-finding" vote which has no bearing on the final selections, The Associated Press voters tossed Mackey and Slaughter into a deadlock as choices to coach the Northern All-Stars in next August's North-South game at Canton. Juillerat was the runaway choice for the "Rebel" berth, with Wilson of Mt. Vernon second.

The Ohio High School Football Coaches Assn. will select the North and South all-star coaches, with only members of the group having a vote.

Back of Mackey and Slaughter in the northern race were Bossu, Murphy, Tressel, Leo Strang of East Cleveland Shaw, and Joe Knapp of Campbell Memorial. No others were mentioned.

In the south the closest to Juillerat and Wilson were Peterson of Lancaster, Jim McCarthy of Cincinnati Purcell, Florio of Hamilton, Smith of Van Wert, Howard Baughman of Portsmouth, Jim Vennari of Rutland, and Dick Pfeiffer of Gahanna Lincoln.

In other voting Bobby Ferguson of Troy, who has gained 5,521 yards and scored 578 points in four years, was named the state's best offensive back. Middletown's 220-pound 6-4 quarterback, Jack
