Ross Harriers Compete in State Event; Toledo Scott is Big Favorite

Harriers of Fremont Ross high school were in Columbus Saturday for the annual state cross country meet. Seven Fremont hill and dalers made the trip to compete with 113 boys from various other schools.

Toledo Scott, winner of the northwestern Ohio meet, was a big favorite to retain its honors, but the race for individual laurels was wide open.

Bajenski of Akron East loomed as the runner to beat in the individual event, while Cincinnati Hughes and Cincinnati Withrow were considered threats to Scott in the five-man meet.

Bajenski pounded over the two mile course in 10:01.7 in the Akron district meet. Wade Campbell of Fremont copped first honors last year.

BUCKS PICKED TO TURN BACK CHICAGO TEAM

Ohio State Is Crippled For Big Ten Combat With Maroons

Hopes for a first division spot in the Western Conference campaign hung in the balance today for Ohio State and Chicago. The teams are tied in fifth place with one victory in two starts.

The Bucks were favored to down the Maroons here today because of their reserve strength. Ohio will be minus two of its best halfbacks, Johnny Bettridge at right through scholastic ineligibility, and Joe Williams at left because of injuries, but Frank Antenucci and Mike Kabealo are slated to fill those spots without loss of strength.

The Ohioans wound up their preparation with a long signal drill Friday afternoon. The Maroons spent most of the day on the train and had no time for a workout after arriving early last evening.

A year ago the Maroons caught Ohio the week after the Bucks lost to Notre Dame, and Chicago took a 13-0 lead at the half. The Bucks came back strong in the closing
