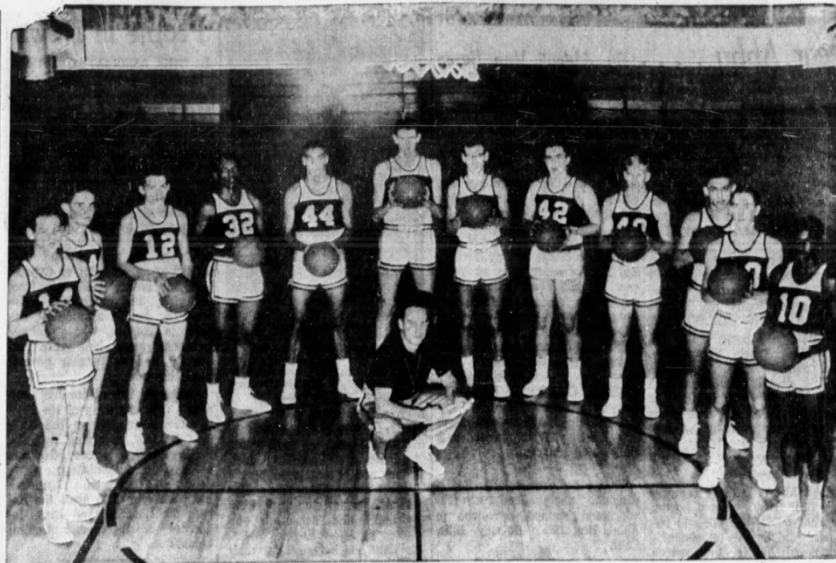

Dick Norman Takes More Experience Into Fremont Cage Season Than Last Year, Hustle Termed Good

Ross basketball fortunes zoomed over the .500 mark last season for the first time in several years. The man who has been given a lion's share of credit for this improvement is Dick Norman, now entering his second year as head basketball mentor at Fremont.

Ross and fourth as coach here. Norman's crew advanced all the way to the Toledo district before bowing.

Can Ross do it again? "Well, we have a little more experience this year," comments Norman, who will be assisted again by Don Purvis, in his second season.

"Some of our players have improved considerably, and the spirit of each boy has been excellent—the desire to win is high," he adds.

Ross will build around four letter winners and two who saw both varsity and reserve action in 1961-62. Veterans back are Dick Hufford, 6-2 forward senior; Jim Davis, 6-1 forward senior; Frank Moore, 6-3 senior center; and Alex Hyzer, 6-0 senior guard.

Bill Feagins, 5-8 senior guard, and John Prosser, 6-0 senior guard, also are fighting for positions.

Moore, who is best remembered for his stellar rebounding-scoring game last year against Tiffin Columbian when he totaled 20 in each column, is back and ready to man the center position. "He is consistently a good rebounder and I hope his scoring this year can become a little more consistent," says Norman, who wants it known that all positions still are wide open and available.

Norman is happy to have back first team all-Buckeye Conference forward Davis, the team's leading scorer and a top flight rebounder. Davis is effective from both long and short range and he is expected to shoulder much of the scoring load again.

Of Hufford, the coach says, "He is a steady player, will get his share of rebounds and I hope his share of points. He is in very good shape after working out with the cross country team and he has a lot of pep and hustle."

Hyzer, the fourth letterman, is in a tense battle with Prosser, Feagins and Dave George, 5-11 junior, for one of the starting

guard spots. He is a southpaw who likes to drive.

Prosser still has to find his basketball legs after starring with Mal Mackey's football outfit. Norman noted that he did an outstanding job in tournament games last year and, along with Feagins, showed a lot of improvement.

Feagins is a good ball-handler, but has lacked varsity experience," states the coach. He has a fairly good jump shot from outside the foul line but may not be strong enough to push them up from far out.

Ned Peddicord, 6-1 junior, also is fresh off the gridiron and is battling for a berth as either a forward or center. Presently, he is backing up Moore.

Up from the reserves is Wally Smalllets, tallest cager on the team at 6-7. The junior has come a long way from this point a year ago and the coaching staff has high hopes for him. Also up from the reserves are Dave George, 5-11 junior guard, Jerry Binder, 5-11 junior forward, and Don Binkley, 6-1 junior forward.

The only sophomore on the squad is Russ Hagerty, 6-0 guard pros-

pect who led the ninth grade in scoring last year. He has fine potential.

Overall, Norman feels he has fair height, fair speed and untested depth. "I've been pleased with the defense so far, although we have no outstanding defensive player. Everyone picks the other up."

Davis and Prosser are considered the best shots on the team at this point.

"Insofar as the Buckeye Conference is concerned," Norman points out, "our speed will be about average. We won't run unless the opportunity presents itself. Our height also is about average in the conference."

Norman thinks the conference will be "tough this year," and he looks toward Sandusky as the team to beat. "Mansfield and Lorain Admiral King will make the conference stronger."

Norman believes Findlay will be strong but Marion, Elyria and Lorain Senior possibly a little weaker because of graduation.

Biggest problem at this time for Norman is how well the guards come through. Eventual success of

the team may depend upon this factor.

Ross opens play Friday night in Port Clinton at 7 with the reserve game. The following week Mansfield is here for the league opener.

Yanks Part With Skowron To Get Dodgers' Williams

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP)—The Los Angeles Dodgers and New York Yankees, two of baseball's powers, were squarely on the spot today following a daring major inter-league trade that sent first baseman Bill Skowron to the Dodgers in exchange for front-line pitcher Stan Williams.

Yankee manager Ralph Houk admitted he was loath to part with Skowron, 31, who helped bring

Tom Beier is the only starter back for St. Joe from that outing. Beier, who netted 10 counters in defeat, scored the team's last

The unusual aspect of the Ross-Port Clinton game here last year was that Frank Moore's only basket of the game at 2:07 of the fourth period gave the locals a 40-38 edge they never surrendered.

Ross Shows Good Balance In 47-36 Nod

Overcoming a hot, cramped playing area, the Fremont Ross Little Giants successfully opened their 1962-63 basketball season in Port Clinton Friday night, winning 47-36 after a stellar third quarter that saw Fremont pump in 15 counters and pull away to a 13-point lead.

The effort was one in which the entire team contributed a share toward victory. Jim Davis, a little tense and having an off night, was high for the Little Giants with 10 points. Center Frank Moore, a demon on the back boards, was next with nine, and John Prosser and Alex Hyzer chipped in with eight apiece.

Fremont's one bad spot was at the foul line where the Little Giants hit only 11 of 27 free throws for a poor 40 per cent. "I can't understand that, either," said Coach Dick Norman. "We had been hitting about 22 of 25 in practice."

Zone Defense

Norman, who tossed a zone defense against the Redskins on the tiny floor (the playing area is built on a stage), said he was well pleased with the team's performance on this the opening night.

"I liked our hustle, we were hustling all the time," he commented. "Yes the small floor bothered us. We couldn't get our patterns underway."

Ross opened fast and took a 7-0 lead before Port Clinton registered. Dick Prosser and Hyzer contributed the markers. Port Clinton managed eight points before the first quarter closed, thanks largely to the six made by Larry Wiley, who entered the fray after three minutes had elapsed.

Ross found cold shooting the second quarter and left at half time with a 20-15 margin. Hufford picked up three personals by this time but played it close to the vest thereafter.

Coming Back

Port Clinton showed signs of coming to life early in the third quarter and had cut into the Giant lead until Ross was down to a four-point lead, 24-20. Then Hyzer, Prosser and Davis went to work and Ross rallied for 11 straight points to bust it open at 35-20. Soon after the fourth period started, Norman began substituting and had his bench cleared by game's end.

Coach Don Purvis' reserves showed well in the initial contest, building up an 8-2 first quarter lead, holding off a second period assault and then running away to a 32-17 triumph. Port Clinton did not score in the third quarter.

Don Binkley and Russ Hagerty each had nine points to pace the reserves, who also used the zone defense to good advantage.

Next Friday, Ross opens its home slate with a Buckeye Conference game against Mansfield. Saturday, the Little Giants are in Fostoria.

Duke Takes 90-70 Win Over Vandy

Jeff (Pork Chop) Mullins and Jay (Bird) Buckley provided enough ammunition to overcome a bad night by Art Heyman, who was limited to 13 points, as second-ranked Duke rapped Vanderbilt 90-70 Tuesday.

Buckley probably is the key to Duke's fortunes this season. Heyman and Mullins are proven commodities. But the 6-foot-10 junior has to prove he's tough enough to tangle underneath the boards. Heyman was held to 13 points by the Commodores, but the Pork Chop-Bird combo took up the slack. Mullins wound up with 22 points and Buckley finished with 21. Vandy sophomore Roger Schurig took scoring honors with 30 points.

Mounties Breeze
Only one other top-ten team was in action, Sixth-ranked West Virginia, led by peppery Jim McCormick, outlasted Richmond 78-69 in a Southern Conference game. In another Southern game, VMI topped George Washington 74-73. Elsewhere on the conference scene, North Carolina State used a jump shot by John Key with 2 seconds remaining in overtime for a 76-74 decision over Maryland, and Vermont defeated New Hampshire 78-73 in a Yankee Conference clash.

In other top games, Notre Dame sophomore Walt Sahm and Larry Sheffield scored 27 and 24 points, respectively, as the Irish shipped Western Michigan 82-68, sophomore James King sank a foul shot after time ran out in overtime for Oklahoma State's 46-5 triumph over Arkansas and Santa Clara spilled Wichita 72-67.

Snaps Loss Skin
William & Mary snapped an 18-game losing streak on the road with Roger Bergey's basket providing the winning margin in a 71-69 victory over Virginia. Duquesne won its fourth straight when State did the same, 62-48, over Colgate and Rutgers snapped Columbia's winning streak at three, 6-8.

Gerry Ward held Yale ace Rick Laminsky to four points and scored 13 as Boston College upped the Elis 58-37 and Wake Forest limited Billy Hoy to three points while breezing to a 75-46 triumph over St. Joseph's Pa.

In some of the others, Washington State defeated Gonzaga 70-66, Air Force topped Hardin-Simmons 8-37, Baylor belted Trinity, Tex., 6-70, Villanova crushed Scranton 8-63, Texas A&M thumped South Mississippi 87-41, Maine beat Bates 64-57, Boston U. wallowed off 78-58, and Fresno State knocked off San Jose State 57-42.

Green Bay Dominates All-NFL Squad With 10 Selections; Giants Have Four

NEW YORK (AP)—Green Bay already has locked up 10 positions on the 22-man National Football League All-Star team selected for The Associated Press although the Packers still have not clinched the Western Conference title.

The New York Giants, who meet the Western winners for the league championship Dec. 30 at Yankee Stadium, put four men on the club selected by a committee of sports writers and broadcasters from the 14 league cities. Detroit trailing the Packers by one game with one to play, also placed four men on the team.

First Browns' Choice, Tom Hutchinson, Signs

CLEVELAND (AP) — Tom Hutchinson, the Cleveland Browns' first choice in the National Football League draft last week, signed a 1963 contract with the club Tuesday.

The 6-foot-1, 189-pound end from Kentucky was a three-time All-Southeastern Conference selection, the only lineman to gain that distinction in the history of the conference.

Green Bay wound up with fullback Jim Taylor, right end Ron Kramer, tackle Forrest Gregg, guard Jerry Kramer and center Jim Ringo from its offensive unit on the All-Star team. The Packers' defensive group contributed end Willie Davis, tackle Henry Jordan, linebackers Dan Currie and Bill Forester and corner back Herb Adderley.

Title Makes It
Y. A. Tittle, the Giants' quarterback, and Del Shofner, his favorite passing target, made the offensive team along with big Roy Brown at tackle. Jimmy Patton, veteran safety man, was named on defense.

As befits a club that leads the league on defense, Detroit placed four men on that unit, led by 256-pound Roger Brown at tackle, middle linebacker Joe Schmidt, corner back Dick (Night Train) Lane and safety Yale Lary. Jimmy Brown, Cleveland's fullback who normally is a must for any All-Star team, and Green Bay's injured Paul Hornung, player of the year in 1961, failed to make the team.

Jim Parker of Baltimore, used both at guard and tackle, was picked at guard. Don Perkins of Dallas was

named to a running back job along with Taylor, who had scored 18 touchdowns, tying the league record. Bobby Mitchell, the fleet back traded to Washington by Cleveland, made it at flanker back as the leading pass receiver. The 36-year-old Tittle, with his 27 touchdown passes, rounded out the starting backfield.

Gino Marchetti, Baltimore's veteran defensive end, was the only "outsider" to crack the Green Bay-Detroit-New York axis on defense.

Mansfield Can't Hold Davis, 52-51

Jim Davis' sparkling performance of 24 points, plus some accurate shooting from Frank Moore under the boards paved the way to a tense 52-51 Buckeye Conference victory for Ross over Mansfield here Tuesday night before a sparse crowd.

Each team held brief six-point leads at one time during the rather raggedly played contest witnessed by an enthusiastic crowd that half-filled Ross high gym. The issue was in doubt right up until the final horn even though the Little Giants held possession during the final 22 seconds in a well-handled stall. Mansfield did not try to foul as the final seconds ticked off the clock—which, incidentally, was dead the entire first half but came to life the second half after repairs were made.

First Loss
Thus Mansfield suffered its first setback of the young season in this the opener for the Tygers. Ross, which earlier had defeated Port Clinton, now stands 2-0 and holds first place in the Buckeye Conference.

Ross' six-point lead was earned in the early moments of the fourth quarter but came back with eight the second and six more the third, hit six of the first eight Jim Davis points to open this period. Moore, connecting on spinning lay-ins, contributed a goal to go along with Davis' shooting as Ross pulled away from a 40-40 third quarter tie to lead 48-42 with about two minutes gone in the final stanza.

Stubborn Mansfield charged back on the sharp shooting of Willie Hawthorne and Jeff Payne to pull the Tygers to within two again at 48-46.

Over Defenders
Davis shot over two defenders and hit. Ross held a 50-48 lead. Mansfield big center Jim Carson popped in a free throw and Hawthorne added a bucket but missed on a three-point play and the count was 50-49 with 2:40 remaining. Hawthorne the next time was successful on a free throw after getting bumped by John Prosser, playing despite feeling the effects of the flu. At 1:38 it was tied at 50-50.

What proved to be the clincher came at 1:04 when Moore dropped in two free throws for a 52-50 Fremont margin.

Mansfield took possession and ran the clock down to 37 seconds before calling time out. Four seconds later Mansfield's Jim Goode was at the free throw line for a one-and-one situation which could have tied the count. He made his first shot but was short, the second try.

Sill Mansfield rebounded and put up two unsuccessful shots. With only 22 seconds showing on the board, Ross had control and the combination of Prosser, Moore, Dick Hufford, Bill Feagin and Davis wove a pattern that kept the ball away from the eager Tygers.

Highlight of the game was the sharp shooting—what little they did—of the Little Giants. Ross attempted only 44 shots but made 21 for a superb 48 per cent from the field. Add 10 of 14 charities and it comes out a pretty fair night for Coach Dick Norman's crew.

Davis shot 18 times and made nine goals. Moore, from close in, tried seven shots and hit on six. Hufford was one for two, Prosser had three of eight, Alex Hyzer made two of eight and Feagin nothing for one.

Mansfield whipped Ross on the boards the first half, especially on offensive rebounds but Ross adjusted and squared matters later. Both teams were guilty of faulty passing, dribbling off feet and the like.

Coach Confident
Coach Jim Burkett of Mansfield, confident his team can win the return match in Mansfield later this season, figured the turning point of the game came when the Tygers blew a six-point lead late in the first half.

"I couldn't say what the turning

NEW YORK (AP)—For Elgin Baylor, the great Los Angeles Laker star, obviously the best thing about being in the Army is getting out.

Norman Ponders Lineup Switches

There may be a different look in Ross' basketball lineup this Friday when the Little Giants travel to Lorain to meet the scrappy Steelers in a Buckeye Conference tilt.

Coach Dick Norman, disappointed over the turn of events last weekend when Ross dropped decisions to Marion and Tiffin Columbian—especially in the latter game when the Giants played anything but spectacular basketball—is planning his practice sessions this week with John Prosser, formerly a guard, taking over Dick Hufford's spot at forward and Sophomore Russ Hagerty moving into a guard position. Were the Giants tired Saturday night after playing twice during the week?

"Well, we were a little tired," said Norman, "but we can't use that as an excuse. We passed the ball around too much, didn't cut and didn't shoot. Tiffin was sloughing off on Moore and Davis and we didn't take the shot.

"I'll bet everyone thought Tiffin was playing a zone defense against us but really they were playing a man-to-man. We just made it look that way."

Ross fell far behind in the early stages of the game. At one

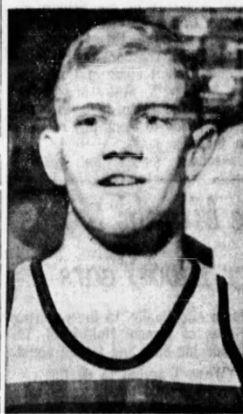

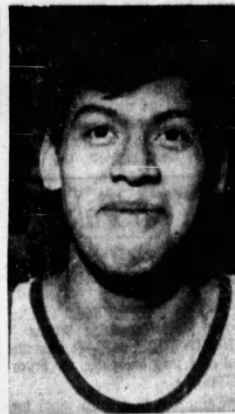

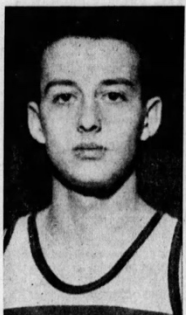

NEW YORK (AP)—Ron VanderKelen was a forgotten young man by pro football clubs a month ago—but several of them have become keenly interested in the Wisconsin sharpshooter due to his super-sensational show in the Rose Bowl.

The slim Badger quarterback wrote one of the brightest chapters in post-season football history in the New Year's Day classic, firing a dramatic final period rally that barely fell short as Southern California's national champions outlasted Wisconsin 43-37.

Afterward, it was noted with some amazement that VanderKelen had been bypassed completely by the 14 National Football League clubs when they drafted 280 players last month and had been ignored in the American League draft until the 21st round when he was picked by the New York Titans.

Unwanted But if the boy who paced Wisconsin to the nation's No. 2 ranking this past season was virtually unwanted in December, his dazzling performance at Pasadena, Calif., has made him a prize catch in January.

At least seven NFL teams are interested in him now, the AFL is angling for him and a Canadian Football League club is in the race for VanderKelen's signature.

In an Associated Press survey, the NFL outfits that expressed interest in the Badger star were the champion Green Bay Packers, the Los Angeles Rams, Chicago Bears, St. Louis Cardinals, Cleveland Browns, Minnesota Vikings and Philadelphia Eagles.

Missed One NFL clubs were at a loss to explain why VanderKelen was skipped in their draft, several of them saying simply that they "missed one." Some factors noted were that since VanderKelen played only 90 seconds as a junior and developed somewhat late this past season it was hard to assess

Southern Cal., surviving a 23-point fourth-period rally by Wisconsin, defeated the Badgers 42-37 New Year's Day.

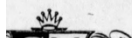
NFL Players' Group Studies Five Proposals

Little Giants Hit Only 12 Field Goals

Anybody will tell you that free throws count only half as much as baskets but the way the Fremont Ross Little Giants are going about it one would think charity tosses carry more weight.

Ross dropped its fourth Buckeye Conference game in Elyria Friday night as the Pioneers hit 22 goals to only 12 for Fremont and won 58-46 for only their second loop triumph of the season.

Both teams stand 2-4 in the second division of the BC.

It is difficult to paint a rosy picture for the hometown fans; the Little Giants simply were caught short - changed on defense once again. That second effort was not there. Once the offensive player beat his man it was just a matter of dunking in the easy basket.

No Easy Bucket

And as Coach Dick Norman pointed out after the game: "This has happened repeatedly this year. We don't get that easy basket. I can see where we are going to score only about 50 points or so a game so it looks like we are just going to have to work that much harder on defense.

Defense, a valuable asset in any sport, paid off for Elyria when one considers the scoring output of Ross' Jim Davis, who went into the fray as the third leading Point-maker in the Buckeye Conference. The Pioneers had the talented senior forward all bottled up, and this was largely as a result of the sharp play of sophomore Houston Love, playing in only his first varsity game.

Love is a real jumper and Davis can attest to that. Rarely will one see anybody cram the ball back on Davis during a jump shot. Love did it.

Only Two Goals

Davis, not getting off many shots, made only two baskets—only one against Love—and finished with a mere eight points, a low mark this season for the all-leaguer.

Elyria opened to a 6-1 lead but John Prosser's goal, a free throw by Davis and a basket by Russ Hagerty knotted the count at 6-6. This was as close as Ross was to get the remainder of the game. Elyria led 16-9 after the period had ended.

Early in the second quarter, Elyria—still getting those easy baskets—built up a 43-25 margin before Prosser and Dick Hufford whittled that down to 48-31.

Again Norman's words ring out: "We just haven't been able to get a hot hand yet, a good spurt that will carry us along."

21 of 29

Still hitting those free throws (Ross made 21 of 29 for 72 per cent), the Little Giants were able to stay close enough all night and gave faint hope that maybe that spurt would come and enable them to catch the Pioneers. It never did.

With 2:24 remaining in the second quarter, Ross trailed only 23-23, but a nine-point spurge by the Elyrians carried them off and running again.

Bill (6-7) Masonis proved too tough for the Little Giants to handle around the boards and the tall lad dropped in 18 points, mostly from close in. Ron Korfa and Tim Orvis chipped in with 11 each to balance out the Pioneer attack.

Prosser, hitting from outside, topped Ross with 12 points. Frank Moore had eight free throws and ended with 10 points.

Ross closes out its busy week-end activity tonight at home against Lorain Admiral King.

Little Giant reserves couldn't get moving in the first half, trailed 26-7 at intermission, scored only five points in the third quarter and lost 52-21. Elyria's reserves had a hot shooting night.

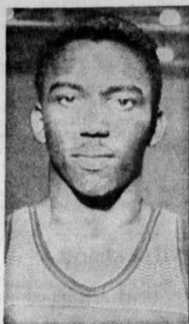

Jones and Kohlmyer form one of the sharpest backcourt lines in the conference. Both are juniors.

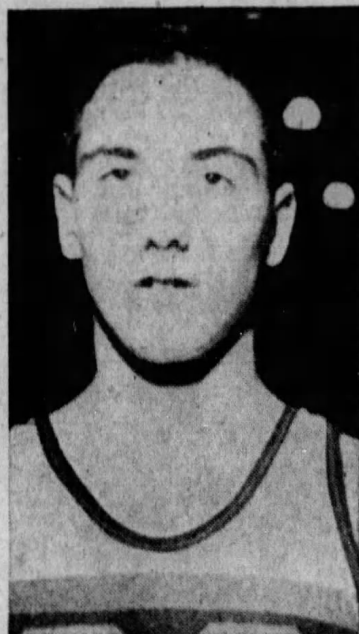

Outstanding rebounding by Frank Moore, the return to scoring form of Jim Davis and the sharp all-around play of John Prosser, Dick Hufford and Alex Hyzer here Friday night led Ross high out of the basketball doldrums as the Little Giants racked Lorain 68-52.

Lindamood finished with 17 to pace the Steelers. Ross' reserves rallied from behind in the final quarter only to suffer a 38-35 opening defeat. Lorain led 19-14 at halftime but Ross cut that to 20-28 going into the final quarter. With only 14 seconds remaining Ross trailed 36-35 but rebound shot after a free throw put the game on ice for Lorain.

Toledo, sporting a 4-1 mark in league warfare, has a tender hold on first place. But still in the scramble are Miami (6-3), Western Michigan (4-2) and Bowling Green and Ohio University, both 4-3.

The Rockets face two severe challenges this week beginning Wednesday when they invade Bowling Green. On Saturday, Toledo returns home for an engagement with second-place Miami.

The Redskins also face a stern test Wednesday when they clash with Ohio U. on the latter's home floor.

Key Games

Other key games Saturday find the resurgent Falcons playing Ohio U. at Athens and ever-dangerous Western Michigan at home against Kent State.

In last Saturday's action, Toledo clung to first place by whipping Ohio U. 55-42 thanks to a late second-half surge. Miami stayed in contention by posting a 66-58 victory over Kent State.

Giants Opened To 8-1 Lead:

Elyria Pins 53 To 49 Setback On Fremont

Coach Dick Norman and his Little Giants must be wondering what they have to do to win a ball game. Ahead 5-1 in the early stages of the first quarter, Ross was soon to drop back by a big margin before fighting to catch up late in the second period. It was not to be.

Elyria, playing anything like the team that posted seven consecutive court victories since December 29, managed to hang on for a 53-49 Buckeye Conference triumph before a good-sized Fremont crowd Friday.

Ross never gave up. The Little Giants' pressing defense forced

numerous Pioneer miscues. However, the locals, with the exception of John Prosser's brilliant outside shooting, were not hitting and that cost them their 11th setback in 15 tries—ninth in the EC.

Prosser was dead on long pushers from the side early in the game, but picked up three quick personals and was forced to the bench from the 3:32 mark of the first quarter until the second period was well underway. Marty Frankiewicz scored his only three points of the game and Elyria led 13-18 at the quarter. Elyria steadily pulled away until the score mounted to 24-13 before Prosser hit again. Davis has picked up three personal fouls at this time and had to play it close to the vest.

Ross began its comeback move. Prosser, Moore and Feagin scored before the quarter was out and Elyria held only a 27-26 halftime lead.

The third quarter continued close with Elyria holding two to four point leads. Three quarters of the game ended with Elyria leading 41-38 as Masons dropped in a lay in at the buzzer. Sophomore Russ Hagerty was in the game the second half to team with Feagin on the back line.

Feagin scored in a fast break to open the fourth period but Elyria bounced back for a 47-41 lead with 4:40 remaining. Dick Hufford, in and out of the lineup, sank four free throws while Korka sandwiched in one and Ross was down 46-40 with three minutes to go.

Davis tallied at the 2:43 mark and Ross moved as close as it was to come, 46-47. Korka, a clutch player for Elyria, pushed one in from the keyhole but Feagin drove in for a Ross goal at 1:14. He was also fouled on the play but he missed his three-pointer.

Elyria began stalling with 1:10 to play and ran the clock down to 31 seconds. Prosser then fouled Love who made the first but missed the follow up free throw. Davis rebounded and Ross called time with 26 seconds showing.

Prosser, Davis Draw Hot Hands:

Ross Topples DeVilbiss 64-59 In Tight Contest

Two hot - shooting quintets bumped into each other at Ross gym Saturday night with the Fremont Little Giants outgunning young but up-and-coming Toledo DeVilbiss 64-59 for the second straight Ross victory.

Ross knocked off Lorain Admiral King Friday night and now holds a 6-11 overall record with only Thursday's Sandusky home battle remaining. DeVilbiss, which lost to state-ranked Toledo Central Friday night, now owns a 6-9 record.

Key of the Fremont victory Saturday was excellent outside shooting on the part of John Prosser and Jim Davis. They staged a two-man scoring show that highlighted Ross' shooting percentage of 46—best in many a moon for the locals. Still the Giants had to take second best honors in the shot department as DeVilbiss' Tigers canned a brilliant 52 per cent from the floor on 22 of 42. Ross made 27 of 58.

Davis and Prosser each totaled out with nine buckets. Frank Moore had four and Bill Feagins, the most improved ball player on Dick Norman's club, had four. Alex Huzer made the other.

Game scoring honors went to tall and talented Dave McClellan of Toledo who dunked in 26 points. McClellan is only a sophomore and doubtless will be heard from in the future. He made nine of 13 field attempts.

Davis scored 10 points for Ross in the opening period and Prosser added six. Feagins tallied the remaining two as Fremont romped to an 18-15 period advantage.

Prosser was the boss in the second canto with 13 counters—most of which came from outside. Fremont led at halftime 34-32.

McClellan hit six of his eight free throws in this stanza. He came back to score 14 of his total the second half.

Ross, which trailed briefly during the initial play of the game,

opened to a 24-15 lead early in the second period before DeVilbiss caught up by intermission. McClellan opened the second half and earned a tie for his team by scoring from close range. The rangy sophomore came right back at the 7:20 mark to put the Tigers ahead. From that point until the

final two minutes, both teams showed the fair turnout on "old-timers' night" some hot shooting as they traded baskets.

Ross took off on an eight point binge late in the quarter after DeVilbiss moved into a 46-46 tie. Two free throws and two baskets by Davis and a pair of

DeVilbiss closed out the scoring here when Clyde Lykins pushed up a mid-court shot with one second to go. It never touched the rim going through.

Ross effectively used a mid-court press throughout that bothered the Toledoans. Numerous times the Tiger guards were unable to move across the time line without committing a turnover.

The fourth quarter was the slowest of the evening as Fremont, holding a 62-57 lead with 2:50 to play, began stalling. DeVilbiss could not come closer than four points in this quarter.

Moore dropped in two free throws with 1:39 to wrap up the well-played contest.

Fremont Junior high teams opened the program. Fremont Seventh lost 11-6 to Lindsey and the eighth grade walloped Riley 33-12.

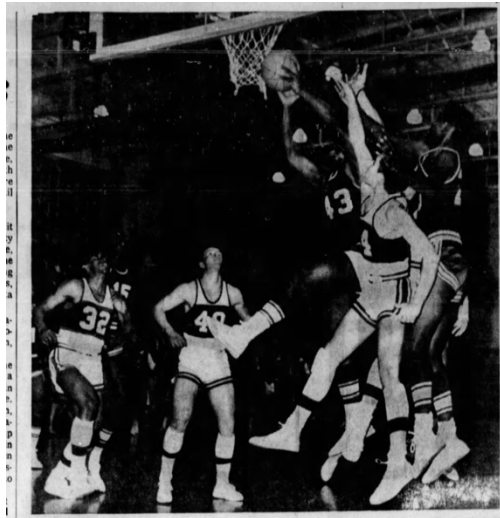

Ross Hits Three Points In 4th: Giants Close But Fail To Streaks

Close only counts in horseshoes, they say.

Leading much of the second half, the Fremont Little Giants almost pulled off one of the big upsets of the basketball season here Thursday night but instead came out on the short end of a 48-43 count to Sandusky. Ross has not defeated Sandusky since February 4, 1955, spanning 15 games. It could have been Thursday night, however, but a Fremont output of only three points — all from the charity stripe — in the fourth period was not enough to hang on to a thin lead.

Ross went into the fourth cano holding a 48-38 margin. Seconds after itself, Guard Bill Feagin dropped in two free throws and Ross led 42-38, as big a lead Fremont was to enjoy all night. Ross, taking precious few shots, was to muster only one other point in the remaining seven minutes of play, that coming on a free throw by Russ Hagerty, also early in the quarter.

Frank Moore, 6-4 Fremont center, fouled out with 3:08 to play. Moore fouled big Stew Williams who sank two free throws to push the Blue Streaks to within one, 43-42. Ross then began a stalling game.

Substitute Guard Jimmy Brown came in to steal a wild Ross pass and lay in Sandusky's go-ahead basket, 44-43, with 2:15 to play. Ross came down court, shot and missed and Sandusky grabbed the rebound.

Brown was called for traveling with 1:28 to play and Sandusky stalling. Fremont was given possession and called time out. John Prosser, high scorer for Fremont with 11 points, shot and missed with 1:10 remaining. Sandusky again rebounded with Williams grabbing the ball and heaving a long pass up court to Jerry Garrett who dropped in the "cripple" with 0:35 to play. This made it 46-43.

Brown then fouled Prosser who was driving toward the basket. The Ross senior, usually a dead shot from the line, missed his one-and-one and Sandusky again rebounded.

The Blue Streaks stalled 35 seconds off the clock until Williams was left unguarded under the basket where he dropped in the clinching bucket.

Fremont ended its regular season with a record of 6-12. Sandusky was 11-7. Ross' mark in the Buckeye Conference was 4-18.

Sandusky had the edge in shooting. The Blue Streaks took 31 shots and made 17 for a percentage of 55. Ross shot 48 times and made only 13 for a percentage of 27. Sandusky made 14 of 19 free throws and Ross, clicked on 17 of 24.

Sandusky opened the game as if it were going to stage a rout. The Streaks led 6-0 before Alex Hyzer canned two free throws at the 4:45 mark. Ross went until the 3:38 reading before registering its first basket — a lay in by Moore.

Sandusky then streaked to a huge lead, 20-7, before Fremont made its valiant comeback. First quarter ended with Sandusky leading 21-11.

Ross' defense choked off the Blue Streaks in quarter No. 2 with only four points, two baskets by Don Rather who was limited to just 10 points Thursday — eight the first half.

Prosser tallied six of Fremont points in this stanza to lift Ross. The Giants trailed 25-21 at halftime.

Fremont finally caught Sandusky at the 5:08 mark of the third quarter on Jim Davis' only goal of the night.

The game, ragged at times on both sides, was nip-and-tuck from that point on.

Sophomore Russ Hagerty again came off the bench to play an outstanding game at guard for

Fremont. Shooting more than during the early stages of the season, Hagerty's play has been one of the high points during the second half of the campaign.

Fremont's Reserves closed their season by dropping the opener, 48-32. Ross could tally only two points in the first quarter and trailed 10-2. Hagerty's nine points and Dave George's eight paced Fremont.

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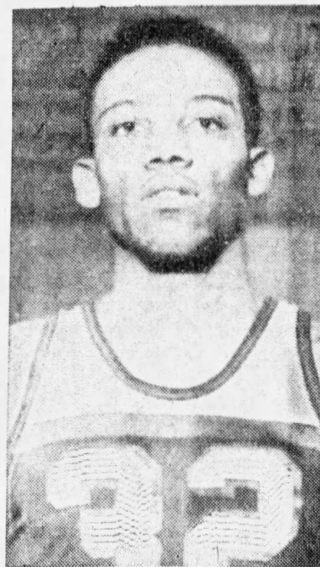
Rocky Ends Holdout, Signs \$54,000 Pact
