

Ross matmen open at Southview

Ross is set for its first mat appearance of the season Friday when the Little Giants travel to Lorain to take on the highly touted Southview matmen.

"They have a state champ and a guy that finished fifth in the state back this year," Ross Coach Al Voggenthaler pointed out Wednesday after practice. "They should be a good test for us to open with."

Rus Wilhelm, the reigning Class AAA 99-pound king of Ohio leads Southview but he will not be at that weight for the Ross match.

"He may move up to 119," Voggenthaler said, "or he may be at 112."

Where Wilhelm wrestles will be determined by George Veliz, a fifth place finisher in the state at 119 a year ago. Veliz may wrestle at 126.

Which ever way Southview decides to go, Voggenthaler already has his lineup set. Part of that was determined by Wednesday's "Purple-white" intersquad meet.

Sophomores will operate at the two lightweight spots for Ross. Merle Rufer will hit the mat at 98 while Jim Krock goes at

105. Letterman Ted Merrill will be Ross's 112-pounder while Jim Conley will wrestle at 119. Merrill and Conley are seniors.

Gilbert Munoz is the Little Giants' 126-pounder while junior letterman Paul "Tex" Miller will be at 132.

"Tex could move down to 126 later this season," Voggie pointed out.

Andre Parks, another sophomore, will wrestle at 138 for Ross with John LeJeune, a junior, at 145. Dave Campbell, a senior letterman, will be at 155 while Clarence Parks, a two-year letterman for Ross, has moved up to 167 this season.

The elder Parks posted a 23-4-1 mark a season ago at 155 but Wednesday aggravated an ankle injury that bothered him a year. As of today, Parks is doubtful for the Southview match.

Tim Donnerbach, a junior who gave Parks all he could handle in the "Purple-White" meet, will be at 175 for the Little Giants. Chuck Binkley, senior, out for his first year of wrestling has been a pleasant surprise for Voggenthaler and will be at 185.

The Ross Heavyweight or "hog body" as the Ross coach affectionately calls the unlimited wrestlers, will be Troy Amor, a junior.

"This is sort of a wait and see season for us," the Ross coach pointed out and then added, "the month of December should give us a pretty good indication of what the season will be like."

Ross will open at home against Mansfield on Dec. 9. The Tygers were second in the Buckeye Conference last season and could win it all this year according to Voggenthaler.

Also slated for December are the Toledo Rogers Tournament and the Medina Invitational Tournament.

"If our kids keep their heads straight during that time, we should be alright," the Ross leader said.

Friday's match at Southview will begin at 7:30 p.m. To get to Southview, take the Ohio Turnpike east to exit eight (Elyria, route 57); take 57 north three traffic lights. Southview High School is located on the right at the third light.

Southview rips Ross 39-22

LORAIN — Southview put Ross back against the wall quickly and never let the Little Giants get away Friday in the season opening wrestling match for Ross.

Southview recorded falls in the first five matches in rolling to an easy 39-22 win over Ross.

The only real bright spots for Ross were turned in by Clarence Parks and Troy Amor. Both pinned their opponents.

Parks, 167, stopped Southview's Willie Rojas in 1:15 of his match while Amor put 300-pound Ed Bermudey on his back for the count in just 3:31.

"All the kids that won turned in pretty good jobs," Ross wrestling coach Al Voggenthaler said.

Andre Parks, Clarence's brother, won his debut as a Little Giants wrestler. The sophomore stopped Mark Shaffer 5-4 in a 138-pound encounter.

Dave Campbell, 155, of Ross stopped Jerry Dickson 7-5 in his match. Chuck Binkley of the Little Giants did everything but

pin Ed Findley of Southview in the 185-pound match. Binkley, in his first year of wrestling, won 20-4.

In the junior varsity match, the Little Giants recorded a 42-26 win. Mike Pena, Walter Stroud, Mike Schneider, Paul Adams, and Dan Contreras had pins for the Little Giants.



Miller, Parks, Amor reach Rogers' semis

Fremont Ross advanced three wrestlers to the semi-finals of this weekend's Toledo Rogers Invitational Wrestling Tournament, and was in 10th place at the end of Friday's preliminary competition.

Tex Miler (126 lbs.), Clarence Parks (165 lbs.) and heavyweight Troy Amor were winners in the first day of the 16-team tourney. The three advance to the third round of wrestling, which is scheduled to begin at 12:30 today.

Miller, a junior defeated both of his early opponents — a 3:53 pin over Highland Park's Ray Wrey, and an 8-1 decision over Jeff Wick of host Toledo Rogers. Today, Miller will face Matt Taylor of Edsel Ford in his third round match.

Senior Clarence Parks drew a first round bye, and then decisioned Gregory McKnight of Highland Park 17-10. Today he faces Bedford's Al Ortman.

In the heavyweight class, Amor also drew a bye in the first round, but wrestled his way into the third round with his third-period pin of Rock Bensman of Toledo Woodward. Today Amor, a junior, faces Daryl Williams of Highland Park.

Bedford, Michigan's defending big-school champ, led the tourney after Friday's wrestling with 60½ points. The Little Giants, in 10th place, had 20.

Seven other Fremont grapplers remain in contention, depending on how well the wrestlers who beat them Friday do in today's matches. The seven still can earn points for Ross in they continue to compete in the consolation rounds.

Ross is 4th at Rogers

TOLEDO — Ross finished fifth in the rugged Toledo Rogers Invitational Wrestling Tournament Saturday with one champion and a pair of runnerup finishers.

Bedford, Michigan's reigning big school state champion, won the meet for the second year in a row by racking up 193½ points. Lansing Eastern was runnerup in the 16-team tourney with 159. Another Michigan school, Wayne Memorial was third at 150 with host Rogers in fourth with 119. Ross with 97 rounded out the top five.

Paul "Tex" Miller won the 126-pound title for the Little Giants.

The Ross junior pinned Marty Andryzcik of Toledo Whitmer in a quick 1:35 for the tourney title.

Miller pinned Raymond Wray of Highland Park in 3:53 in his first round match Friday night before posting two straight decision wins in the quarterfinals and the semifinals. In the quarterfinals, Miller stopped Jeff Wicks of Rogers 8-1 and blanked Matt Taylor of Edsel Ford 5-0 to reach the finals.

Clarence Parks was second at 167. The Ross senior lost to Howie McEntee of Lansing Eastern 6-4. McEntee scored on a reversal in the final period after leading 4-3

going into the final two minutes.

Ross heavyweight Troy Amor lost to Gary Porter, also from Lansing Eastern, in the finals. Porter scored on a penalty and a takedown in the final period to defeat the Little Giants junior.

Other Ross wrestlers finishing in the top six included Andre Parks, fourth at 138, Chuck Binkley, fifth at 185, Jim Krock, sixth at 105, and John Pena, sixth at 145.

Ross in Medina tourney

The transplanted Medina Wrestling Tournament is the next step of the season for Al Voggenthaler's Ross wrestling team.

Switched to Baldwin-Wallace College because of the closing of the Medina school, the two-day tournament will be held on Dec. 28-29.

There are 23 teams in the big high school tourney including such powers as Maple Heights, Cleveland John Marshall, Worthington, and Toledo St. Francis. Ross finished eighth out of 18 teams a year ago in the tournament.

The Little Giants had one champion, Jesse Heidelberg at 105, and third place finishes at 155 (Clarence Parks) and heavyweight (Jim Smith) in the '76 meet.

No times have been finalized as of yet for this year's tournament but will be set sometime today.

Ross 8th at B-W

BEREA — Ross was first after one but eighth after the second round of the 22-team Medina Invitational Wrestling Tournament being held at Baldwin-Wallace College.

The Little Giants sent two wrestlers into the semifinals of the big high school tournament today: Paul "Tex" Miller and Clarence Parks. Six other Ross wrestlers are still "alive" in the tourney.

Miller, 126, registered a pin and a come-from-behind decision in his two Wednesday wins. In the decision, Miller scored on a four-point "granby" in the final 10 seconds to win 5-4.

Parks, 167, rolled into the semis on the strength of two pins in the first and second rounds.

Ross rolled up 50 points in the first round to tie second round leader Columbus Waterson for the top spot. Waterson kept the lead in the second round with 98½ points while Ross slipped to eighth with a 66, just a point behind Menter and four ahead of North Royalton.

André Parks, sophomore brother to Clarence, is 2-1 in the 132-pound division for Ross. He has a pin and a superior decision. Dave Campbell, who dropped from 155 to 145 for the tourney, is also 2-1. Tim Donnersbach, 175, and heavyweight Troy Amor are also 2-1 for the Little Giants. Amor has registered two pins but lost a close 2-0 decision.

Chuck Tiller, 155, and Chuck Binkley, 185, are 1-1 for Ross and are still alive in the action. Binkley's win was a wild 15-13 decision in what Ross coach Al Voggenthaler termed the "craziest match he had ever witnessed."

The semis began today at noon with the finals slated for 7 p.m. in the Rudolph Ursprung Gymnasium on the B-W campus.

BEREA — Ross wrestling Coach Al Voggenthaler had to admit that he was pleased; he committed himself to that before he took his team to the third Medina Invitational Wrestling Tournament.

"I said before we left that if we placed in the top half, I would be fairly well pleased," Voggie pointed out.

He quickly added, "Now I am encouraged, too."

Ross made Voggenthaler happy by placing 10th with 94 points in the 21-team tournament. Maple Heights won its second tourney in a row with 171.

"It's disappointing that we did not have any champions," the Ross coach said, "but it's encouraging that we had four wrestlers place."

Paul "Tex" Miller, Ross's junior 126-pounder, had the best finish for Ross, third. Heavyweight Troy Amor was fourth but won the tourney's "most pins" trophy with five. It was the second year in a row that a Ross wrestler had won that trophy — Jim Smith won it last year with, at that time, a record four pins.


The Parks brothers, sophomore Andre (132), and senior Clarence (167) placed sixth in their divisions. Clarence lost in overtime in the championship semifinals and eventually forfeited his match for fifth place in the tourney because of an injured shoulder.

Ross took 12 wrestlers to the tournament and, Voggenthaler pointed out, 10 won at least one match.


Jim Deubel of Maple Heights, the man that Miller lost to in the semis, and teammate Jim Urban were named the tournament's "outstanding wrestlers."

Reunion time for Voggenthaler

Ross grapplers host Findlay

Al Voggenthaler meets an old friend with a new look Thursday at Ross High School.

Voggenthaler will guide his Ross wrestling team up against the man who made a habit of "picking on" the Little Giants leader.

Jim Hoppel, a teammate of Voggie on the Bowling Green State University wrestling team, will bring his Findlay Trojans into Fremont for a Thursday match against Ross. Hoppel, an All-American wrestler for the Falcons, used the Ross coach as a sparing partner in those college days.

"He used to separate my shoulder every night in practice," Voggie can now laugh. "I can personally attest to his toughness."

Hoppel's toughness, according to his former teammate, is rubbing off on the Trojans who are responding to his first year guidance.

"I don't know a great deal about Findlay," Voggie admitted, "I do know that they are fairly young but much more aggressive than Findlay teams have been in the past."

"Hoppel was a good wrestler in college and he will demand good things of his kids."

It's that new look that Hoppel has put on Findlay this year and one that Ross will face in the match. The Little Giants also will be flashing a bit of a new look.

Gilbert Palacios will be making his first appearance as the varsity 98-pounder. He won the Mal Mackey

tourney title at that weight this past Saturday. Mike Pena also won a title in the Macky junior varsity tournament and will step in at that weight for the varsity against Findlay.

Another switch involving an old face — Clarence Parks — will be made in the upper weights. Parks, who carries a 5-3 record at 167 this season, will be back at 155, the weight he competed at last season.

Taking Parks' place at 167 will be either senior Chuck Tiller or sophomore Shawn Alexander.

With the exception of those weights Ross will field a group of regulars that have competed in one dual and two tournaments this season.

Jim Krock is at 105 with Ted Merrill wrestling at 112. Paul "Tex" Miller, winner of the Rogers Tournament and a third place finisher in the super tough Medina tourney, will be at 126. Miller is 8-1 at 126 after being 0-1 at 132.

Andre Parks, brother to Clarence, is the Ross 132-pounder. The sophomore owns a 7-4 record. John Pena will take the mat at 138 with Dave Campbell at 145. Tim Donnersbach will be Ross's 175-pounder with Chuck Binkley wrestling at 185.

Troy Amor, with eight pins in an 8-3 record, is the Little Giants' heavyweight.

Both the JV and varsity matches will begin at 7 p.m. Thursday in the Ross High School gym.

NCAA gives nod to super schools

ATLANTA (AP) — A 3-year-old battle by the so-called big-time conferences and independents to reconstruct college football's 144 major schools into two divisions finally has succeeded.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association approved Thursday a proposal sponsored by 70 schools separating the current Division I into Divisions I-A and I-AA.

The NCAA convention then approved the new bylaws that will open the door for 25 other schools to qualify.

Schools have 60 days to advise the new committee of their choice of divisions, and then they would be given three years to meet criteria for membership in the division.

The initial criteria for Division I-A would have

required institutions to participate in eight varsity sports, have an average home attendance of 15,000, and one of the four years play home games in a stadium seating 30,000 or more.

The appealing amendment — offered by the Ivy League, Colgate, and Williams & Wesleyan — would remove the attendance average and seating capacity requirements for institutions that sponsor 12 varsity sports. Schools with 12 varsity sports still would qualify by meeting the other criteria.

The thorny restructuring issue occupied most of the convention's business. The proposal for the two divisions was rejected early Friday, and then gained approval after the top division would have been dropped into Division II.

The original 70 schools consisted of the 60 members of the Big Ten, Pacific 10, Big Eight, Atlantic Coast, Southeastern, Southwest, and Western Athletic conferences, along with independents Air Force, Army, Boston College, Boston University, Georgia Tech, Hawaii, Memphis State, Miami of Florida, Navy, North Texas State, Notre Dame, Penn State, Pittsburgh, and Maine.

Had the criteria remained with the current Divisions I-A and I-AA, those failing to qualify for the top division would have been dropped into Division II.

San Diego State, South Carolina, Syracuse, Tulane, Virginia Tech and West Virginia.

The 25 schools qualifying under the 12 varsity sport criterion were seven Ivy League schools, Appalachian, Ball State, Bowling Green, Colgate, Holy Cross, Idaho, Indiana State, Long Beach State, Ohio University, Rutgers, Seton Hall, Temple, Western Michigan, and William & Mary, along with four current Division II schools in the Yankee Conference, Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts and Rhode Island.

Columbia, the other Ivy League school, did not meet the 12-sport qualification.

Some schools on the list of '79 don't currently qualify because they do not sponsor eight sports, but they are expected to have little trouble in adding enough to reach that figure.

Girls court, swim team in action

Two of Ross's four winter sports teams will be in action on Saturday.

At 2 p.m. Art Buck will take his Little Giants tankers to Castalia in search of their first dual swim meet win. Margaretta is the target of the Little Giants.

At 6:30 Saturday evening, the Little Giants girls basketball team will be attempting to shake a four-game losing streak against a visiting Upper Sandusky team.

Sue Wolf's team will be trying its first action since Jan. 5. Ross was to have hosted Mansfield last Tuesday but the cold, snowy weather pushed that game back until Jan. 30.

Findlay got the point but Ross got the win Thursday evening in a dual wrestling meet.

Ross won eight matches and tied another in dominating the Trojans 40-17. The win leveled the Little Giants' dual record to 1-1.

"I think we looked pretty sharp," Ross coach Al Voggenthaler said after his team's sharpness punched through the Trojans. "I was a little worried because most of these kids had not wrestled since Dec. 29."

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Little Giants face Sandusky

Ross will take on archrival Sandusky tonight at Sandusky High School in a tuneup for the Buckeye Conference Wrestling Tournament.

The Little Giants and Blue Streaks will be offering "mirror" effect according to Ross Coach Al Voggenthaler.

"They are strong in the same weights that we are strongest at," he said. "That should make it a close match."

The Little Giants, inactive since last Thursday's 40-17 win over Findlay, will send the same lineup onto the mat against the Blue Streaks.

Gilbert Palacios will be at 98 with Jim Krock at 105 and Ted Merrill at 112. Mike Pena is Ross's 119-pounder and Paul "Tex" Miller is at 126. Wrestling at 132 for Ross will be sophomore Andre Parks and John Pena is Ross's 138-pounder.

Dave Campbell will be at 145 with Clarence Parks at 155. Chuck Tiller is the 167-pounder and Tim

Donnerbach will be at 175. Chuck Binkley and Troy Amor will wrestle at 185 and heavyweight, respectively, for Ross.

Ross's scheduled Tuesday match with Mansfield was postponed for the second time because of inclement weather and Voggenthaler said that it has not been rescheduled yet.

"We are still working on it but I don't know when it will be," he said.

At Sandusky, Voggenthaler expects Ross's toughest match will be at 126 where the Little Giants' Miller squares off against Steve Camella of the Blue Streaks. Miller, 9-1, puts his record against the Sandusky senior who's biggest claim to fame this season was conquering Jock Murray of Elyria.

Murray is expected to win the BC title at 126 this year.

The junior varsity and the varsity matches will begin at 7 p.m. tonight.

Ross breaks Sandusky mat hold

SANDUSKY — Ross shattered an 11-year victory famine at the hands of the Sandusky Blue Streaks wrestling team Thursday by defeating the Blue Streaks 38-21.

"It's the first time in six years since I have been here that we have beaten them," a pleased Al Voggenthaler, Ross head coach smiled.

Voggie thought while savoring the victory and then said, "I think that the thing that may have helped us was starting off by preparing for Mansfield and we did not have that much time to think about Sandusky.

"We did go over what Sandusky likes to use and we defended it pretty well — that made a difference."

Voggenthaler was referring to what was supposed to have been a match with Mansfield last Tuesday but that was postponed because of bad weather.

Before the dual match, the Ross coach had pointed at the 126 and 155-pound divisions as offering the most problems against Sandusky.

The forecast turned out to be right but Ross responded with a pin and a draw. Clarence Parks stopped Kirk Wyatt of Sandusky in 5:29 after surviving a three-point nearfall in the second period of the 155-pound skirmish.

The two falls took a combined time of 2:18 and eased Ross to a 37-24 win over the Redmen.

Campbell was up next at 145 and put Ross one foot over the top by pinning Don Nutter in 1:18. Nutter scored first on a takedown but Campbell escaped and outmuscled Nutter for the fall at 1:18.

Parks put the lid on the match for Ross by stopping Roger Jones in one minute of the 155-pound match. Parks scored at the 30-second mark with the takedown and then hoisted Jones for the fall.

The match tightened up again to 25-24 on pins by P.J. O'Lynn, 167, and Dave Contreras at 175 for the Redmen but a forfeit to Ross's Chuck Binkley at 185 insured the Ross win with a 31-24 margin with

'Psycho corps' saves Little Giant matmen

Ross was nearly crumpled by the unexpected but instead was revived by a case of the "crazies" in struggling to a hard fought 33-23

wrestling win over Toledo Whitmer here Thursday.

Clarence Parks, Ross's captain and undefeated 155-pounder, inadvertently pinned himself while leading in his match. That mishap to Parks brought

Referee George Branco saw Parks slip and slapped the mat to send Huff into a wild victory dance, while Parks flew into a rage.

"The unexpected did happen to us tonight," Voggenthaler said while talking about the turn of events for Parks.

"I thought the pin was called a little quick. His (Parks) shoulders were there (on the mat) but I did not think two seconds had passed."

Whitmer, with the score narrowed to a reachable 21-14 for Ross, went on a two-match rampage. Terry Madero pinned Ross's Steve Alexander in 5:21 of the 167-pound match and Steve Lay scored seven points in the first half of the 175-pound match to defeat Tim Donnersbach of Ross 7-4.

That put Whitmer ahead for the first time in the match 23-20 and put the pressure on the Little Giants.

Enter stage left . . . Ross's "psycho corps."


Binkley was the first Little Giant to throw a "nutty" on the mat and sent Whitmer's Craig Kwiatkowski looking for a straight jacket. Instead, Binkley took the Whitmer wrestler down quickly and just as quickly, slapped on a cradle and nailed him on his back. At 1:13 of the match, Binkley heard Branco's hand hit the mat and Ross was back in the driver's seat 27-23.

Heavyweight Troy Amor was next to act a bit crazy. Just 20 seconds into his match with Whitmer's Andy Jenson, Amor lofted his 250-plus pounds through the air to flatten Jenson. Thirty-eight seconds later and Jenson was finished along with Whitmer's last hope.




