

Ross Boosters Meet Coaches

Progress in drives for increased membership and to keep the Harmon Field bleachers was reported at Tuesday's meeting of Fremont Ross Boosters club. Feature of the regular meeting, which was held in the players' lounge of Harmon Stadium, was introduction of the coaching staff and key team members.

Coach Mal Mackey introduced his coaches, who in return gave the names of players. Boosters were then invited to inspect the locker room and equipment room facilities of the stadium.

Treasurer Al Coleman indicated the current membership drive has netted 598 paid-up members to date. Pledges to keep the bleachers now amount to \$1,100, stated Coleman. Received was an anonymous \$50 check from a Booster member. Pledges to date are \$750 from Whirlpool Corporation and \$100 each from Liberty National Bank, Croghan Colonial and Fremont Savings banks.

Little Giants Getting Game-Type Experience

The Fremont Ross Little Giants took a second crack at picking up some game-like experience when they ran into Parma Padua in a scrimmage this morning.

Head Coach Mal Mackey sent his troops out this morning, hoping to see some development, especially in his running game. Apparently fairly well satisfied with the showing of the defense and the passing attack in the first outing of the year, Mackey feels that the important thing to be gained from the scrimmages is the experience, something he is rather short of.

In the Little Giants' first contest, Terry Bork, a victim of an early season injury last year, showed that he can throw the football. Mackey said that the passing looked 'fair' in the scrimmage, but since this was the first such outing this may be an indication that a good aerial attack is in the making, as this phase of the game is often slow in developing. The running attack, however, apparently left something to be desired.

Battling Toledo Start on even

terms, the Ross defense looked to be several steps ahead of the offense. This seems to be only natural, however, as most of the actual game experience lies with the members of the defensive platoon.

Tuesday's practice sessions marked the end of the two-day work outs for the Little Giants, with daily work out continuing up to next Friday's opener with Springfield South. A third scrimmage is planned for Saturday.

Mackey stated yesterday that he feels that his boys are just starting to show signs of coming around now. A rash of minor injuries has slowed the development to date, but it is believed that the switch to single drill days will help things pick up.

Mackey is looking forward with mixed emotions to the opener with Springfield South a week from Friday, saying that he hopes the third time is a charm after two straight losses to the Southern Ohio Team, but believing that he really can't tell how far along the team is until he sees them in an actual game.

OPPONENT WAS THIRD IN OHIO FOR 1964 SEASON

Ross Plays Host To Springfield South In Home Opener

Fremont's Little Giants will be hoping to hand Coach Neil Mackey the 100th win of his local tenure Friday night when the last year's third best team in the state of Ohio invades Harmon Field. Coach Lowell C. Storm will bring his Springfield South Wildcats to town in hopes of repeating last year's 25-0 inaugural win over Fremont.

Both Mackey and Storm are faced with the problem of filling gaps left by graduation losses. Nineteen lettermen are missing from the Springfield South team which won ten games in as many outings in 1964.

The unbeaten season gave South the Greater Ohio League championship and a ranking as third in the state, according to Associated Press ratings.

While 19 are missing, Storm 178-pound end who will be the starting offensive lineup Friday night, were cut from the team before the seventh game in 1964. This pair and Clarence Carrier, a 6-1, 194-pound letter-

man end, who were disciplined all have been accepted back on first team by Coach Storm. His reports are that the attitude of all three is good and they will be the vital factors in any success the Wildcats will enjoy this season.

Among the Wildcat losses are Tom Bartley, first team All-Ohio halfback, and Steve Kuss, end, kicked a 16-yard field goal in the 1964 opener against Ross. Later in the game he narrowly missed a second field goal try from 44 yards out.

The Springfield South starting lineup which will work offensively on Harmon turf Friday will include eight of those returning lettermen, plus Strodes and Wilkerson who had enough time for letters before being dropped from the team.

Ross' Mackey is in a similar situation with the possibility of ten lettermen in the opening offense. Many of these lettermen were spot players or defensive workers last year and not offensive regulars.

Uncertainty Dims Coach Wright Outlook

Clyde head coach Thurman Wright is preparing for the season's opener with some uncertainty. He is not sure just what to expect from his squad.

The Flers failed to win a game last year and, although 23 lettermen have returned, they are still young in terms of game experience. Monograms were awarded to 34 men last season and many of them were earned in the late minutes of already decided games.

Wright, however, does expect his Flers to be improved over last year's squad, but he cannot tell just how much until he sees them in a game that counts.

On paper, Wright seems to be in pretty good shape for the coming season. The line is not huge, but it is fairly big and the backfield shows some speed. Then, there is the large number of lettermen returning. These things would seem to add up to a good year for the Flers, but there is doubt.

Speed is lacking. First of all, the figure of 33 lettermen is deceiving in terms of actual game experience. Secondly, the team over all lacks some speed.

The big job that Wright has seems to be to instill a winning attitude in the Flers. After a season without a victory, this could be a problem, but it is also important to the team's success.

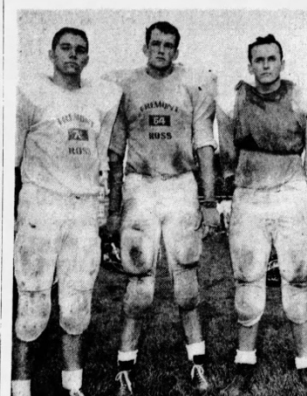

The Golden Bears will field a team of good size in hopes of bettering last season's mark of three wins, six losses and one tie. They won two and lost four in their Sandusky Bay Conference encounters.

Kaseman, scheduled for first team duty as a linebacker and halfback, will likely miss the first game with a knee injury. Coach Redding looks for this to be a year of a balanced league in Sandusky Bay Conference. "We respect all opponents because it is a good, balanced league." The coach of the smallest school in the conference concluded, "I wouldn't say anybody is the favorite. Every week will be tough."

Kotlarzyk Matches Local Course Record

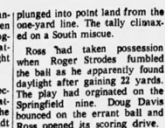

LITTLE GIANTS AFTER FIRST VICTORY OF SEASON

Cleveland West Invades Harmon Field To Battle Ross

With memory of victory slip-day opponent took from Shaw. Assistant Coach Jay Hershey who scouted the game has warned, "They have good size. Little Giants will take the grid-iron at Harmon field Friday night against Cleveland West. West will come to town licking its wounds but all the more dangerous because they want to erase the sensation of failing 40-0 to Cleveland Shaw last Friday.

Hershey put emphasis on the efficiency of Shaw in that open-er, rather than a weakness on West's part.

There will be additional incentive for West and in particular for its returning quarterback Fran Herman. A year ago the Little Giants shut the door

in the face of the West invaders, 14-0. In so doing they gave West its worst offensive frustration of the year. Little Giant defenders held West to only 26 yards gained on the ground and 41 through the air on five of 13 passes.

Most dangerous in the attack of the West team this year will be the brother combination of Fran and Fred Herman. Both were in the West backfield a year ago, although halfback Fred saw only limited action in

the early season games, including the encounter with Ross. Ross scouts rate Fred as the team's most dangerous runner this year, both outside and inside.

His brother, Fran, is a passer who could be dangerous if given adequate protection. This protection was nonexistent in the opener with Shaw.

Coach Mal Mackey reports his boys will be in top physical condition for the game, except Jim

Kreilick. Kreilick, a starter at offensive end and defensive line-backer, will be out of action for at least three weeks. He received ligament damage at the knee in the opener with South. Lip until the point of injury Kreilick had been a driving force of the strong Ross defense.

To fill the gap left by Kreilick Mackey will insert Jerry Cross to pair with Fred Tolhurst at offensive end. Mike Hetrick will open at the linebacker.

Ross and West will field starting offensive teams of comparable size. Ross has an overall offensive weight average of 188 pounds. West will field an offensive unit averaging 184 pounds per man. The Little Giants will have a line weight advantage, weighing 196 pounds per man to 197 for West front liners. In the backfield West doesn't have a man under 175 pounds and will average 179. Ross has a 171-pound backfield average.

Balance is a factor in the size of the West starting unit. They have only one man, tackle Floyd Sand, 205, who is over 200 pounds and one player under 175 in the starting unit.

Both teams will have several men who must go both offensively and defensively, due to lack of depth. Six of West's offensive openers, three of them in the backfield, the two Her-mans and halfback-linebacker John Sand, go both ways. Assigned to double duty for 6-4 tie with Springfield South.

Ross will be Tolhurst and Cross at ends. Pankratz and Swain-good at tackles, guard-line-backer Hetrick, center-tackle Jim Buehler and fullback-line-backer Tim Arndt.

Game time at Harmon Stadium will be 8 p.m. The Little Giants will be taking a second try this season to win game number 100 at Ross for Head Coach Mal Mackey. It also would be the first win of the season after an opening game 6-4 tie with Springfield South.

Lakota has had a rough time getting started for new coach Nick Kajca. Kajca inherited only eight lettersman from a team that won eight, lost two and finished second to Green Springs in the conference last year.

This season they have dropped battles to Firelands, 36-0, and Monroeville, 12-0. Green Springs has shown a strong defense and ability to win close ones in the early season.

They have extended their unbeaten streak to ten games with wins over Milan, 8-0, and Berlin Heights, 1-0.

Elmore is unbeaten in two independent encounters, tallying 56 points and giving up only six. In wins over Lakota and Osgo, Northwood is winless in two outings, falling to Ottawa Hills, 1-0, and Woodville, 20-12. The Woodville loss was the only Lakeshore Conference game played to date.

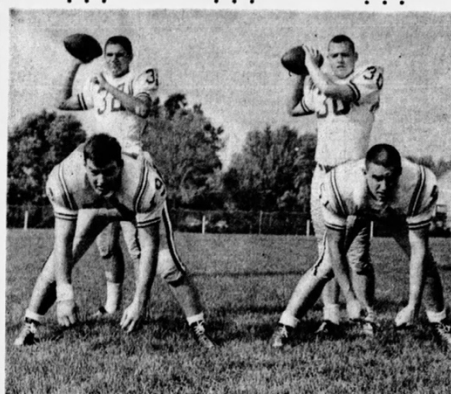

SANDUSKY BAY CONFERENCE:

Gibsonburg Returns To Limelight At Lakota; Clyde Homecoming

It is homecoming at Clyde and return to health day at Lakota. In spite of these special occasions it is also the signal for full-scale action in the Sandusky Bay Conference.

Clyde will be seeking to score its first points and win its initial game for the homecoming fans when it plays host to Tiffin Calvert. At Lakota the Raiders will be faced with the task of trying to handle Coach Herb Redding's Gibsonburg Golden Bears.

The Bears have had a week's rest since stopping the Fremont St. Joseph victory streak at 27 in the opening game, 6-0. Lakota will be out to improve a record which shows a 36-14 conquest of North Baltimore and a 2-0 loss to Elmore in independent action.

Clyde will be at home for the first time after dropping road games to Margareta, 28-0, and to Bellevue, 20-0. The Margareta game was a Sandusky Bay encounter.

Calvert will be making its initial conference outing after winning independent battles from Bucyrus, 14-0, and Upper Sandusky, 22-0.

Thanks to their opening game win over St. Joseph, most eyes will be focused on Coach Redding's Gibsonburg team. Redding indicates he will be ready with all but one boy who started in the St. Joseph game. Full-

back Mike Ernsthansen, a 196-pound sophomore, is a practice injury victim. His loss will mean the switching of Tom Parlette, 178-pound junior, from right halfback to fullback. Jeff Jones, a 145-pound sophomore, will then operate at right halfback.

Redding indicated Tim Shull, a giant 225-pound junior, will also see considerable action at fullback.

For Coach Jerry Wasserman it will be the first time his Raiders have been at full strength. Ron Nieset and Dick Stoner, mainstays of both the defense, should both be ready for at least limited action. This pair was injured in the game with Elmore. When both missed the second half the Lakota bubble burst and Elmore stepped into control.

Also returning to action for Lakota will be halfback Barry Brown, guard Ron Bab and end Leslie Graber. It will be the first game of the year for Bab, a 160-pound letterman. Graber missed the first game and was slowed by injury in the Elmore game.

Return of Bab allows Wasserman to switch the 200-pound Ron Myers back to tackle.

A third Sandusky Bay Conference game will be played Saturday night when winless O a k Harbor travels to Sandusky St. Mary. The two teams in this encounter are exact opposites in the early season play. Oak Harbor has yet to score a point and given up 38. Bemoaning the lack of game experience, Coach William Wirick brings his Toledo Bowsher grid machine into Fremont Friday night. The Bowsher team, which has yet to play the equivalent of a full game in two outings, will be after an upset of unbeaten, once-tied Fremont Ross.

Battling on the floor of Harmon stadium will be two teams of nearly equal size and equal experience from past years. Coach Wirick has 16 lettermen on this team, which is strongly considered as a city title hope in Toledo. Coach Mal Mackey is molding a Buckeye Conference contender from a Little Giant aggregation which includes 14 lettermen.

All but one of the intended starters for Coach Wirick are lettermen. The one non-letterman and only junior in the starting unit could well be a secret weapon. Thom Duncan, a 175-pounder, has been inserted at left halfback for the Ross game.

In earlier games Duncan has worked some at halfback but is also considered the number two quarterback behind senior co-captain Walt Schmaltz. Wirick made no statements of this nature, but the double quarterback situation could indicate the Toledo team intends to try the serial route over the Ross defenses.

One Ross Change

Coach Mal Mackey reports there is only one possible change in his alignment for this encounter. This is at left offensive guard where senior Russ Coleman is being pushed by another senior and a sophomore for the starting call. In contention for this starting offensive post are Ron Sipama, a 183-pound senior, and John Pasch, a 173-pound sophomore. If Pasch were to get the nod, he would be the only sophomore to crack the starting lineup this year. The starting offensive unit of the first two games has included six seniors and 11 juniors.

In these first two outings Ross has recorded a 6-0 tie with Springfield South, ranked third in the state last year, and a 36-0 win over Cleveland West. Bowsher has been on display twice. They notched a 1-0 victory over DeWitt in less than a half of action in the Toledo pre-season grid preview. They then trailed Toledo Scott, 17-0, last Saturday, when the game had to be called because of the heat.

At the time the Scott game was called six Bowsher players had been overcome with heat exhaustion. Scott had two boys overcome and 11 on the bench who the team physician would not allow to reenter the ball game.

Scott put Bowsher in the hole by running and opening kickoff over 90 yards for a touchdown. Coach Wirick indicated the game moves hint that fatigue was already a factor on that opening play. He said at least five of his boys had a clear shot at the ball carrier and just couldn't make the play.

Despite the physical conditions of Saturday, Wirick said all his team was able to report to Monday practice sessions. He

said the exhaustion of last Saturday's Liberty stadium hot box is in the past and his boys will be healthy for the Ross game. Only one of his regulars is not likely to open the game and is doubtful for any game action. This is regular right end Don Berger, a 155-pounder. Berger turned an ankle during this week's practice.

Absence of Berger will actually add weight to the Bowsher line. Ross will have greater balance, especially in the line, but the two teams are approximately the same overall size.

Thanks to the presence of 240-pounder Ed Johnson, Bowsher will have an offensive line of equal size to the Little Giants. Ross will average 198 pounds on the offensive line to 197 for Bowsher. The Bowsher offensive backs will be 10 pounds per man heavier than Ross. This boasts the overall offensive team weight average for Bowsher to 191 pounds, compared to Ross' 188.

The defensive front five of Ross will average over 205 pounds, compared to a 192 for Bowsher, in spite of the appearance of Johnson in the unit. Wirick inserts a little man, Nick Murdock, 155, as middle guard on defense. Although lacking size, Ross scouts warn Murdock is a main cog in the Bowsher defense.

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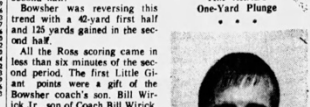

GIANTS SEEK REVENGE FOR LAST YEAR'S DEFEAT

Ross Plays Host To Mansfield In Buckeye Opener

Stinging after their unsuccessful effort to teach Massillon how to spell Tiger, the Mansfield senior Tygers invade Harmon Field Friday night with a first Buckeye Conference victory as

their goal. They will run into a Ross Little Giant contingent equally determined to open conference play on a winning note. The charges of Coach Mal Mackey have fresh in their

memory the fact that they were 8-6 victims of Mansfield a year ago. This was one of only two victories by the Tygers in 1964. Laboring under a new coach, Gary Praht, former All-American

can mention end from Michigan, the Tygers have already equalled their win total of last year. Until they tangled with the Massillon Tiger, top-rated in the state, they had boasted a defense which had not yielded a

point in two games. Massillon changed this by scoring 38 points. At the same time Mansfield managed to cross the Massillon goal twice.

Wing-T Offense

Coach Praht will bring an offense he calls a "Wing-T flip-flop" to Harmon field. This attack has produced 58 points in three games while his team has rolled to an average of 237 yards a game.

The Tygers have gained 610 yards on the ground and 161 in the air in first three outings. The Ross defense which has yielded only 408 yards and 14

points in three games will be severely tested by the antics of Mansfield quarterback Harry Waldman. Waldman is considered by his coaches as the finest faking quarterback in this area.

As a passer he has connected on 13 of 31 throws for 154 yards and three touchdowns. However, it is as the glue that keeps the parts of the Tiger attack in proper place that he is most valuable. His ball-handling combined with the speed of Bob Westerfield and Floyd Davis at

halfbacks and Junior Parr at fullback make the running attack constantly dangerous. Adding to the danger is Tom Ogar at wingback as a pass receiver.

Kreilick Still Out

Coach Mackey will be able to call upon essentially the same units he has employed in the last two games. He is still with-

out the services of Jim Kreilick, end and defensive line-backer. Kreilick received a knee ligament injury in the opening game tie with Springfield South. This week he continued to hobble on crutches, but Mackey expressed a hope the key defensive man would be back in action before the end of the season.

During this week's drills Doug Davis, a kick return and defensive halfback standout of the first three encounters, has been getting considerable offensive work.

Despite this Mackey indicates he will likely stay with the backfield combination of Craig Swartz and Dave Longanbach at halfbacks, Tim Arndt at fullback and Terry Bork directing the attack from the quarterback slot. This combination has been the strength of an attack which has rushed for 496 yards in three games and gained a total of 706 in these outings.

The Ross defense will remain the same. The defenders will have their hands full because it is hard to isolate any one back as the main threat in the Tiger backfield. No less than 11 backs have carried the ball for Mansfield this year. Leading ground-gainer in terms of yards per carry is a man the Little Giants will remember from the basketball court, Mike Swann. Swann, running as backup at fullback to Parr, has carried the ball five times for a nine-yard average.

Westerfield Dangerous

Bob Westerfield, halfback who tallied three touchdowns against Cleveland John Adams is the leading ground-gainer with 243 yards in 42 carries for a 5.8 average. Westerfield has a long gain of 43 yards. He has tallied four touchdowns and two extra points to rank as the top Mansfield scorer with 26 points.

Fullback Parr has carried 39 times for 118 yards and a three yard average while adding two touchdowns. Westerfield is also the team's leading pass receiver with seven catches for 95 yards and two touchdowns.

An added offensive threat for the Tygers is the foot of tackle Dan Coe, who kicked a 33-yard field goal in his team's 11-0 win over Cuyahoga Falls.

Mansfield will give away weight but have speed advantage in Friday's tangle with Ross. The overall line size is comparably light, but is anchored by two big, experienced tacklers, Coe and Bob Palm. Dan Arnett (175) and Junior Parr (180) have been lettermen on the line since their sophomore year. Palm stands 6-0 and weighs 224, while Coe carries 210 on a 5-10 frame.

A third 200 pounder in the Tiger offensive forward wall is center Ron Ruckman.

The Mansfield line with a 183-pound average will give away approximately 14 pounds per man to the 193-pound average Ross offensive forward wall. Backfield sizes are comparable with a 169-pound average for Mansfield and 171 for Ross. Overall team size shows Mansfield averaging 178 pounds and Ross 188.

Sudden Sam Becomes Fifth In '300 Club'

Quick Quiz: What pitcher is tripping out batters at a faster clip than Sandy Koufax?

Stumped?

None other than Cleveland's Sam McDowell, whose individual performances have been overshadowed in recent weeks by the developments of the American League pennant race without fanfare has joined Koufax as a member of the exclusive 300-strikeout club.

McDowell, a 23-year-old left-hander in only his second full major league season, raised his strikeout total to 318 Wednesday night by fanning 12 in a five-hit, 3-1 victory over the New York Yankees.

McDowell, who has a 17-10 record with a best-in-the-league .17 earned-run average, has struck out 10 or more batters in 7 games this season, while becoming only the fifth pitcher in

major league history to hit the 300-strikeout plateau. Only Koufax in the NL and Rube Waddell, Walter Johnson and Bob Feller in the AL have reached that level.

In addition McDowell is fanning batters faster than Koufax despite the fact that the 29-year-old Dodger left-hander has struck out a major league record 369. Koufax, who has recorded 326 2-3 innings, has a 1.1 strikeout-per-inning rate to 1.2 for McDowell, who has pitched only 265 innings.

While McDowell was adding to his laurels, the champion Minnesota Twins ended Baltimore's nine-game winning streak by edging the Orioles 3-2. Washington's Jim Hannan five-hit Kansas City 5-0 and Boston edged California 2-1. Chicago and Detroit were idle.

Fred Whitfield and Max Alvis supplied the only support McDowell needed. Whitfield hit a

three-run homer in a four-run third inning while Alvis, who went 4-for-4, singled home the other run in the uprising and then hit a homer in the eighth inning. Clete Boyer and Elston Howard homered for the Yankees.

Jim Grant, the lone 20-game winner in the AL, gained his 21st victory against six losses when Bob Allison won it for the Twins with a two-run homer in the eighth inning off Steve Barber.

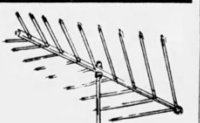

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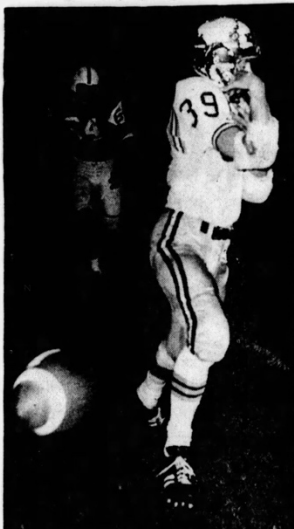

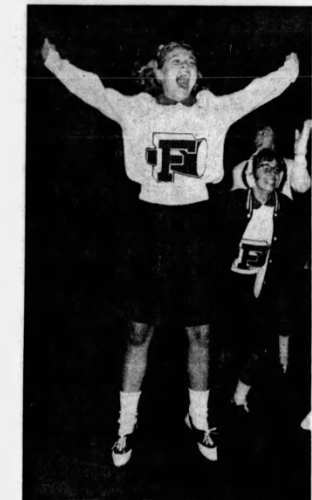

Ken Boyer
Is Traded
To NY Mets

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Ken Boyer, one of the greatest third basemen in St. Louis Cardinal history, has become the first to plummet from world champion to seventh place in the National League.

Boyer, the Cardinal captain, was traded Wednesday to the New York Mets for left-handed pitcher Al Jackson and third baseman Charley Smith. An unnamed triple-A player also will be sent to the Mets.

"If they started making trades, it figures that the older players would be the first to go," said the 34-year-old, \$90,000-a-year power hitter.

Boyer, however, was the biggest disappointment. Only one year ago, he was named the National League's Most Valuable Player. He was the hero who helped the Cardinals win the pennant with a .296 batting average, 24 home runs and a league-leading 119 runs batted in.

As a result, he shouldered much of the blame in the 1965 collapse, hitting only .260 with 13 homers and 74 RBI. He was hampered much of the season by a back injury.

Now, after 11 seasons with the Cardinals in which he hit 255 home runs, drove in 1,001 runs and averaged just under .300, Boyer is in a position of having to make a comeback.

Trojans' Medical Reports Look Better Than Ross For Friday Game; Mackey Rates Game 'Tossup'

Down Findlay way the newspaper stories are calling the local high school Trojans underdogs for their Friday night battle with Fremont Ross. That isn't the way Coach Mal Mackey of the Little Giants appraises the battle scheduled for Harmon field.

"It is a tossup," proclaimed Mackey. The Little Giant coach doesn't display a lack of confidence in his own charges, but he points to the Findlay credentials. Also not to be overlooked is the fact this is a limping Giant tangling with a healthy Trojan.

Although subjected to their first Buckeye Conference defeat last Friday by mighty Sandusky, the Findlay team emerged from the battle healthy. The Little Giants smashed Lorain the same night, but took a physical beating in doing so.

Mackey indicates all his team will be ready to go against Findlay, but many are still nursing injuries of varying degrees. Among the cripples who will be forced into action for Ross are Fred Tolhurst, Dave Longmarch, Wally Pankratz and Jim Kreilick.

The importance of the game is prompting Mackey to consider Kreilick for at least part-time linebacking duty. Kreilick is still forced to favor a knee injured in the season opener against Springfield South. He has not played since injury in that game.

Pankratz is hobbled at the tackle post by leg miseries. This has not kept him out of action, but could slow his play. Halfback Longmarch injured a hand in the Lorain game, but didn't miss any practices this week.

Tolhurst was back on the practice field Wednesday night after spending a day in the hospital. The big two-way end suffered a broken nose and two blackened eyes against Lorain. Findlay's credentials are impressive. They were rated by many coaches in the conference as the team to beat. They boasted size and experience of 16 lettermen.

Sizewise, this will be the first time this year that Ross is outweighed. On the line the Little Giants will still maintain an advantage, but they will give away five pounds per man overall on offense and six pounds on defense. The Trojans average 193 pounds on offense and 194 on defense. This compares with overall size of 188 average back ways for Ross.

In the line Ross will have a narrow 198 to 196 average advantage on offense and 205 to 200 defensively.

Findlay to date has dropped two ball games, 30-6, to Sandusky and 20-14 to rival Fostoria in the season opener. Head Coach Hal Paul labeled the Fostoria loss "Our poorest game in years."

The good sized line is backed by a quartet of size and deception in the backfield. Man to solve in the Trojan attack is 178-pound quarterback Harry Gonzo.

Gonzo is rated as a good passer but it is liking for the running game that keeps defenses guessing. Despite being held to 33 yards in the Sandusky game Gonzo is still averaging approximately 90 yards gained per game. Coach Paul has utilized Gonzo at halfback as well as quarterback. Ross Coach Mackey rates the back a bigger threat at quarterback where his ability to rollout keep defenses guessing.

He is not alone in the backfield were 168-pound Raul Martinez adds speed and Steve Lanning and Bob Bright add power. Lanning is a 198-pounder who does everything well according to scouts. Bright at 218 is the biggest running back the Little Giants are likely to face this season. This is the third year in the Trojan backfield for Lanning.

There is also depth in the Findlay backfield with John Cindric as a backup for Gonzo at quarterback and Mickey Adair at fullback among the lettermen. READY FOR SANDUSKY — Ross Defensive Specialists Have Shut Door On Opponents

Blue Streaks' Second-Rated Ohio Team Await With Strong Defense, Speed Attack

They are telling a sad story over Sandusky way. Being issued are cries of anguish over the loss of four starters to injuries, fears of facing two of the best backs they have seen all year and the problem of facing a team so tall "it looks like trees coming at you."

These are the pre-game tales of woe being issued by Sandusky high school coach Bob Seaman and Blue Streak followers. Drawing more attention from the Fremont, Ross team, its coaches and fans are the awe-some statistics amassed this season by the unbeaten Streaks. Sandusky is currently rated second in the polls of both wire services. They have narrowed their margin to the point Mas-sillon has a precarious hold on the ranking as best high school team in Ohio.

This Sandusky team racked by injury which grinds into its depth still will field a team with offensive line averaging 210 pounds per man. On defense the front five also will average 210 pounds.

This team with all the problems is the same team which has played seven games without a loss, scored 240 points, nearly 35 per game, and given up only 28. In winning four Buckeye Conference games Sandusky has totaled 18 points to 20 for its opposition.

Four players may be on the doubtful list but still around are All-Conference tackle and line-backer Dave Swiftworth, full-back Cleveland Dickerson and quarterback Brian Healy to name a few. Dickerson, the speedy 210-pound bruiser, and Healy, dangerous passer and a slick ball-handler, are the main cogs of the Sandusky attack.

With these two setting the stage any one of many speedy halfbacks have stolen the spotlight with touchdown dashes. Dave LeVier may be a questionable but really healthy are Arky Kees, Willie Amison and George Williams. A trio of Streaks can still streak.

According to Coach Seaman the doubtful list includes 30-pound center Tom Ernst, 230-pound tackle Tim Reeh, 176-pound guard Vic Malinovsky and LeVier, a 175-pound half-back.

LeVier and Malinovsky were offensive starters. Ernst doubled as offensive center and defensive tackle and Reeh was a starting offensive tackle. This will be the second game missed by Ernst if he is not in action and the fourth for Reeh. LeVier is nursing a bad bruise, but could be in action. Ernst and Malinovsky were the hospitalized Wednesday with leg infections. Reeh is out with leg injury.

Seaman admitted "The injuries are not hurting our speed any," but modified by contending "it is grinding down our depth."

The Streak coach contended he warned his team they would be facing the best all-around running back (Tim Arndt) and best all-around quarterback (Terry Bork) they have seen this year.

He meant about the Ross height. He thought Findlay was a bigger team weightwise, but expected trouble with Ross height. He said he warned his team "They are so tall they look like trees coming at you."

Dickerson on Ground

Dickerson is Sandusky's leading ground gains with 489 yards in seven games. He holds a narrow yardage margin over Arky Kees who has gained 624 yards and is averaging nine yards per carry with 47 ball-carries.

LeVier has carried the ball 45 times for a 3.4 yard average.

Leading rushing average is the 11.5 yards per carry by LeVier, who is doubtful for the game. LeVier has carried only 28 times but gained 321 yards. Healy, who as a passer has completed 22 of 47 passes for 666 yards and nine touchdowns, is also a running threat. He has averaged 5.3 yards with 169 yards in 32 carries.

Stout Defense

The Blue Streaks also boast a stout defense. While rolling to 1,942 yards on the ground, they have held opposing runners to 548. Their total offense, running and passing, has averaged 33.7 yards per game, but the opposition has been held to 13.4.

Ross' leading ball-carrier is Tim Arndt, who has carried 102 times for 325 yards and a 3.1 yard average. As a team Ross has averaged 243 yards per game total offense and held the opposition to 162 average.

Defense against rushing has been similar by the two teams. Sandusky has shut the door on the opposition with 747 yards, compared with 763 for Ross' foes.

To date Bork has completed 27 of 74 passes for 492 yards and six touchdowns.

In looking forward to Friday's game Mackey states simply, "It will be a tough ball game." Rather than dwell on the strengths of the Sandusky ball club, the dean of Buckeye Conference mentors points to the fact his ball club is a good one. Inexperienced Ross will be in good condition with two reserve linemen as the only doubtfuls.

NEW YORK (AP) — That George Blanda is a tough guy. He just refuses to go. Houston fans have been yelling for young Don Trull and booing the 37-year-old Blanda so the coach benched the veteran last week. But not for long.

Trull started Sunday but the Oilers trailed Kansas City 17-0 in the first half. They sent the old man into start the second half.

In the space of four minutes and 24 seconds, Blanda threw three touchdown passes of 44, 40 and 17 yards, added a fourth TD at the end of the period and made it five in the last quarter.

That was enough to make Blanda the Associated Press choice as Offensive Player of the Week in the American Football League but it wasn't enough for Blanda. Trailing 35-35 with one minute and 20 seconds to go, Blanda completed four passes to set up a 15-yard field goal by Jack Stryker with 17 seconds to go that won the game.

Chargers Ferguson came to the rescue of the Buffalo Bills by catching four passes for 36 yards and scoring one touchdown against Denver. It was a fine recovery for the aptly and who had dropped two passes that were almost certain TDs against San Diego two weeks ago.

"Ferguson certainly became part of the family," commented Coach Lou Saban of the Bills, who has been hunting for receivers since Elbert Dubose and Glenn Bass were injured. The addition of Bob Robinson, who caught three for 35, was a help but Ferguson nabbed the big one.

Fred Biletnickoff, the Oakland rookie who reportedly was paid a \$100,000 bonus, finally got a chance to play at the flanker spot vacated by Robinson and caught seven passes for 118 yards. During the exhibition season, the former Florida State star, was nervous and dropped too many passes.

"I think breaking in late in the season (seventh game) really helped me," said Biletnickoff. "I felt real loose, but I should have burned that guy (defensive back Don Webb) a couple more times."

MAN ON THE HOT SPOT:

Howsam Trades Away Bing's Players

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Little-known Bob Howsam has had his troubles since becoming general manager of the St. Louis Cardinals, but they are nothing compared to the spot he is on now.

Howsam replaced the popular Bing Devine in August 1964, causing an uproar among St. Louis fans that became deafening when the Cardinals went on to win the pennant and World Series with Devine's players.

Then, in his first full season at the helm, the 1965 Cardinals finished seventh.

As if he didn't have enough trouble, in the last week Howsam has traded three-fourths of the infield that carried the team to the flag.

"I guess I'm really on the spot now," he said after trading first baseman Bill White, shortstop Dick Groat and catcher Bob Uecker to the Philadelphia Phillies Wednesday for outfielder Alex Johnson, pitcher Art Mahaffey and catcher Pat Corliss.

"But I'm a positive thinker," said the Cleveland-born Howsam, wearing his always present smile. "I'm not trying to get rid of players I'm trying to build a better ball club."

Last week, he traded third baseman Ken Boyer, the league's Most Valuable Player in 1964, to the New York Mets for pitcher Al Jackson and infielder Charley Smith. Thus, almost half of the team that won the world championship is gone.

"We have added some young players to a club we expect to be fast and aggressive," he said. "If we do any more dealing, it will be with fringe players."

If Johnson, Mahaffey, Corliss, Jackson and Smith have good years in 1966, Howsam will have proved that he can meet the challenge handed him by the Cardinals and St. Louis fans. He will have won with "my team."

However, if those players fall flat, Howsam also realizes he could find himself back in Denver, where he was an insurance company executive before joining the Cardinals.

Howsam feels he has learned a great deal since taking the general manager job, a position in which he was named Minor League Baseball Executive of the Year with the Denver Bears in 1961 and 1962.

He also was one of five men who organized the American Football League and later he became president of the Denver Broncos of the AFL.

NCAA Keeps Track Peace

CHICAGO (AP) — The National Collegiate Athletic Association is holding the federally prescribed peace in its feud with the Amateur Athletic Union.

The NCAA's policy-making council Wednesday ended a three-day session, marking the group's first meeting since last August's Senate Commerce Committee hearings on the long-raging NCAA-AAU dispute over sanctioning powers.

Everett D. (Eppie) Barnes, NCAA president, said the council decided to reserve further public comment on the equitable pending selection of a five-man arbitration board by Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey.

The arbitrating panel was recommended following the Commerce Committee hearings and is expected to be designated within two weeks.

MONSTER OF SEAWAY MAKES HEARTY MEAL OF LITTLE GIANTS

Streaks Pound Ross Hopes Into Turf, 54-0

SANDUSKY — The Monster of the Seaway rose out of Sandusky Bay Friday night and devoured Fremont Ross Little Giants, 54-0. Like knights of old on prancing white stallions, the moon glistening on their armor, the Sandusky Streaks charged at will through the visitor's defenses.

While their bastions of defense looked like a delapidated picket fence, the Little Giants found themselves swinging a tooth-picked-sized club, instead of the bloopgun of the first seven games.

Absorbed into the sod of Strobe field were the hopes of an unbeaten season. The Streaks

electrified the 10,500 fans with a display of offense and defense that justified their claim as the best high school football team in Ohio.

Watch Massillon Score
After the first series of plays the partisan fans divided their attention between the inevitable on the field and the press box, where there was telephone contact with Massillon. Sandusky was proving on the field its power. In Massillon the Tigers were getting their most severe test of the year with Warren Harding.

The word from Massillon was the "Number One" team in the state came from behind for a 14-12 victory. Now the eyes of

both Sandusky and Ross fans will be cast at the Tuesday newspapers to see if the humiliating of previously unbeaten Ross will skyrocket the Streaks into the top spot.

Nearby residents would have mental visions of church services on Strobe field as the Sandusky sideline bell repeatedly vibrated with tolls for points scored. It was a song of futility that was being rung into the ears of Ross players, coaches and supporters.

The previously mighty Little Giants were chopped down to size and dwarfed by the speed, power and efficiency of the Sandusky team.

End result of the contest was what is believed to be the worst beating ever absorbed by a Fremont team at the hands of Sandusky.

From the time flankerback speedster Arty Keys broke around left end on a 42-yard touchdown dash after 3-4 of the game there were few doubts. What doubts remained about the outcome were quickly erased by Keys. The next time Sandusky had the ball Keys sprinted on first down through left guard, right by Ross defenders, for 73 yards and the second touchdown. Five minutes and 24 seconds remained in the first period and the Streaks already held a 14-0 advantage.

Garrett Pass Display
George Garrett, the Streak who streaks from right end, opened the second period with the start of his contribution to Ross downfall. Garrett sped between Ross' two safeties, took a Brian Healy aerial over his right shoulder and darted to a score.

The play, which was one of three touchdown passes gathered in by Garrett on the same play, covered 55 yards. The Healy to Garrett combination also added touchdown aerial plays of 53 and 51 yards.

Between the first and second Garrett touchdown, the senior end pulled down a 40-yard pass in the clear, only to trip over his own feet and fall on the two. It set the stage for two one-yard

smacks at the center of the line by Cleveland Dickerson and the tally.

The offensive fireworks were

matched by the stout defense. Ross was limited to 49 yards on the ground and 106 yards total offense. Sandusky struck at will for extra points.

and amassed 551 yards total offense with 344 on the ground and 207 on five Healy completions from scrimmage and four for extra points.

One Streak Loss
Sandusky was thrown for only one loss and that didn't come until late in the third period. At that point the ball was centered over the head of punter Dan Kaser. Kaser was brought down for 24-yard loss.

This was one of only four times the Streaks had the ball that they didn't score. They punned once, shot the ball on downs with a fourth down gamble that failed and gave up a fumble, in addition to the bad pass from center.

Coach Bob Seaman's boys felt out the weakness in lack of secondary defense speed on the Ross team. Once past the line of scrimmage it was pay dirt.

Long-term players in the line rather than the exception. The Streaks had single play gains of 42, 73, 30, 21, 55, 40, 53, 51 yards. Of 61 plays run by the Streaks from scrimmage 12 went for more than ten yards and only 23 were for less than five yards.

Defensive Stalwarts
Defensively the trio of two linebackers and a middle guard were outstanding. There was a no evidence of any Sandusky defender breaking down in his assignment but the lazier of linebackers Dave Schweinfurth and Dan Kaser, as well as middle guard Brian Clark, bloomed.

Much of the night Ross quarterback Terry Bork must have had the impression Clark, the nose man on the defense, was bringing the ball back to him. Schweinfurth and Kaser then provided crunching protection of the flanks to contain the Bork option pass - run play.

With one of these three leading the rush on the blitz Bork was thrown five times on pass attempts for losses of five yards or better. Eight times in the contest Ross runners failed to make it within three yards of their own line of scrimmage.

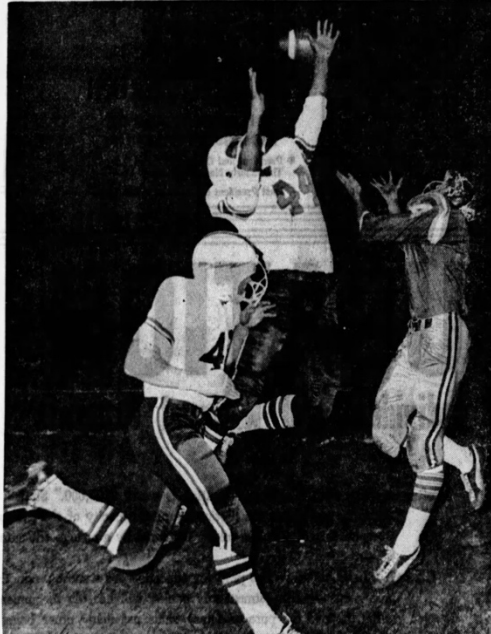
Safety on Return
Crowning blow of the contest came when Doug Davis was dumped in the end zone for a safety. Davis attempted to run a kickoff out of the end zone instead of downing it for a touch back and was swarmed under five Streak defenders.

Garrett led the Sandusky touchdown parade with three, followed by the two of Arty Keys. Quarterback Healy and fullback Dickerson each added one. Dickerson's probe into the center of the line for one yard was the only scoring play by Sandusky of less than 21 yards.

Healy scored on a 21-yard keeper around right end. Keys had the 42 and 73 yard first-period runs and Garrett pulled in the long touchdown passes.

Ross was in Sandusky territory only three times, beyond the 35 only once and never inside the 20. The deepest penetration came after the 24-yard loss by Kaser. Ross would have been even closer if there had not been a 15-yard personal foul penalty when the tackler slugged Kaser. This gave Ross the ball on the Sandusky 25. After two ground plays netted only three yards two passes, one dropped in the end zone, fell incomplete.

The plight of Ross' defense in containing Sandusky was further indicated by the fact that 18 of 38 tackles recorded by the losers were by secondary operatives.

BUYS ALL THIS

Most Improved Team In Buckeye Is Label Pasted On Elyria Foe

Will Fremont Ross be able to bounce back? and how far has Elyria come since the start of the season? These are the two questions that hover over pre-game appraisals of this Friday's Buckeye Conference encounter between Elyria and Ross.

Elyria, defending Buckeye champion, opened the season with only four lettermen. In recent weeks they have carried the flag as the most improved team in the conference. After dropping their first two conference games to Lorain Admiral King, 6-20, and Findlay, 8-25, the Pioneers rebounded to win the two of their last three battles. The loss in this span was 26-0 to Sandusky.

Victories came over Mansfield, 18-7, and Marion, 45-7.

Point To Prove

Ross is faced with the proposition of proving their fast start on the season wasn't a fluke. They are still licking the wounded pride of their 34-0 setback by Sandusky last Friday. This game, which was billed as the winner-take-all of the Buckeye Conference turned out to be a romp that was beyond a doubt in the first three minutes of play.

What happened last Friday night is a question that goes without a satisfactory answer. What concerns Ross Coach Mal Mackey this week is whether his boys can get up for a victory effort after absorbing such a lacing. Mackey indicated Thursday that his boys appeared to be in a proper frame of mind to play good football Friday. Whatever took place last week is forgotten and the Little Giants set their sights this week on preparation for Elyria.

Passing Speed

Mackey enters the game with high respect for the Elyria team which he concedes is the most improved in the league. He notes that their greatest assets are a dangerous passing attack and speed. These were the same two things with which the Little Giants could not cope last Friday at Sandusky.

Coach Bill Barton builds his Pioneer attack around the pro-set offense with split ends. Ends and halfbacks have both been primary targets for the Elyria passing game. Mackey notes that the favorite receivers have been halfbacks Jack Beidleman, a 140-pound speedster who is also the team's leading rusher, and Don Boddy, 165. Tight end Dan Hovey, a 200-pound husky has been the end most likely to be on the receiving end of the pass.

Beidleman has averaged seven yards a carry with his amazing speed and foot balance that make him hard to stop. He has carried the ball 76 times for 533 yards and scored 52 points.

Boddy is the second leading carrier with 277 yards in 46 yards and an average of 4.9. Prime reason for Elyria's 4-4 record to date may be the absence for three games of sophomore fullback Al Robinson, 175-pounder. Johnson was the team's leading ground-gainer until he was hurt in the Cuyahoga Falls game. He then missed action in the first three conference games. In the first two games of the season he had gained over 100 yards in each. Currently he is averaging 3.7 yards with 208 yards in 56 carries.

Statistics Similar

Ross team statistics look a tremendous beating as a result of the Sandusky battle in which the Streak total offense topped 500 yards and Ross barely hit 100. As a result there is now a close parallel between the figures of Ross and Elyria.

Ross total offense for the first eight games has been 1,800 yards, compared to 1,887 for Elyria. Ross has allowed foes

1,690 yards to 1,370 by Elyria. Ross has gained 1,254 yards on the ground and 335 in the air, compared to 1,301 on the ground and 386 in the air for Elyria. Elyria has recorded 98 first downs and its foes 64 for the season. Ross has only 87 first downs but the foe has come up with only 66. Ross has hit 44 per cent of its pass attempts and Elyria 40 per cent.

Elyria Chronicle-Telegram Sports Editor Jerry Rombach refers to the Pioneers as a 'Sleeping Giant'. He contends the team has been giving away touchdowns and is finally coming into its own. The shellacking of Marion last week would seem to add validity to his words.

It is noted that 23 Elyria fumbles have aided the opposition. In the last two games this problem appears to be remedied and the Pioneers didn't drop the ball against either Sandusky or Marion.

So far Ross has scored 142 points and given up 106. Elyria has tallied 136 and allowed 111. Each team has been shut out once, both by Sandusky.

Game time is 8 p.m. in Elyria.

LITTLE GIANTS UNABLE TO BOUNCE BACK AFTER SANDUSKY Ross Drops Second Buckeye Game To Elyria, 21-0

A punt fumble in the first period led to a quick touchdown, some defensive lapses that permitted will-o-the-wisp 140-pound Jack Beidelman to show his running ability, and a "nothing" offense.

These ingredients added up at Ely stadium in Elyria Friday night to give Bill Barton's fast-stepping gridgers a 21 to 0 victory over the Ross high Little Giants. The game was a Buckeye Conference scrap and the second league loss in a row for the lads of Mai Mackey. The first loss of the year came a week ago when Sandusky's Blue Streaks, striving for No. 1 rating in Ohio scholastic ranks, lowered the boom in a 54-0 encounter.

The Ross lads end their season next Friday on the Harmon field greenery against Lorain Admiral King, a hand-driving, hard-hitting crew that dropped a 24 to 8 decision to the Blue Streaks Friday night.

The question in everyone's

mind during the week was "how far can the Little Giants come back after the Sandusky shellacking?"

The answer is: "not far enough."

Tight First Half

Except for a first period break the contest at Elyria might have found both teams leaving the field at halftime without a score. With only three minutes remaining in the opening canto George Brown punting for Elyria boomed the ball down the middle from the Elyria 40 to Doug Davis on the Ross 17. But Davis couldn't hang on to the elusive leather. Beidelman covering the pigskin on the 19.

Beidelman took the ball on a slant over right guard for nine, hit again for two, Mike Hetrick downing him, then Al Robinson downed off tackle to the 5. There were two minutes and 28 seconds to go when Quarterback R. J. C. Bishop ran a keeper to the two and a first down, then it was

just a matter of time. Robinson was stopped and so was Beidelman but on a third down play the latter drove over his right tackle into the end zone. Only 30 seconds remained in the period when the score came. George Branco smeared Beidelman when the latter came around the Ross left end trying for two points.

The touchdown took seven plays after the punt fumble. Neither team could hit pay dirt in the second period, neither having much of an advantage at any time. However, Terry Bork punt of 44 yards put the ball on the five when Dave Longmarch downed it. Only 55 seconds remained in the half when Beidelman hit for nine, then Robinson fumbled. Wally Pankratz covering the ball on the 17.

Ross Fails To Click

However, four pass plays failed to click, Bork firing a bullet to Fred Tolhurst that was

knocked down, he fired one out of the end zone when all his receivers were covered, a screen pass was knocked down by the brilliant linebacker Randy Stevenson, and Tolhurst was surrounded by three men when the fourth down pick went over his head.

Elyria ran one play before the half ended.

On the first play of the third period the game, so far as the Little Giants were concerned, fell apart. Not more than five minutes after Coach Mackey had warned his lads to not try to get Beidelman by the legs, but to hit him high, Curt Lindsey's kickoff went to the fleet junior on the 12 yard line. Several Ross lads had good shots at him—all at the ankles—and when Beidelman had stopped running he had covered 88 yards to the goal line.

Quarterback Bishop ran a keeper to his right for a two-point conversion, not a hand being put on him.

The third quarter was a seeing-saw affair, Ross failing to mount an offensive, and as the period ended Bishop hit Beidelman with a neat running pass good for 21 yards to the Ross 26.

Game's First Penalty

Branco smeared a Beidelman reverse, then Bishop passed twice incomplete, but on the important fourth down the pesky Beidelman went over his right tackle again for 15 yards to the 11. However, an Elyria athlete was caught clipping, injuring Pankratz on the play, and the ball was put back to the 26.

The penalty was the first of the game coming at 10:59 to play in the final period. Beidelman was stopped by Tolhurst, but on the next play Beidelman ran a reverse to his left side putting the pigskin on the nine.

Ross could develop no offensive during the entire ball game, blocking again being inept. The Elyria defense was rugged and blocking in front of ball carriers going wide was nil. Bork fired some on-the-target passes, and some went away in face of a hard-charging defense. Don Somogyi, 185-pound linebacker, was in Bork's lap much of the evening, and when he was handled by defenders Stevenson, Carl Leslie, Greg Jasowicz and Jim Marsh were firing into the Little Giant backfield.

Raines Is Injured

Only serious Ross injury took Steve Raines, defensive backfield man, out of the game in the first period. Raines has a left shoulder dislocation, being brought to Memorial hospital here by his father, Paul Raines, assistant Junior high principal. He was hurt when a block sent him on his shoulder. He will not play in next week's finale against Admiral King. Fred Tolhurst's sore nose got smacked again, and Wally Pankratz was trying to trade his sore ankle to anyone who would take it. Other than that the squad came out without injury.

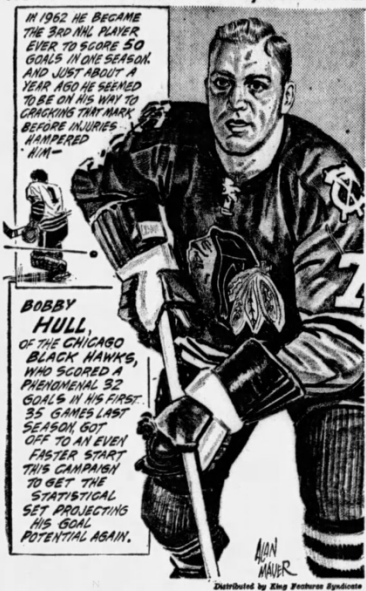

Payne has averaged 5.3 yards per carry this year with 688 net yards in 128 carries. He has tallied 84 points for all games this season and is by far the busiest runner on the King attack.

Payne is an agile runner with good moves but not the fastest in the King backfield. This bonus goes to Willy Rice, primarily a kick return specialist who has still gained an average of over four yards per carry on the 24 times he has been called to run from scrimmage.

Second in ground-gaining and in number of carries for King is John Milam, who has averaged 3.7 yards with 97 carries for 357 yards.

Power Minimized

Faced with a lack of size Coach Pete Riesen this year has not relied as heavily on the power game as in the past. His backs have been utilized to sweep the ends and the passing arm of three quarterbacks has been employed to throw 80 passes, good for 27 completions.

As the King attack has jelled late in the season Riesen has gone less to the throwing game. Only six passes were thrown against Sandusky by the Admirals. It is likely that Bob Strick, a converted end, or Tom Wasco will get the starting quarterback assignment. This pair have apparently come to the front of the cloud surrounding the quarterback position. Tom Rainey, a junior, handled the quarterback duties until prior to the Lorain game. Since that time Wasco or Strick had answered the field general call.

Defense has been the big boast of Coach Riesen and his team lived up to their mentor's praise against Sandusky. They have been touched for only 10.1 points per game. Against Sandusky the big man in the King defensive alignment was middle guard Steve Stoble. Ross scout John Hershey noted that on 30 consecutive plays Stoble made the tackle or was in the tackle assist 22 times.

Offensively Admiral King has averaged 11.1 points with 100 points in nine games. Defensively they have allowed 91 points, 42 of these in the last two games. These were the 24-8 loss to Sandusky and 18-18 tie with Findlay.

AREA LEADERS:

Polar Bears, Gant Assured Point Crowns

For all intents and purposes the scoring leadership, both individual and team, for the area, are wrapped up prior to the final weekend of the football season. Margareta is likely to claim both titles after the smoke clears Friday.

At present Margareta holds better than a 50-point scoring lead over its nearest competitor which has a game remaining on the schedule. In fact it is a cinch that the team offensive and defensive titles are in the bag. Margareta has tallied 210 points with a game remaining against Tiffin Calvert.

St. Joseph, which has notched the defensive title by allowing only 46 points in nine games, is also second in offense. Closing with 32 points against Oak Harbor the Crimson Streaks hiked their offensive total to 162 points.

This second place in scoring could be seriously challenged this weekend by either Ross or Bellevue. Each has a game remaining, while St. Joseph has concluded its season.

Individually Herman Gant of Margareta is beyond reach in the race for scoring title. Gant has topped the century mark with 102 points in nine games with a game to play. The Polar Bear halfback has tallied 14 touchdowns and 18 extra points. Nearest individual scoring rival is Bellevue's Carl Pambianco with 11 touchdowns and two extra points for 98 points.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Sugar Ray Robinson is near the end of the road but the roar of the crowd still makes sweet music in his ears. The fight with young Joey Archer Wednesday night may have been his last stop.

The Harlem dancer wants to think it over for a day or two before he makes up his mind. The Sugar Man retired way back in 1952 and stayed away for two years. After he came back he won and lost the world middleweight title three times. But the skills that earned him the reputation of the best fighter pound-for-pound in all ring history have faded.

His dream of winning the championship for the sixth time must have vanished in thin air after his game effort but decisive defeat by the 27-year old New York Irishman.

"It was Archer's turn to scream 'We want Dick Tiger.' Chances are he'll get that shot at the middleweight crown. Teddy Brenner, the Madison Square Garden matchmaker, wants to make it for March in New York.

Archer knocked down Robinson for a nine-count in the fourth round to the surprise of the Civic Arena crowd of 9,023 that paid a gross gate of \$40,913. He rocked the tired body of the faded ex-champion time after time and almost put him away in the 10th round.

All three officials voted for him — referee Buck McTiernan 48-41, judge Ernie Sexto 49-40 and judge George Lupinacci 50-39. The AP card was 48-41. When the final bell rang the cheers were for Sugar Ray, who

who was still trying to knock out the kid with one big punch. He had only one big round, the third.

The truth of the matter is that Robinson's once potent punch has lost its zip. He raked Archer with left hooks and combinations as he punished Randy Turpin, Gene Fullmer, Jake Lamotta, Rocky Graziano, Carmen Basilio and all the others in the good old days.

Nothing happened. Archer shook off the bombs and pecked away with that stiff left jab that forced the old boy to apply ice packs to his cheeks in his dressing room.

"I tried from the first punch to knock him out," said Robinson, a forlorn figure on a bench. "The knockdown was the difference. He caught me off balance with a right hand."

Is this the end?
"You'll have to ask my manager," said Robinson pointing to George Gainford.
"We'll decide in a couple of days," said the sweaty Emperor. Later, in a dark corridor, Gainford nodded his head and said, "Age catches up to everybody."

Around the corner and down the hall, the Archer boys, Joey and his brother, Jimmy, who acts as his manager, were yelling for Tiger. But first, Joey had a kind word for Ray.

"He's still a great champion," said Joey. "He went out like a champ. I can see why they said he was a great. I learned something fighting him."

It was Robinson's 14th fight of the year and his fifth defeat.

Ross Drops To Buckeye Fourth, Falls 14-0 To King

"We just couldn't get in the ball game," Coach Mel Mackey lamented as he sat beside his locker after the ball game. His Fremont Ross Little Giants were undefeated through the first seven games of the season but had just dropped their third straight to close the season.

"We were outplayed," Mackey admitted as he looked back

at the action which left his team on the short end of a 14-0 game with Lorain Admiral King. After averaging better than 20 points in those first seven games, the Little Giants were shutout in the final three games.

Adding to the humiliating finish of a season which was actually better than expected

from pre-season prognosticators, was the fact the final loss dropped Ross to fourth in the league. Both Admiral King and Findlay, 47-6 conquerors of Marion Friday, slipped by the Little Giants. They all chased Buckeye Conference champions Sandusky.

Friday night Ross was beaten by a smaller team which led

Ross didn't fail to move the ball but they couldn't find the proper fuel to keep the offen-

A hint of the offensive frustration that was in store was given the first time Ross had the ball. With Tim Arndt cracking off a 30-yard gainer on a trap up the middle Ross 40 yards in four plays to the Admiral King 28. With second down and eight yards Ross lost two yards on the next three plays.

Admiral King then took over and ground out the first touchdown drive.

Threaten But Fail

Ross advanced to the King eight-yard-line twice, to the 10 once and to the 16 the last time they had the ball. The first half ended with Ross getting a first down on the King eight yard line. Four times Ross had a first down inside the King 20 - yard line and then the attack stalled.

Milam scored the first King touchdown with one minute and 40 seconds to play in the first period. He slashed off right tackle for the six points and then added the two extra points on another dive off guard.

Broken Play Gains

Big gains on rushes by Arndt and Swartz and a broken play that turned into a completed pass put Ross into scoring position. Arndt set up a scoring opportunity on his 30-yard run in the first quarter. A Bork pass just eluded Dave Longbach's fingertips deep in the end zone on a fourth down from the King 31. This was the play that could have meant the difference in the ball game. A score at this early stage might have built the needed fire under the Little Giants.

Immediately after King's second touchdown a 45-yard rush by Swartz nearly went all the way. It gave Ross a first down on the opponent's 19. With five minutes and 30 seconds to play in the third period Ross failed to gain on a fourth and one situation to end this hope.

Late in the first half two Bork passes knocked on King's door. The first came when Ross elected to punt with fourth and six yards to go on the King 38. The pass from center sailed over Bork's head. The quarterback - punter picked up the ball, eluded three King tacklers and circled in the mud to the right sideline. He spotted Fred Tolhurst down field and hit him with a 21 yard pass to the 17 for a first down. Three plays later it was fourth and two on the nine and the Little Giants could only get one yard.

A 17-yard Bork to Doug Davis pass was a key to a 36-yard drive that ended eight yards of a touchdown with the half-ending gun. Ross had a first down on the night but time ran out. With the defeat Ross concluded its season with six wins, three losses and one tie. In the Buckeye Conference they had four wins, three losses.

Kentucky Fears Own Looking Ahead, Speedy Thrusts Of Houston's McVea

Kentucky, although a two-touchdown favorite, has two major causes for concern when it places its hopes for a major bowl bid and its ranking among the nation's college football elite on the line against Houston tonight.

First, there is the danger of looking past the oft-beaten but highly dangerous Cougars to next week's game with traditional rival Tennessee, the country's eighth-ranked team. Kentucky, 6-2, currently is No. 10.

The second cause for concern is Warren McVea. McVea, one of the most widely heralded halfbacks in Texas football history, was a distinct disappointment in his first few games in this, his sophomore season.

But he broke loose on touchdowns in Houston's 17-3 upset of Mississippi last week and took six passes for 201 yards, an indication he may have come of age. The performance has the Cougars, 3-5 for the season, gunning for a second straight upset, an upset that could kill Kentucky hopes for a bid to the Sugar or Orange Bowl.

Kentucky's game in Houston's Astrodome is the only Saturday night game involving a ranked team. All the rest play at afternoon. There were no major games Friday night.

The big ones this afternoon involved Michigan State, Arkansas and Nebraska, ranked 1-2-3 respectively, each 8-0 and each

Michigan State could clinch the Big Ten title and a trip to the Rose Bowl by beating Indiana, while Arkansas and Nebraska sought at least a tie for the Southwest and Big Eight titles. Arkansas played Southern Methodist and Nebraska played Oklahoma State.

The schedule for the rest of the Top Ten had No. 4 Notre Dame playing North Carolina,

No. 5 Alabama playing South Carolina, No. 6 Southern Cal vs. Pitt, No. 7 UCLA against Stanford, Tennessee vs. Mississippi and No. 9 Missouri against Oklahoma.

Other major games tonight include Mississippi State at LSU, Memphis State at North Louisiana Tech and New Mexico at New Mexico State.

Ortiz Figures Rooting Support Will Spur Effort To Regain Title

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) — Carlos Ortiz, the former lightweight boxing champion, believes the rooting support of Puerto Rican fans will help him regain the title from world champion Ismael Laguna of Panama tonight in their return bout.

Mike Grant was the high scorer of the game, throwing in nine field goals and five free throws for 23 points for Thompson.

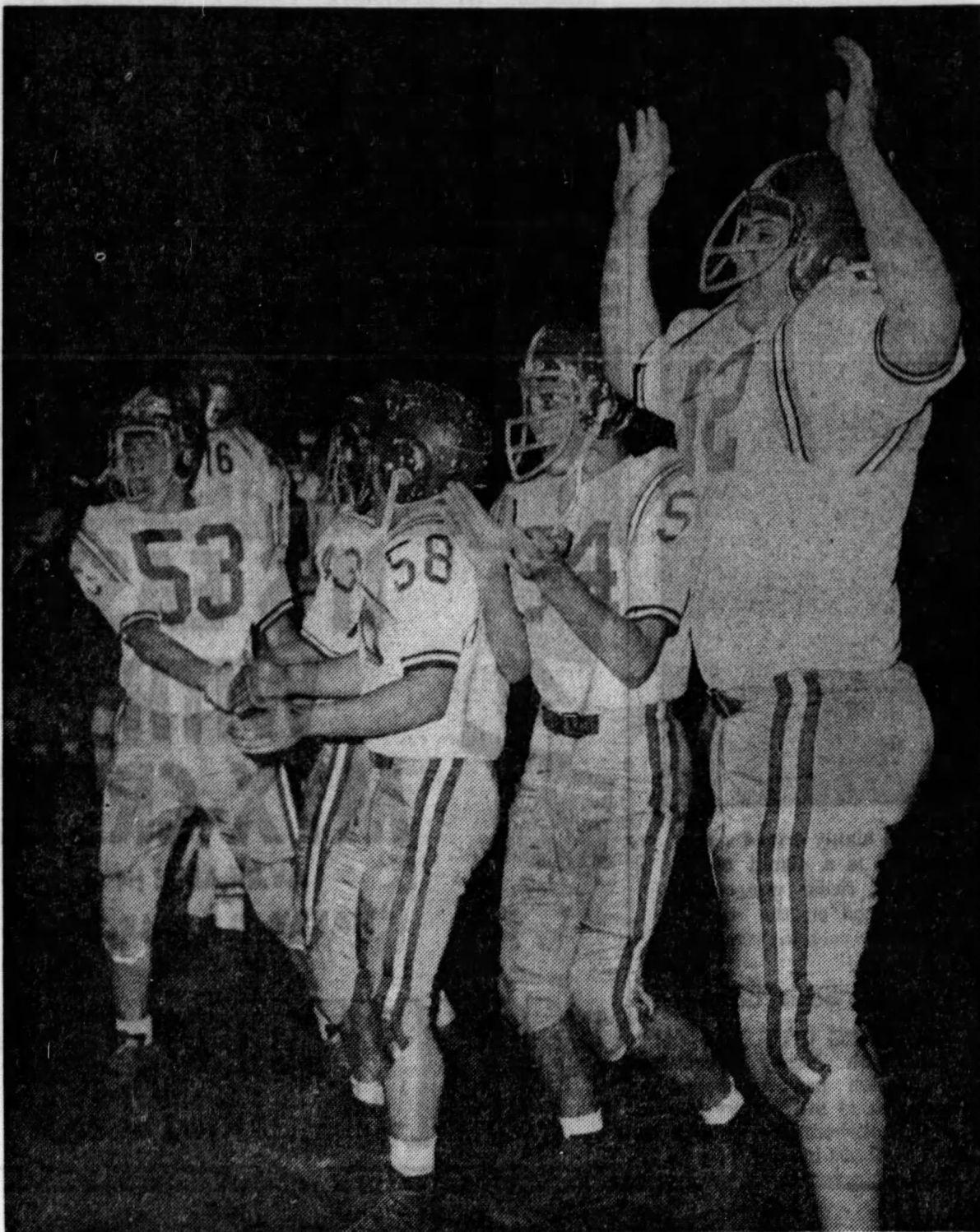

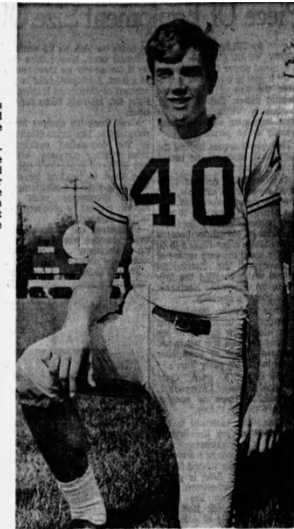

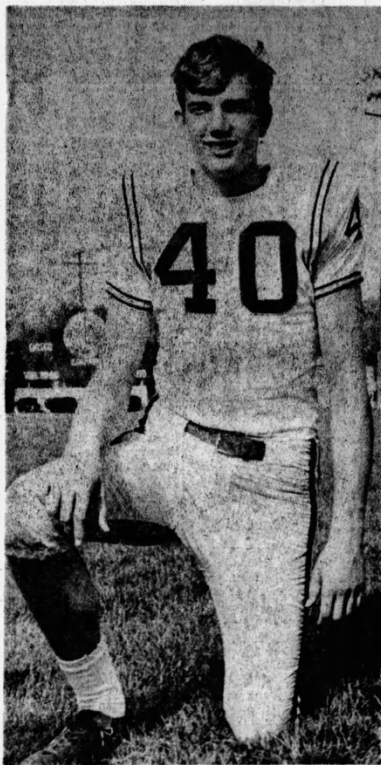
